The official Ambassador of Bridge is always ready to help out -- but when she plays it's almost always the Precision system invented by her late husband C.C. Wei.

Tseng, however, doesn't know Precision, so he prevailed upon Wei-Sender to make a small allowance when they sat down Monday night in the Continuous Side Pairs.

The two had a $52 \%$ game, placing fifth in their section.
"I played terribly," said Tseng, who turned 43 on Tuesday. "But it was a very enjoyable game. Kathie is a very nice partner."

The Erie PA resident and his wife Mary are in Albuquerque for the duration of the Summer NABC.

They are carrying a hefty 6.06 Victory Point lead into the final over run-ners-up Harry Ross, John Gustafson, Jerry Gaer, Marilyn Hemenway and Mike Albert.

Robert Ryder, far ahead in the 1997 Senior race, is in third place, playing with Howard Hertzberg, Simon Kantor, Hugh Maclean, Harold Feldheim and Martin Baff.

The turnout was good -- 59 teams.


## Lloyd Arvedon

## Arvedon is a Grand Master

Lloyd Arvedon of Medford MA went over the 10,000 -point mark when he finished second in Bracket 1 of the Charity Knockout Teams. That made him a Grand Life Master because he has won two North American Championships -- the Spring Open Pairs in 1994 and 1997. His partner on both occasions was Alan Falk.

At 44 he is one of the youngest of the Grand Life Masters. He considers qualifying nine times for the Grand National Pairs from New England one of his best accomplishments in bridge.

When he's not playing bridge, he works with schools on fund-raising drives -- like candy sales to raise money for band or team trips.

He also does some teaching, and he really enjoys this. In general he works with reasonably good players -- usually they are already Life Masters who want to advance to the next level of expertise.
"I work at making them think, to solve problems. I get them to verbalize what they're thinking. That way I can see if they're thinking along the right lines. If they're not -- and often they're not -then I try to help them learn what direction their thinking should take."

## Schwartz is KOed in Spingold, Schulle upset

The powerhouse team captained by Richard Schwartz was ambushed by a Washington DC-based team and eliminated from the Spingold Knockout Teams, 164-161.

Most of the other top seeds advanced to round three today.

The new \#4 seed is made up of Robert Klein, Dunn Loring VA; David Ruderman, Burtonsville MD; Donna Rogall and John Adams, Gaithersburg MD.

They surprised the team led by Schwartz, who was playing with Mark Lair, Chip Martel, Lew Stansby, Paul Soloway and Bobby Goldman. Schwartz, Lair, Soloway and Goldman won the Vanderbilt KO at the Spring NABC in Dallas.

The Klein team jumped out to an 82 20 lead after one quarter. Schwartz and company outscored Klein 76-33 in the second set to cut the margin to 19 . The favorites could manage only a 4-IMP gain in the third quarter, however, and the underdogs hung on for the narrow win.

In another upset, the team captained by Kay Schulle went down to a New York-based team, 132-105. The winners are Mark Gordon, Richard Zucker, Fred Chang, Winthrop Allegaert, Jared Lilienstein and Glenn Milgrim.

The top-seeded Nick Nickell squad, given a scare on day one, took no chances on day two, blasting their opponents, 230-112. The \#2 seed, led by Steve Robinson, was clobbering the David Metcalf sextet, 182-48, when the giant killers withdrew. The Metcalf team had defeated the Nickell squad in a three-way match on the opening day.

Jimmy Cayne's \#3 seed also had the benefit of a withdrawal -- their opponents conceded after three quarters.

## Caddy brigade youthful but still on the ball

North led the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, which held, and switched to a low club. South won the $\because A$ and returned the $\because 8$. Garner couldn't imagine that the opponents' spades would be 2-2 after the auction he had just taken part in, so he didn't consider ruffing a club in dummy. Obviously, that would have worked on the actual layout.

Instead Garner won the $\approx \mathrm{K}$, played a spade to the ace, ruffed a heart and played a spade to the king. He grimaced inwardly when both opponents followed to the second round of spades, but the situation was far from hopeless.

Garner ruffed a third heart, extracting North's last heart, and put the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ on the table. North won with the ace and could choose his poison: lead a diamond to dummy's king and allow Garner to discard his losing club, or lead a club from the jack into Garner's tenace.

Plus 590 was good for 37.5 out of 38 matchpoints.

## 1998, 1990 Charity picks: <br> Crohn's and Autism

The ACBL Charity Foundation has selected the Crohn's \& Colitis Foundation of America as the Charity of the Year for 1998 and the Autism Society of America as the Charity of the Year for 1999.

Each organization will receive a grant of $\$ 100,000$ from the Charity Foundation.

Carol Sanders, president of the Charity Foundation, said the decision to do separate grants is a departure from past practice, which was to select a Charity of the Year for two years running and award $\$ 100,000$ to the same organization for both years.
"We feel we will get to cover more causes that people would like to support," Sanders said.

The grant to the Crohn's \& Colitis Foundation was sparked by the fact that four prominent ACBL members suffer from Crohn's disease. The grant to the Autism Society was made in honor of John and Sandra Potter of Florida. Their granddaughter has been diagnosed as autistic.

The CCFA, founded in 1967, is the only national voluntary, non-profit organization in America devoted solely to research into the causes and treatments of inflammatory bowel disease, including Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis

The foundation has awarded grants to the foremost IBD researchers in the U.S. and abroad and has nurtured the careers of gifted young investigators.

Digestive diseases rank as the third highest cause of hospitalization after pregnancy and cardiovascular disease.

The Autism Society of America is the largest and oldest organization representing people with autism, a developmental disability first identified in 1943. The disease has a wide-ranging impact on language, motor skills, emotions and behavior. It is often devastating for the people who have it and for their families.

The disease, a life-long disability with no cure and no fully effective treatment, is believed to have a genetic link. It affects 15 of every 10,000 individuals.

The Autism Society was founded in 1965 and now has 220 chapters in 48 states

The Charity Foundation officers are Sanders, president; Jim Zimmerman, vice president; Virgil V. Anderson Jr., Joan DeWitt McKean and Glenn Smith. Don Moeller is secretary-treasurer.

## Quiet winner

In an era when it seems that aggressive bidding is very much in vogue, Jeff Wolfson earned a key swing for his squad in the Grand National Teams by recognizing that silence can be golden. Wolfson was playing with Neil Silverman against Curtis Cheek and Hjordis Eythorsdottir.

There was a similar auction at the other table, and East doubled the 5 response to Blackwood. The success of the slam comes down to a guess in diamonds, and assuming declarer does not intend to play West for specifically $\bullet$ Q x, East must hold the A Q or $\uparrow \mathrm{Q} 10$ for the slam to be makeable. The double at the other table, therefore, gave away the show, and $6 \vee$ made.

At Wolfson's table, Cheek did not have a double of $5 \star$ to guide him, so he mentally placed the $A$ on his left and thus played a diamond to the 8 , swinging 17 IMPs to the District 9 team, which won the event.

If Cheek had made $6 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, his counterpart would have gone down, so the swing on the board amounted to 34 IMPs, more than the margin of victory.

The Michaels auction indicated that North very likely would be very short in diamonds, so Milgrim felt he couldn't afford the luxury of the leading the $\star$ A first. So he led the $\$$. But the plan didn't work because North, not South, had the $\approx K$.

But since he had all low diamonds in hand, Wold had no choice but to cross his fingers and call for the king in dummy. It held, of course. After the play finished, Wold turned to Milgrim to congratulate him on his well-considered opening leads. "With different layouts, you could have had me twice.'

Paul Perkowski, Denis Murphy, Bonnie Bagley and John Ledet are still basking in the glow of their victory in the Non-Life Master Swiss Teams, a nationally-rated event. Here's a hand from that event that they really enjoyed.

(1) Shows a one-suited hand
(2) Transfer to spades.

West led the $\vee \mathrm{K}$ and switched to a diamond when Ledet dropped the 10 on the king. Ledet won with the jack and immediately cashed his other top diamonds, pitching a club from dummy. As a result he lost only two top spades and two hearts plus a long spade at the end. Plus 470

On this deal from the second semifinal session of the Life Master Pairs, Joel Wooldridge of Williamsville NY should have been down four in 2 NT . After a defensive slip, he found a neat endplay to bring home his tenuous contract. Wooldridge was playing with Colin Lee of Toronto

On North's lead of the 9 , the defenders could have taken the first nine tricks $-\mathrm{A}, ~ 7$ to the 3 , queen and jack; spade to the ace and another heart through. If that had happened, there would be no story to tell.

In practice, South played the $\uparrow$, encouraging in the partnership's upside-down methods. Wooldridge won the $\uparrow K$ and played the $\uparrow J$, covered by the queen, king and ace. Belatedly, South switched to the $\vee 7$, taken by North's queen. North exited with the $\uparrow 8$, ducked by Wooldridge to his 10.A third spade to the 9 cleared the suit, and on the 13 th spade, South threw the $\uparrow 4$, Wooldridge the 10 and North a low heart.

Wooldridge then cashed the $\approx \mathrm{A}$, playing the 2 from his hand, and North had a chance to defeat the contract by playing the \&Q. He did not, however, and Wooldridge read the situation correctly by playing a low club from dummy and ducking. In with the $\star \mathrm{Q}$, North had nothing but hearts. He cashed the A and got out with a heart to Wooldridge's king. On the third round of hearts, South had to pitch a diamond or bare his \& J.

Reading the layout perfectly, Wooldridge played a diamond to South's ace and took the winning finesse in clubs at trick 12 , earning a fine score for plus 120 .

the U.S. in 1973 to attend college.
He earned an undergraduate degree at the University of Texas at Arlington and finished medical school at the University of Texas at Galveston. He did his residency in Detroit and was living in Salt Lake City when a job opened up in Erie nine years ago.

While the Tsengs were living in Salt Lake City, bridge came into their lives. Mary started lessons and, with some effort, finally convinced Francis to join her. He became a Life Master earlier this year.

Now, despite the demands of his job, he usually plays bridge two to three times a week, although he always wears a pager when he plays.

A couple of times a year, he is forced to rush away from a bridge game to help a woman give birth.

Tseng praised the ACBL Patron Member program, particularly the celebrity guest program. "This is a great thing you're doing -- giving people a chance to play with the big players." $\square$

## GNT-B, Non-LM Teams begin play today

Competition gets under way today in the Grand National Teams Flight B and the Non-Life Master Teams. Qualifications were earned in the grassroots event earlier this year.

Winners will have their names engraved on the Morehead Trophy, donated by The New York Times in memory of its longtime bridge editor Albert H . Morehead.

The trophy was originally awarded to the winners of a special knockout team event that followed the Reisinger team contest at the Fall NABC in 1967 but was withdrawn when the event proved unpopular

Since 1973 the trophy has been awarded to winners of the Grand National Teams

## Albert H. Morehead

Morehead (1909-1966) was born in Flintstone GA and educated at Baylor and Harvard. Ely Culbertson hired him in 1932 because of his outstanding ability as a player and analyst and made him technical editor of The Bridge World in 1933.

He proved so invaluable that in 1934 he was made general manager of all Culbertson enterprises. He was only 25 when he played on the Culbertson team that defeated the British in the second international match for the Schwab Cup.

Morehead was the first bridge editor of The New York Times with a Sunday column from 1935 and a daily column from 1959. He resigned from the Times late in 1963 to devote full time to writing, editing and publishing of the dictionaries, encyclopedias and thesauruses that made him one of the foremost American lexicographers.
During those years, Morehead found time for tremendous service to organized bridge. He was an officer of the United States Bridge Association when that organization amalgamated with the American Bridge League in 1937

He became a governor of the newly formed ACBL and served as president in 1943 and chairman of the board from 1943 to 1945 . He was named ACBL Honorary Member in 1946

Morehead was a member of the National Laws Commission and was in charge of production of the International Laws of Contract Bridge. He was also the author of the constitution of the World Bridge Federation -- the first formal definition of the scope, structure powers and duties of that organization.

Morehead was named to the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame in 1996.

Some insight into the man behind all this talent can be found in his obituary in the November 1966 issue of the Bulletin. Editor Dick Frey wrote:
"No one ever saw him lose his temper at the bridge table or heard him speak an unkind word to a partner He smiled often, but the only player he ever laughed at was himself.
"Rarely if ever did he turn down a plea for help. Writing this, I am proud to acknowledge the debt I owe him and to claim that he was my best friend. The secret of his greatness was that there are scores of others who will truly say exactly this of Albert Hodges Morehead.'

This deal from the first round of the Spingold was routine for Ralph Katz of Burr Ridge IL, but the handling of the trump suit provides a good lesson in technique.

Katz, South, had an awkward hand to bid. After opening a strong $2 \&$, he chose to show his sturdy fourcard spade suit first. This struck gold with a $4 \vee$ splinter raise, and the excellent slam was quickly reached.

West led the 9 to the 10 , jack and ace. Then Katz sailed the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 10$ as West played low. Next came the $\uparrow 9$, taken by West, who returned the $\$ 8$, covered and ruffed The A was followed by the $\approx 8$ to the king (note the unblock) and the last trump was drawn with the a J , making six.

It is important to note that if Katz won the $\boldsymbol{A}$ on the first or second round, he would have gone down. West would take his $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ on the third round and lead a fourth trump, denying declarer the one ruff he needs. If Katz took his ruff early (either a heart or a diamond) he would lose trump control with a subsequent diamond tap.

District 17 -- which sprawls from the snow-covered mountains of Colorado and Wyoming to the deserts of New Mexico and Arizona -- is ACBL's largest geographic district in the contiguous United States.

The district, which boasts more than 8600 members, includes all of Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado plus parts of Wyoming, Nevada (Las Vegas) and El Paso.

Three district residents have served as District 17 Director on the ACBL Board of Directors:

William A. Baldwin (1907-78) of Albuquerque NM, a building and land developer, was elected to the national board in 1965 when the League was redistricted.

As 1970 ACBL president, Baldwin was one of the persons most instrumental in relocating national headquarters to Memphis.

He served as president of the Western Conference, trustee of the ACBL Charity Foundation, chairman of the ACBL Board of Directors in 1971 and as ACBL representative to the WBF and treasurer of that body.

He was named ACBL Honorary Member of the Year in 1978.

Baldwin was succeeded by Chris H. Wilson of Phoenix AZ who served as a member of the ACBL

Board of Directors from 1977 to 1989. She was ACBL president in 1985 and chairman of the Board in 1986.

She was president of the Western Conference and Phoenix Unit for four terms each.

One of the founders of the District 17 Association in 1969, Wilson was a member of its Board and executive committee until 1989. She is a member of the ACBL Goodwill and Charity Committees and an adviser to the ACBL Educational Foundation.

Wilson served the longest term as president, presiding over four NABCs instead of three when the Board changed the term of the presidency.

She was chairperson of the 1971 Fall NABC in Phoenix.

Her successor, Robert O. Wingeard of Colorado Springs CO, is the assistant director of operations support, headquarters NORAD. He is a graduate of Purdue University.

A member of the ACBL Board of Directors since 1990, Wingeard served as president of the Western Conference 1983-84, District 17 1976-79 and Unit 360 1972-75 and 1988.

He has chaired serveral regionals and is a member of the ACBL Goodwill Committee and ACBL Charity Committee.

## Too many hearts

In the opening round of the Spingold, George Rapee and John Solodar were playing against a pair from California. On one deal, Rapee's right-hand opponent opened 1NT, and LHO bid $4 \star$, a Texas transfer. RHO dutifully bid $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$, which was followed by three passes.

Rapee made his opening lead and LHO was putting down the dummy in a deliberate manner. It seemed that heart after heart were being exposed on the table.

Rapee, apparently tired of the cascade of hearts coming out of his opponent's hand, looked at the gentleman and said, "Stop that! Put something over there (pointing to dummy's left)."
and Stuart followed with the 4, declarer bought into Stuart's shenanigans and inserted the 9 .

All of a sudden, on a contract where 13 tricks were available after a heart lead, East was down. Abdou won the jack and cashed the $v \mathrm{Q}$. The defenders still had the top two clubs coming. Plus 50 was worth nearly all the matchpoints.

West leads the $\diamond$ K. Plan the play.
To make $6 \boldsymbol{a}$ after a diamond lead, declarer must get the hearts going, discard a diamond before losing the lead and find spades 3-2. Hearts must also be 3-2 (or the singleton queen with East) since you will have only one dummy entry after playing the top spades and hearts.

Your choice in hearts is to finesse opener for the queen or bang down the $\vee \mathrm{A}$ and $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$. Finessing gains only against $\vee \mathrm{Q} \times$ x with West since you need five heart winners (assuming West has the $\& \mathrm{~A}$ ). Playing the top hearts works when either opponent has the doubleton queen -- that's eight cases among the 3-2 splits (four each for East and West) versus six cases of $\vee \mathrm{Q} \times \mathrm{x}$ with West only.

Actually, if East falsecards with the Q from a holding of Q-10 doubleton, prompting declarer to play East for 2-1-3-7 shape (the only distribution consistent with West's opening of $1 *$ rather than $1 *$ ), declarer will gain in only seven cases versus six but will make the contract when hearts are $4-1$ with West holding four to the 10 . Declarer loses $3.4 \%$ but adds $11.2 \%$.

The correct play, then, is A, A. If East plays the $\checkmark$, declarer plays the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ and a spade to the ace, followed by a heart to the 9 , the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, throwing a diamond, and then run hearts until West ruffs.

If East plays a low heart, declarer cashes the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, if the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ drops, then declarer plays the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$, a spade to the ace, the $\vee \mathrm{J}$, pitching a diamond, and claims.

Finally, if the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ does not drop, it is important to maintain a calm and unruffled exterior. You will still make your slam is East had two hearts and any three spades. Just lead a heart. If East discards, ruff, play the $\checkmark$ A, spade to the king and run hearts, later taking a ruffing finesse for the A. If East ruffs with the 9, 10, jack or queen, declarer discards his diamond and prays that East started with three spades originally.

"I like my Summer NABCs," Gokavi said.
Tuesday night, Gokavi and 15 -year-old Sasha Jacobs of New York City were working the Spingold Knockout Teams and using a system they invented for moving boards that saves time and keeps the players happy.
"They never have to call a caddy," said Gokavi. "And," said Jacobs, "we get an hour break."

Ben Bausher, 17 , was preparing to caddy the midnight game by himself. Utterly undaunted -- "It's usually only 16 tables," he said -- the Hamden CT youngster is a true veteran. He's been a caddy since he was 8 .

## Kaplan, master of the microphone

Edgar Kaplan has long been noted as a vugraph commentator. Here's a sampling from the 1980 Olympiad in the Netherlands:

- I don't know what North was thinking of doing, but it's just as well he didn't.
- That's unfair. North-South were just having a good time and suddenly East-West turned nasty and doubled.
- Four hearts is a very good bid -- but on some other hand.
- This is a contract that would be justified only by success -- and I have a feeling it will not be.
- West passed, hoping his partner would double, but that was too much to hope for in this world. It will happen all the time in the next world.
- They make a game. It wasn't a good game but still they won't give it back on that account.
- He may bid and he may not. I believe that covers all possibilities.
- When in doubt, put the opponents on lead. Why should you make the mistakes?
- He's preserving his options to misguess the diamonds.
- In order to let the contract make, the defenders must lead a spade. No other line of play succeeds.
- The first duty of a contract is to make. If it doesn't make, that's a major flaw.
- South's bid implied: I have four spades, four hearts, six clubs and the rest are diamonds.
- Somebody said down one is good bridge. Making is perhaps better.
- Some people bid three notrump over their partner's three-level suit bids on the theory that it's more dignified to go down in game.
- To teach the opponents not to preempt against you, you must not only double them, you must also beat them.
- I don't think anyone in this tournament can bid diamonds to show diamonds. We lost the club suit in the 1950s. Now diamonds are gone and hearts are sinking fast.
- Now his three diamond bid shows a singleton diamond. When he rebids diamonds, it will confirm a singleton diamond.
- East is wondering why he didn't pass one spade. So am I.
- East-West can make a singular number of hearts but not a plural number.

From the 1981 Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup, played in Port Chester NY:

- It seems to me you should be able to make more in an eight-card fit than in a five-card fit. There's no justice in this world.
- The best one can say for this contract is that it has not yet gone down.
- Defenders hate to lead suits they have bid -- they like to surprise the declarer.
- Either team can make three notrump so long as they have the opening lead.

And from the 1983 Bermuda Bowl in Stockholm:

- The modern fashion in cuebids is not to show anything in particular but to cast a rosy glow over the whole auction.
- Declarer led the ace of trumps and it held. So now he must reconsider his options.
- As you can see, neither pair had any difficulty reaching their 19-point game. The difficulty will come in the play.
- There are three right plays in bridge -- what's correct on analysis, what works and what I would do.
- North obeyed the old rule -- if you can't follow suit, follow color.
- An exchange between commentators Kaplan and Jean Besse.

Besse: Well, you must do a lot of things before you can endplay East.

Kaplan: Yes, but that's your job, Jean If you don't want to do a lot of things, you must stay in Switzerland.

- No swing on a board that was touch and go at both tables. It touched and went.
- When partner asks for help in a side suit and you respond positively with three small, it is an insult to your partner. And if he's well-built and hefty, it is a poor idea to insult him.
- I think this hand should be played the way my mother would play it -- take your nine tricks. (When this is what declarer actually did, Edgar remarked, "Yes, he's playing it the maternal way.")
- I know people who could go down on this hand, but I don't believe any of them are here.
- The only Americans who would get to six hearts on that hand are sitting in the audience, so no fear.
- As long as the king is in the same place at the other table, you don't have to worry. It's when the king jumps from the West hand to the East hand that you must be concerned.
- To equal the result in the other room, he needs 16 overtricks.
- It's a question of intent: if you have a problem, you must think. If you hesitate to fool your opponent, that is unethical. If your heart is pure, your ethics are unsullied.
- North doubled four hearts to tell himself what to lead.
- He has left himself no flexibility. He can no longer go down.
- The Closed Room is playing faster than the Open Room. They have easier hands in there
- It is well-known that in third seat, you must have 13 cards to open the bidding.
- The number of players who enjoy doubling the opponents into game can be counted on one toe.
- It does seem a little hard to sit here criticizing a man who has just collected 1100 .

## Dbl All Pass

(1) Break in tempo

The Facts: 6 doubled went down two, plus 300 for $\mathrm{E} / \mathrm{W}$. At North's third turn to bid, he considered his alternatives for 15-25 seconds before doubling. The players all agreed to the length of the break in tempo. East called the Director immediately after North doubled. After
establishing the facts, the Director allowed play to continue. At the completion of play, E/W called the Director and asked him to determine if pass was a logical alternative to the $6 v$ bid. After consulting with other Directors, the Director returned and ruled that pass was a logical alternative. The decision to bid $6 \vee$ may have been influenced by the length of time that elapsed prior to the double. The Director changed the contract to 5 a doubled made five, plus 650 for E/W.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling All four players appeared before the Committee South explained that their partnership agreement was to play intermediate strength jump overcalls. He stated he had to make a simple overcall with his possibly defenseless hand. South noted his partner was a passed hand and North made no five-level cuebid to show a strong raise to $5 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$. Since South judged that it was unlikely that North had three defensive tricks, he deemed it prudent to pull the double.

E/W stated that South's hand may not be defenseless, and that South may have considered passing had North doubled in tempo.

The Committee Decision: The Committee conceded that South's arguments were thoughtful and well reasoned, yet fell short of persuasive. On the actual hand, if East's red suits were reversed, passing the double would have been the winning action. Since passing was a logical alternative for South, the likely result of that contract was assigned. The Committee changed the contract to $5 \boldsymbol{A}$ doubled made five, plus 650 for $\mathrm{E} / \mathrm{W}$.

There was no sentiment among the Committee members that South had unethically taken advantage of the unauthorized information transmitted by North's hesitation.

The Facts: 5 doubled went down one, plus 100 for N/S. The Director determined that West considered his action for 20 to 30 seconds after South bid $4 \boldsymbol{4}$. After consultation, the Director ruled that unauthorized information was present and that pass was a logical alternative for East. The Director changed the contract to $4 \uparrow$ made four, plus 420 for N/S.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. East stated that she did not raise diamonds at her first opportunity because the opponent's may not have bid game. East decided that the sacrifice of 5 was indicated by her hand. She stated the slow tempo of her partner's pass did not influence her choice of actions.

The Committee Decision: The Committee decided that there had been a break in tempo and that unauthorized information was present. The Committee applied Law 16 which mandates that the Committee examine the logical alternatives that East had to choose from and preclude any action that could demonstrably have been suggested by the presence of the unauthorized information. The Committee decided that the tempo break could have suggested the 5 bid and that pass was a logical alternative. The Committee imposed the pass on East and changed the contract to $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ made four, plus 420 for N/S. The Committee did not believe that East had been consciously influenced by the unauthorized information.
