Baze captures Board-a-Match



New LM requirement

Effective Jan. 1, 1999, new members will be required to earn 50 black points in conjunction with existing requirement to become a Life Master.

This means that to become a Life Master it will be necessary to win 300 points, 50 of which must be black, 50 of which must be silver, and 50 of which must be red (of the red points, at least 25 must be gold).

The purpose of the new requirement is to make sure new players earn a certain percentage of their points at club games.




Did South do anything wrong?

In the first round of the Senior Knockout Teams, Ken Barbour was West and I was East in the following layout:

A diamond was led and ducked to the king. East returned the $\clubsuit Q$, seriously damaging South's communications. South won with the ace and played the top hearts. He then cashed the $\spadesuit A$ and led a fourth heart, leaving West on lead in this position:



West could have led the ♠K, providing for a singleton honor in the South hand, but that seemed unlikely. He did the best he could to deal with the actual layout by leading the ♠9. This was covered with the 10 and jack, and when the queen was led South could not escape defeat.

We were pleased with our defense. But could South have done better? See page 6.

Working overtime

The defense was working overtime here against a heart contract.

Dlr: South **♠** A J 8 7 Vul: N-S **♥** Q 10 **♦** J 8 97543 **♠** 3 ♠ K 10 9 4 2 **♥** K 5 3 2 **♥** J 9 8 6 ♦ K 9 4 3 2 **♦** A 10 ♣ K 10 6 ♣ A Q **♥** A 7 4 ♦ Q 7 6 5 ♣ J 8 2

In one room East-West stopped in 3♥ and South led a low diamond. Declarer should have won the diamond in hand, but in fact he went up with the ◆K and played a spade. North ducked his ace, and declarer misguessed by putting in the 10. South won the queen and shifted to a low heart, declarer ducking again. The defense played two more rounds of trumps, and declarer was a trick short.

In the other room the contract was 4∇ , not 3∇ , and South kicked off with an incisive low trump lead. Declarer ducked, and the defense got three rounds of trumps in. Now declarer needed 3-3 diamonds, and when that failed he wound up with only eight tricks.

Of course if declarer hops with the ∇K at trick one, he can block the hearts (and who underleads the ♥Q at trick one?) He can play on spades (or perhaps even on diamonds) with impunity. The defense can't lead two rounds of trumps without sacrificing a natural winner, and East can set up a crossruff or a long card in spades or diamonds for his 10th winner.

Bob Rothlein Senior Stratified Pairs

Bob Rothlein did it all during his years with the ACBL. Winner of many regional and sectional events plus a victory in the Spingold in 1958, he capped his bridge career by leading the movement that resulted in the establishment of Unit 240 (Central Florida) in 1970 as an independent entity. He served as Unit 240's first president. He continued to supply bridge columns to the unit's publication until 1981. He also was teacher and mentor to many players.

Family and business considerations prevented Bob from ever pursuing bridge on the international level, but he remained a tough competitor for many years. His bidding style featured the lightest opening bids of any expert player of his era (11 HCP with at least a half a quick trick was enough by Bob's standards) and very light preempts. Actually his style was a precursor of today's modern bidding style.

Although he never seriously devoted himself to bridge after 1959 and seldom played in pair events after 1975, he remained a respected player. When Ira Corn was assembling his Aces team in the mid sixties, Bob was one of the players he flew in to Dallas to provide top-level practice competition for his team.

Bob's death a few years ago deprived Unit 240 of its founding father.

Computer bridge actions by Board

The following actions were made concerning computer bridge during their meeting here last week.

- Any on-line service that offers masterpoints must offer some type of mechanism for their players to file complaints if they sense there may have been ethical violations arising out of on-line bridge. These services must in some way investigate these complaints and report to ACBL. All such complaints and investigation results will be forwarded to the ACBL recorder. The recorder's function will be to oversee the disposition of these issues. The recorder will offer advice to the server only if it is requested. The recorder will make regular reports to the Board of Directors.
- The ACBL will co-host the 1999 ACBL Computer Bridge Championships with the World Bridge Federation. These games will be held at the next Bermuda Bowl, which will take place in Bermuda in January 2000.
- The ACBL recognizes points won at ACBL-sanctioned on-line events. Recognition of these points will be in the form of a new type of masterpoints. Special condi-

tions of contest will be drawn up for such events

• All masterpoints earned in on-line play will have no pigmentation.




An inch to a mile

Give Steve Robinson a chance for an extra trick, and you can bet he will take it. In fact, he managed a club trick with the singleton ♣Q opposite the ♣J 9. The deal occurred in the second qualifying session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams. Robinson's partner was Peter Boyd.

(1) Two controls: one ace or two kings.

East led a low heart, taken in dummy with the queen. Robinson played a spade to the queen, ace and 10. He followed with a diamond to the ace and a diamond ruff, spade to the 7 and a diamond ruff, then a spade to the 6 and a third diamond ruff, extracting all of the diamonds from both opponents. Robinson then ran trumps, reaching this position:




Robinson played the ♠2 and East, who could see an endplay looming, discarded the A. If East had thrown his low club, Robinson would have had an easy endplay with the ΦQ , forcing a heart return into Robinson's tenace. So when East unblocked clubs, Robinson cashed the ♥A, removing the 7 from West, and played the $\clubsuit Q$. West won with the $\clubsuit K$, but had only the ♣10 left to play to dummy's good jack. Plus 680 was good for a win.

Too many points

Everyone likes to hold hands with lots of highcard points. On this deal from the second qualifying session of the Life Master Pairs, Tony Forrester found himself wishing he could have given some of his high cards to Zia, his partner. Taking advantage of the lie of the cards in spectacular fashion was Al Childs of Little Rock. He was playing with Clay Hall of Birmingham AL.

Zia led a low club, taken by Childs with the ace. Childs cashed the ♥K, getting the good news in that suit, and came off dummy with a low spade. Forrester won the ΔK and got out with the ΔQ , taken by the king. Childs then pulled trumps ending in his hand --Forrester discarded diamonds on the second and third round of hearts -- and played the ♠Q. Forrester won the A and played a third round of clubs, ruffed by Childs, who then played his next to last heart, throwing a diamond from dummy. All of a sudden, Forrester no longer liked his hand, which was taking no more tricks. This was the position with Forrester still to dis-



Forrester could do no more than succumb to the trump squeeze. If he discarded a spade, both of dummy's spades would be good. If he let go a diamond, Childs could play a diamond to dummy's ace, dropping the king, pitch the low diamond on the ♠J, ruff a club back to hand and claim with the good ♦Q. If Forrester discarded a club, dummy would provide two discards for the diamonds in Childs' hand.

The overtrick was worth 43.5 out of 51 matchpoints.

Shawn Quinn, Petra Hamman and Peggy Sutherlin.

In second place, 1.09 behind the winners, were Susan Wexler, Margie Gwozdzinsky, Karen Barrett and Linda Lewis, four members of the winning squad in the Wagar Knockout Teams at the Summer NABC in Chicago. Team members said Kitty Munson and Carol Simon -- the missing Wagar teammates -- were honorary co-captains of the board-a-match squad.

After two qualifying sessions, the Radin team was tied for 9th through 13th. The squad roared ahead after the first final session, scoring 18.5 out of 26 (71%).

The victory was the second North American title for Moss, who won the Life Master Women's Pairs at the Fall NABC in St. Louis last year with Janice Seamon. Moss and Gail Greenberg finished fourth in the World Women's Pairs in Lille, France, last summer. Moss is the vice president of human resources and administration for the Blackstone Group, an investment banking firm in New York.

Moss's teammates are well known in the bridge world. Radin is a professional player and teacher with three world championships to her credit, including the inaugural McConnell Cup (women's knockout) at the World Bridge Championships in Albuquerque in 1994.

Breed was on the winning Venice Cup team in Hammamet, Tunisia, last year. Quinn recently graced the cover of The Bridge Bulletin for winning the World Women's Pairs title with Jill Meyers.

Hamman is a bridge teacher with one previous North American championship. Sutherlin has several major championships to her credit, and she owns a silver medal in the World Mixed Pairs.

Top players compete in Blue Ribbon Pairs

Play in the Blue Ribbon Pairs, considered by many the premier pair event on the ACBL calendar, begins today. Entry is restricted to winners and runners-up in regional championships -- plus high finishers in North American championships, members of current Grand National district championship teams, members of current official teams representing ACBL and the top 100 lifetime masterpoint holders.

The event is contested for the Cavendish Trophy, awarded for the National Open Pair Championship and donated by the Cavendish Club of New York in 1928. Since 1963, the trophy has been awarded to winners of the Blue Ribbon Pairs.

Dorothy Truscott and B. Jay Becker won the inaugural event in 1963 -- and Truscott remains the only woman win-

Bob Hamman has four wins, each with a different partner: Lew Mathe in 1964, Ron Von der Porten in 1986, Nick Nickell in 1991 and Michael Rosenberg in 1993.

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

Lair waited another 10 years before claiming his second title in 1994 with first-time partner Alexander Weiland.



Now THAT is bad luck!

What kind of result do you consider unlucky? I think our team generated a spectacular contender for the most unlucky result of the tournament on this deal from the second qualifying session of the Open Boarda-Match Teams..



Here's how the auction went in one room: West North East South Pass 1♠ 3♦ 3♥ 4♥ All Pass

There's no misprint -- South actually was the first to speak. That made 450 when the defense took their club ruff. In the other room:

North, knowing her side was likely to hold only one ace between them, nonetheless still led her stiff club. Think about this when this wins -- when the opponents have bid a slam off two aces, one of which is getting ruffed! And of course that was the case. But the error in duplication meant the fouled board rules had to be applied -- because in our room the board had been completely rotated. We still lost the board, however, since our result in this room was so poor that the "average" result from the other room was obliterated.

play. His team won the event, but the only credit he got was a listing as non-playing captain.

This time, you couldn't have gotten Whitman out of Orlando with a squad of Marines. Good thing, since his team -- Grant Baze, Fred Gitelman, George Mittelman and Brad Moss -- won the event by more than two boards.

The runners-up were Nick Nickell, Richard Freeman, Jeff Meckstroth, Eric Rodwell, Bob Hamman and Paul Soloway.

Whitman, owner of an investment partnership in San Francisco, was ecstatic. "This proves that Grant Baze is the greatest pro there is," Whitman said, reveling in his first North American championship. He came close during the summer, finishing second in the Spingold Knockout Teams in Chicago.

The victory was also the first for Gitelman, a fine player but perhaps best known for the software produced by Bridge Base Inc., his Toronto-based company. Gitelman's reputation as a player was solidified when he, Mittelman and their Canadian teammates finished second in the Bermuda Bowl in Beijing, China, in 1995. Mittelman is a former world champion (Mixed Pairs with Dianna Gordon in 1982).

Moss won his fourth North American championship. His previous wins were the Master Mixed Teams in 1991 and the Grand National Teams and Life Master Open Pairs in 1993.

Baze is one of the most successful bridge pros on the tour. He has hundreds of regional championships to his credit and several North American titles, including the Spingold in 1997. \square

Glossary of bridge terms, part 3

Rookie, masterpoints, stratified pairs -- these terms may be confusing to new members of the American Contract Bridge League. Here's a list of terms and their meanings:

Barry Crane Top 500 race: This trophy is presented to the ACBL player who wins the most masterpoints during a calendar year. Originally the McKenney Trophy, it was put into play by William E. McKenney, ACBL executive secretary. It was known as the *McKenney Trophy* from 1937 to 1981.

The list was expanded to include the top 500 players in 1982 and called the *Top 500* from 1982 to 1985. It was renamed the *Barry Crane Top 500* in 1986.

Crane, who was murdered in July 1985, was ACBL's top masterpoint holder at that time and was acknowledged by his peers to be unequalled as a masterpoint winner and a matchpoint player.

Mini-McKenney races: In 1974 the ACBL Board of Directors voted to recognize masterpoint achievements among players below the rank of Life Master. *The Bridge Bulletin* recognizes leaders ACBL-wide. At the unit level, winners in each category receive recognition and special medallions.

All points won during a calendar year are counted in these races.

Ace of Clubs contests: This competition was created in 1984 to recognize achievement at the club level. Winners are recognized at the unit level as well as ACBL-wide.

Points won only at the club level -- excluding the North American Open Pairs, the Grand National Teams and Sectional Tournaments at Clubs -- are counted in these races.

Silver Life Master: 1000-2500 points
Gold Life Master: 2500-5000 points
Diamond Life Master: 5000-10,000 points
Grand Life Master: 10,000 points and a North
American Bridge Championship or its equivalent

Youth: age 19 and younger Junior: age 25 and younger

Sectional: points won only at sectional tournaments

Senior: 55+ years, points won only in Senior events

Richmond Trophy: awarded to the Canadian player who wins the most points in a calendar year.

Martin said. Then after recovering from the initial shock, she told Osofsky to tell the crowd, "Have fun and play bridge."

Several persons close to Martin were present, including her daughter and son-in-law, Mym and Clay Young. Also present were two of the persons who wrote letters suggesting Martin as Goodwill Member of the Year -- Dorothy Corbett and Janie Judy.

The best way to tell why Martin was selected for this honor is to listen to what her friends had to say.

Martin was nominated by Corbett, who also lives in Greenville. When informed that her nominee had been chosen, Corbett said, "Miriam is the personification of Goodwill, an extremely wonderful individual. She gives of herself to everything. If you were to write down everything you ever wanted in a person, this is the person you would get!"

In her nominating letter, Corbett said that Martin has devoted her life to the bridge people in eastern North Carolina. Martin has been a duplicate bridge director for 50 years. When she taught the Faculty Wives Club at East Carolina University back in the Forties and Fifties, she was paid, but she always returned the money, Corbett reported.

She started with a Wednesday evening game, but later she opened a Wednesday morning game for players she had taught so they could get their feet wet before going into the "big game." Then she started a Saturday game to make it easier for working people and students to play.

She tries to give her players every opportunity to play in the special games, and she stratifies so that every player has a reasonable chance to win some masterpoints. She also volunteers to direct all kinds of special games. She has directed countless special games in Wilson, Tarboro, Washington and Goldsboro. During all these activities her husband George is always by her side carrying the heavy boards, arranging the tables, taking care of the bid boxes, etc.

"Miriam is gifted with a warm, hospitable personality," said Corbett. "Everyone feels welcome at her games. She makes the effort to remember the name and something about anyone that ever attends one of her games. And she always guarantees a partner. I do not have the wordsmith skills to describe a person who always knows when a friend is sick or needy and is always there for them. The bridge world could not have a better ambassador than Miriam Martin."

Bruce Southard of Greenville, in a separate letter, seconded what Corbett had to say. "Miriam Martin epitomizes the spirit of hard work embodied in thousands of ACBL members at the local level." He also points out how much Martin has done to help with local games other than her own. "And she charges no fee for these services," Southard wrote.

He went on, "After a hiatus from bridge for about 12 years, I decided to attend the local game. Mrs. Martin greeted me with her usual warmth, assured me she'd find me a partner, and generally made me feel as if I were a long-standing member of the local club. She makes both the novice and the experienced player feel at home in the games she directs."

Janie Judy of Lexington KY also took pen in hand to tell about Martin. "I lived in Wilson NC from 1984 to 1989, and Miriam extended every courtesy to me. She always made me feel welcome at her games. Miriam is a lady in the real sense of the word, and she is an excellent choice for Goodwill Person of 1998.

Three close friends from among the Board of Directors -- Virgil Anderson, Joan Gerard and Barbara Nudelman -- took the podium together to talk about their friend Jayne. Anderson said he finds it difficult to imagine what it's going to be like without Jayne on the Board. Gerard said making friends with Jayne was the best decision she ever made during 12 years on the Board. She also called Jayne a great administrator. Nudelman characterized Jayne as "truly one of the most remarkable women in bridge.

Betty Grandoff, president of District 9, told of the outstanding achievements Jayne has accomplished for Florida. "When she took over we were floundering, but Jayne changed all that. We've had moments we'll treasure forever. We don't look on this as the end -- it's a beginning of something new." Grandoff also presented a framed painting to Jayne.

When Jayne took the podium she said, "I'm going to miss my friends on the Board, but I'm glad to be back in Florida full-time so I can go to work for Florida."

David Silber, CEO of ACBL, told the Goodwill Committee that new member retention is just as important as bringing in new members. He pointed out that only 55% of new members sign up for the following year. "We have to make new members feel extra special -- it's really important," he said. \square

Joan Remey Moore. Hascall defeated Bill Arlinghaus and Allan Falk for the three-year berth on the Board.

Hascall won the George Burns Trophy as Senior of the Year in 1994. He has won more than 10,000 points but is not yet a Grand Life Master -- he has not won a North American championship. He has had a couple of seconds, but no firsts.

He has served for many years on the Board of Governors and on his unit board. He also has been chairman of many regionals and is the tournament coordinator for Unit 195. He once owned and operated a steel company but now is retired.

"I plan to put a lot of emphasis on friendliness," said Hascall. "And we have to find new members. Not just that, but we have to find a way to bring back old members and keep our new members.

"Another thing -- we've got to get the message across that our clubs and units can get promotional money -- money that can help them get the message of bridge across in their area."

Answer to Did South do anything wrong?

In the ending South should not have wasted dummy's ♠10. He could have survived by winning the ♠A, cashing one heart (preferably not two) and leading a low spade.

But the main problem came in the original planning. South should have won the first trick with the •A and played hearts. This would have preserved his communications and guaranteed nine tricks, barring a terrible heart split. As it was, after winning the second trick, it would have been wise to cash the second club winner.

(1) Break in tempo

The Facts: 3NT made six, plus 690 for E/W. There was a clear break in tempo before West doubled 3♥. The Director ruled that the break in tempo suggested lack of penalty intent and also found that pass was a logical alternative for East. The Director changed the contract to 3♥ doubled made three, plus 730 for N/S.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. West and North attended the hearing. West told the Committee that East had a personal emergency that prevented his attendance at the hearing.

The tempo of the auction until the double of 2NT had been normal. Both sides agreed that the break in tempo was extended. West did not dispute North's statement that it was about one minute.



E/W were a first-time partnership with no understandings about

the meaning of the double of 2NT. West stated that she thought that passing 2NT and then doubling the correction would be for penalty and that doubling twice would have been non-penalty and strength. She stated that she thought that requiring East to pass the second double would be totally uncalled for. She also stated that E/W did not play support doubles beyond their suit at the two level.

North believed that it was fairly normal to double 2NT to show a desire to penalize at least one of the opponents, suits. He noted that if West were 1-4-4-4, 3♥ might go down several tricks. North stated that he thought passing (by East) was not only a logical alternative, it was the bid called for in this auction.

The Committee Decision: The Committee fully recognized West's right to take time to consider what to do in a difficult situation. However, East's options may have been limited when the hesitation suggested a line of action. Because the partnership had no agreement about the meaning of the first double, the remaining auction became very sensitive to any information which may have been conveyed by subsequent tempo breaks.

In this case, the Committee found that the non-penalty intent of the double of 3♥ was strongly suggested by the one-minute hesitation. Since a substantial minority (if not a majority) of East's peers would opt to pass the double, the Committee changed the contract to 3♥ doubled made three, plus 730 for N/S.

The Committee found this appeal to be without substantial merit. E/W were each issued an Appeal Without Merit Penalty Point.



The Facts: 4♠ doubled made four, plus 790 for N/S. N/S stated that during the auction the redouble was made after a minor break in tempo, and that the 4♠ bid was made after a major break in tempo. E/W disagreed that there was any tempo break before the redouble, but agreed there was an obvious tempo break before the 4♠ call.

The Director ruled that the table result be allowed to stand.



tended the hearing. N/S stated that both tempo breaks suggested West had spade support.

E/W stated that the redouble showed at least a spade tolerance, and therefore it was the redouble that led to the $4 \triangleq$ bid, not the break in tempo after $4 \spadesuit$.

The Committee asked West what he would have bid with short spades and a good hand. He admitted that he would have redoubled.

The Committee Decision: The Committee decided that the break in tempo before the redouble was not material. The Committee also decided that there was a significant break in tempo before the 4♦ bid and that E/W did not have the agreement that the redouble showed spade support.

The Committee determined that East's choice of bids after 4♦ were Pass, 4♠, and 5♦. The Committee further decided that the 4♠ bid was demonstrably suggested (Law 16A) over the other logical alternatives and, therefore, could not be allowed. The bridge judgment of the Committee was that Pass and 5♦ were equally likely after an in tempo 4♦ bid.

The Committee decided that the double of 4♠ was egregious enough to jeopardize N/S's right to full protection (the non-offending side must continue to "play bridge"). They considered allowing the table result to stand for N/S. However, South would have had a much easier decision had East passed 4♠ rather than correcting to 4♠. It was therefore decided to treat N/S as being (Law 12C1) "partially at fault" when adjusting their score.

The Committee awarded Average Minus to E/W (the offenders) and Average to N/S (the non-offenders.)



Board-a-match does strange things to people. Sometimes the best of results gets lost in the shuffle. Look at the following deal from the evening qualifying session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams..

Dan Gerstman reached the awkward spot of 4♠ after this auction:

West	North	East	South

The defense led two rounds of diamonds. Gerstman ruffed the second and played the **V**K. The defense won and played a trump, so Gerstman racked up 420 easily enough. As you can see, 4**V** would have been easier, since South has only three diamonds, so the the defense can't make more than two forces, and can collect only two hearts and one diamond trick.

But the defense could have done better. North should duck the $\forall K$ -- not easy to do -- then win the next heart and lead a third diamond. Declarer can just ruff with the king, cash the $\triangle A$ and cross to hand in clubs to lead the $\triangle 10$. South wins the $\triangle Q$ and leads a third heart, ruffed by North with the 7 to promote South's $\triangle 9$ for the setting trick.

So how would plus 50 have scored compared to minus 420? It would have been a loss! At the other table North overcalled 1♥ with an intrepid 1NT to show 15-18 (well, near enough), silencing everyone and collecting plus 90.
