Dedicated teacher shows how it's done

Barbara Clark does so much for bridge in her corner of New Jersey that it's hard to categorize her activities precisely. Suffice it to say that she gets things done for the game in District 3.

Clark, a regular at the Youth NABCs, returned this year with nine players from two schools in Orange NJ, her home base.

Four came from the Park Avenue School, five from the Oakwood Avenue School.

Clark is the Youth Bridge

Coordinator for her district and the Unit 140 school bridge coordinator. In the 11 years that she and others have been teaching bridge in schools, she reckons that hundreds of young people have been exposed

to the game, many sticking with it.

The youngsters in the youth program play in the regional in Rye NY every year, and they compete in various nearby sectionals.

Right after last year's visit to the Youth NABC in Atlanta, the group she guides started fundraising for the trip to Las Vegas. They baked cookies, washed cars, had raffles and solicited donations, to name just a few of their efforts. This year, District 3 chipped in \$500 each for four players to travel to this tournament.

The school lessons are ongoing, thanks to the efforts of Clark and those who work with her. Last year, the school bridge classes at the Park school had 12 to 15 members. At Oakwood, 20 students took the lessons.

"The kids are learning a lot," Clark said, "and we have seen some of the fifth- and six-graders teaching bridge to the third- and fourth-graders – and they pay attention."

Clark said that the late Joan Gerard, who represented District 3 on the ACBL Board of Directors for decades, fought to get her district to establish a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. That has come to pass, Clark said, with the establishment of the New Jersey-New York Youth Bridge Association – another activity for Orange's youth recruitment leader.

"We are very proud of what we do," Clark said.
Considering that Las Vegas is more than 2500
miles from Orange, Clark wasn't so sure things
would work out for the nine players who wanted
to play bridge at this tournament. "I never dreamed
we'd be able to come here, but now they're talking
about where the tournament is next year."

Youth NABC starts with a bang

At times on day one of the 2014 Youth NABC, it was hard to hear yourself think with all the noise produced by more than 100 young bridge players with seemingly boundless energy.

To Youth NABC Chair Nancy Erickson, the din was happy music.

"The noise after each round," she said, "was a joy to listen to. The kids had a blast."

Registration went smoothly despite a minor difficulty in communicating with some members of the 26-player contingent from China. Erickson's daughter, Megan Silva, had some signs made up in Chinese and placed on the tables to help the players with the check-in process.

Erickson said she was especially pleased to note the behavior of the young players. "Every one of them embraced the Zero Tolerance policy of the ACBL," she said. "The sportsmanship was something to behold. It is what we are all about."

Co-Chair Patty Tucker conceived of the Youth NABC and made it happen in 2008 in an Atlanta suburb. She has nurtured the tournament and expanded her efforts to get new players occupying seats at clubs and tournaments.

Tucker glows when she describes what the Youth NABC means to the players who participate.

"Every time I come back and see familiar faces and new faces," Tucker said, "it makes everything worthwhile. This is one of the best things ACBL does."

What she really liked about the start of this tournament is that "the kids hung around after. It's all about making friends and connections that will last for the rest of their lives."

Tucker was especially pleased to see Timothy McAllister, of nearby Henderson, on opening day. He took Tucker's Learn Bridge In A Day? course on Sunday, showed up on Thursday to play in the Youth NABC, played two sessions of the Cardrook Pairs, won some masterpoints and joined the ACBL on the spot.

Seriously, the kid is good

When he was three years old, Alex Sung of New York City saw his grandmother, Connie Lee, playing bridge on a computer. It was the Bridge Baron software program.

A couple of days later, Lee heard a voice from the room with the computer: "Welcome to Bridge Baron!" Lee found that her grandson had opened the program and had begun adjusting the fonts and making other changes. He was hooked.

By age four, Alex could count high-card points and he whizzed through a copy of Harry Lampert's "The Fun Way To Serious Bridge."

A few months later, he said, "I want to play real bridge." He has done so several times with his grandmother. Two years ago, they had an 82% game at a duplicate club.

At age seven, he came in second in a main event at a Youth regional.

Alex's mother, Alice Lee, is delighted at her son's interest in the game. "It's something he can do with his grandparents. He used to beg my parents to play. Sometimes he would say he had a headache and needed to play bridge to make it go away."

Ilene Grabel, Youth NABC partnership chair, heard about Alex and shared his story with her husband, Grand Life Master Ross Grabel. Ross said he would like to play with Alex, but he's a bit too old for the Youth NABC. He did stop by the venue on Thursday to say hi to Alex, who said he likes bridge because "it's mentally challenging."

Added his grandmother, "Alex is self-taught. We didn't teach him at all."

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


