# Parents approve of bridge Bridge is a great game, but what do parents

think about it?

"Bridge makes them think," says Mark Kedzierski of Marietta GA. He doesn't play bridge, but has opinions about it. "Bridge is above and beyond an ordinary card game," he says. "I have two daughters who've played for three years, and I've seen them grow in it. They really enjoy it."

Annie Rizzo, mother of Zandy Rizzo, agrees. "I've seen when my son has made connections, when he puts two and two together," Rizzo of Alpharetta GA says. "One of the big benefits is learning how to figure things out on their own outside of the structure of a school."

"Besides being mentally stimulating and encouraging social interaction, bridge is an activity where rules, manners and decorum are expected," says Laurie Wexel of Lilburn GA. "That's important."

Minjane Jan of Alpharetta GA agrees. "Bridge is a disciplined game with rules to follow," she says. "There's a proper etiquette."

"My son loves bridge and winning is secondary," says Jeff McCurdy. "He loves the complexity of the game, but he loves the social aspect even more. He doesn't want to disappoint his partner."

Carol Krug of Sarasota FL is a bridge player who is active in bridge governance. "I see the joy in the kids' faces and the fun they have," she says. "I see them learn and how quickly they catch on." Krug, along with Gloria Bart and the late Dean Cohler started an active youth program in her area. There are about 80 kids in schools and in Boys and Girls Clubs."

Irina Ladyzhensky is a bridge player who has won an NABC+ event. She is also a parent with three children who play. Her daughters Asya and Alexandra are here.

"Bridge helps children with math and science skills, but also it teaches them to make good decisions," says Ladyzhensky. "When they play with others, it expands their circle of friends."

David and Michelle Ziebarth of the Memphis TN area are here with daughter Piper. "She likes the numbers and the strategy," says David, "but it's also a way to socialize with friends. She plays at the local bridge club against adults and is not intimidated."

# Jeng brothers win **NABC Youth Open**

Andrew and Richard Jeng of Johns Creek GA had two big games to win the Baron Barclay NABC Youth Open Pairs. The brothers had 58.93% in the morning and followed with a 71.43% in the afternoon. Because it was a qualifying event, carryover was added to the final session results to give them a total score of 74.81%.

The Jengs are on the USA2 team to play in the under 21 event at the world championships to be held later this year in Philadelphia. They will be competing for the Damiani Cup. Richard holds the ACBL record as the youngest Life Master. The pair play a 2/1 bidding system.

Tom Walsh of Saskatoon SK and Arjun Dhir of Alpharetta GA were second with a score of 65.18%. In third place were Zachary Brescoll of Versaille KY and Asya Ladyzhensky of Ellenton FL. Their score was 62.45%.

# **Award-winning author** autographs his new book

"The hardest part of writing my latest book was making bridge understandable to the 99% of the readers who don't play bridge," says acclaimed author Louis Sachar. That's understandable. Bridge is hard enough to understand by those who play.

Louis Sachar spoke yesterday to players at the Youth NABC. He described his work, answered questions and signed books.

Sachar says he began *The Card Turner*, a book about an older bridge player who goes blind and his nephew who helps him cope, by writing one or two hours each day. After six months, he had finished a first draft. That was the first of six drafts as he worked and reworked his book. The process took about two years.

Sachar described how while in college he took a "course" as an assistant at an elementary school. The experience changed his life. He was interested in writing, and he used his experiences at the school as the basis for his first

movie. When he was asked to write the screen play, at first he was reluctant. Then he decided why not? Sachar described how he accidentally had a part in the movie.


After discussion and questions, Sachar signed books and posed for photographs.

Location: Mardi Gras Ballroom, Salon E **Bridge for Parents – Start to Play** 


This class is designed for new players or players that haven't played in many years that want to learn something about the "new" bridge. Learn the basics concepts of the game, value of suits and cards and basic hand evaluation. You will learn how an auction proceeds, what a "trump" contract is, as well as notrump. You will also learn what to bid and how high to bid. There will be example hands to practice illustrating what is covered each day.

The instructor, Suzanne Cliffe, teaches many beginners and intermediate players at the bridge club in New Orleans. She also directs games designed specifically to introduce players to duplicate bridge.

#### **Bridge for Parents – Advance Your Game**

These lessons are for parents that know the basics of the game and want to improve their skills. Using a PowerPoint presentation, the focus will be on planning the play, the play of the hand in both no trump and suit contracts, and hand reevaluation after each bid. Drawing trumps and when to delay drawing trumps will be covered as well.

The instructor, Jennie Sauviac, is a Gold Life Master, an ACBL Sectional Director and certified bridge teacher and cruise director.



West's preempt gave North-South a tough problem. South, Arjun Dhir of Alpharetta GA,

made the first key decision when he balanced at the four level, vulnerable against not, with 7 HCP. Walsh bid 4 , ending the auction

East led the ◆A and at trick two, led a low club to the 10, queen and ace. Walsh ruffed his diamond loser in dummy and led a spade. When East played low, Walsh had a problem — should he finesse or not? Normally, the finesse is a better play, but Walsh rose with the ♠A, dropping the king. It was an easy matter now to draw the last trump, and claim 10 tricks: seven spades, two clubs and a diamond ruff.

Why did Walsh play for the inferior play in trumps? He realized that if the king didn't fall, he still had an excellent chance to make his contract. He could lead the \$7 to the 9. The \$K would then be a discard for one of his heart losers. Two chances are better than one.

Making 4♠ was worth 5.5 on a 7 top
