Gates wows young players

Microsoft founder Bill Gates is not a rock star, but he got the rock star treatment in a surprise appearance at the Youth NABC on Saturday.

Gates arrived as the young players were taking a lunch break between sessions of the National Youth Swiss Teams.

Addressing the young players, Gates

said, "It's great to see you playing bridge. You make mistakes, but it's fun because you can try not to make the same mistakes again."

Gates and his friend Warren Buffett have helped fund an effort to get more schools to teach bridge to young player. Buffett, Gates said, "got me involved in bridge in a pretty deep way."

Mobbed by the young players and enthusiastically applauded, Gates signed autographs and chatted with the youngsters before departing for his own bridge game. He is playing in the Open Swiss Teams.

"We need a lot more young players in this game," he said.

Youth NABC Co-Chair Patty Tucker said she was impressed that Gates took time out to drop in on the tournament. "It sends the message that bridge important and good for the kids," she said.

Lately they have been playing at Priscilla Smith's Ruff 'n Sluff Bridge Club in their home


"We like bridge because you're always learning new conventions," says Aidan. Adds her sister: "I just like cards."
