Things you should know For the Youth NABC


- Registration will begin at 9:15 a.m. on Thursday, July 28, in the foyer of the Essex Ballroom on the Mezzanine level of the Sheraton Centre Hotel.
- It is not necessary to register to play. Singlesession entries are welcome. The event is open to players 19 and younger with fewer than 5000 masterpoints. The card fee is \$10 per person per session.
- All Youth NABC events will be played in the Essex Ballroom at the Sheraton Centre Hotel.
- Lunch will be provided on Thursday, Friday and Saturday for all Youth NABC participants.
- The Youth Lounge is located in Conference Room G outside the Essex Ballroom.
- Parents and chaperones are not permitted to kibitz the players but are allowed to take photos during the first five minutes of each session.
- Parents and chaperones are welcome to attend the Winners' Reception on Saturday evening following the final session of play.
- The young players' favorite tournament director, Nancy Watkins, returns to run the various games.

Bridge for Parents – Start to Play I

This class is designed for new players or players who haven't played in many years and want to learn something about the "new" bridge. Learn the basic concepts of the game, ranks of the suits and basic hand evaluation. You will learn how an auction proceeds, what a "trump" contract is, as well as notrump. You will also learn what to bid and how high to bid. The instructor is Wanda Pearce of Ontario.

Bridge for Parents – Advance Your Game I

These lessons are for parents who know the basics of the game and want to improve their skills. The focus will be on planning the play, the play of the hand in notrump and in suit contracts, and hand evaluation after each bid. Drawing trumps and when to delay drawing trumps will be covered as well.

The instructor is Viktoria Renaud, also of Ontario.
