Richard Goldberg

Richard L. Goldberg of Nashville, 76, chief executive officer of the American Contract Bridge League from 1971 to 1984, died of a heart attack at his home on Sunday, March 7. He was 76.

Goldberg was a major figure in North American and world bridge for many years. At the world level he was a member of the Committee of Honor of the World Bridge Federation (WBF). He served the WBF as treasurer and finance officer from 1981 to 1990. He was elected a member of the WBF Executive Committee in 1972 and served on that board until 1984.

At the North American level, Goldberg began his career as a tournament director in 1959, rising to national tournament director in 1961. The ACBL drafted him for work as tournament division head in the New York City office in 1963, and he switched to Greenwich CT when the ACBL moved away from New York City. In 1965 he became assistant to Alvin Landy, the executive secretary. He served in this post under Landy and later under Easley Blackwood until he took over as chief executive officer in 1971.

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Bagpipes, Mounties and the Governor — an impressive start for tournament

What a spectacular opening ceremony! First came the bagpiper, then two Mounties, then The Honourable Garde Gardom, lieutenant governor of British Columbia. The players competing in Hall A had just finished duplicating the boards when they heard the unmistakable bagpipe sounds. Everyone rose to his feet and started clapping in rhythm with the bagpipes as the official entourage entered the playing room.

Phil Wood, the longtime Mr. Bridge of the Northwest, introduced the governor, who immediately told a story about his old friend Phil. It seems Phil sold a house to the governor for \$26,500 some 40 years ago. Four years later, he sold the house, taking a \$5,000 loss. Today that house is assessed for \$1,300,000. "It's clear why Phil and I didn't become businessmen," he said.

The governor welcomed the crowd in the name of the Queen, Canada and the province of British Columbia. "We extend a big, friendly, Western welcome to all those who are making their first trip to Canada," he said. "Our province has lots of room for lots of people with lots of opportunities. We're big -- the only American state that's bigger is Alaska."

He even told the players a brief history of how the West came to be the way it is. He talked about Captain George Vancouver, who claimed the Western coast in 1792. The area was called New Caledonia at the time. Then the area was divided up, with Washington and Oregon going to the United States and British Colum-

He was frequently enlisted to play with Bruce "Superstar" Ferguson as part of the Clarence Goppert team. He helped that team to victory in one of the first NABC Swiss Team Championships. Jim was a great card player and a great partner. He combined incredible skill with outstanding conduct and ethics. The void he left has not been filled.

Burnaby Bridge Club — This club is owned and operated by popular Hazel Dressler who has been in the bridge club business for many years. It runs games locally at the Willingdon Community Centre on Mondays and Tuesdays. Hazel's games are fast, friendly and fun!

Great Bridge Links — Great Bridge Links (http://www.cbf.ca/GBL) is a web site dedicated to gathering, sorting and presenting links to "Everything that's bridge on the Internet today." James Griffin and Kenneth Schutze won their third NAOP-A title earlier this week and the Texans, who represented District 16, are still surprised by the results.

"We did our best to give it away," said Griffin. "We didn't have a good last round."

Regardless, the Texans became the only pair to record three wins in the event -- they also won in 1993 and 1994.

Griffin was pleased with an auction in the second qualifying session that led to a grand slam. He also jokingly commended Schutze -- "he remembered not to go set."

Schutze got the \bigstar K lead, cashed the \bigstar A K and led a third club. West, hoping to effect an uppercut, ruffed with the \bigstar J. Schutze overruffed, played a diamond to dummy and ruffed another club. He drew trumps and led a heart to dummy's ace. Now he cashed dummy's long club, pitching his losing spade.

Plus 2140 was good for 24 of 25 matchpoints.

The diamond bid, which promises only two, worked well on Board 25 from the second final session.

North-South have a 10-card diamond fit, but how do you suggest they get into the auction?


North led a low diamond to South's ace and he continued with the ϕK , ruffed by Schutze. He played a spade to dummy's queen and led the ΨQ . North won the ΨA and cashed the ΔA .

Now Schutze could win any return, pull the last trump and give up a trick to the ♥K. Plus 140 was "a little lucky," he conceded.

Jabon determined

Joe Jabon recalls a time, in the late Fifties and Sixties, when bridge was a more gracious game and both players and the atmosphere were more formal. After Mixed Pairs events at sectionals, players would attend a dance. Joe, feeling some entertainment would be welcome, exploited the possibility of producing a show. The Jabon Players were born.



Their first effort was a panel show, followed by a Shakespearean spoof and later by "Snow White and the Seven IMPs". Jabon wrote most of the material then, and he directed and financed productions as well. "They always ended up costing me money," he noted, "but I didn't care."

In 1967 the Nationals were held in Seattle and Barry Crane and Peter Rank were observed in attendance at "My Fair Partner." This show was later adapted by Rank for production on the West Coast.

Joe found others to direct, but the fervor cooled down somewhat until the advent of Karaoke. Before this, live music was provided by a piano player. The shows were revived with a production of "Phantom (of the Tournament)" in the Nineties. The Jabon Players became Seattle's Only Bridge Burlesque at about the same time.

When asked about long-range plans for the group, Joe remarked that putting together a show of this sort is very time-consuming and an all-volunteer undertaking. He wants to see talented younger players become involved, both performing and writing, and he would like to become better known nationally, perhaps by forming a small troupe of eight to ten players who would travel. Joe is determined to keep the group alive. He prefers that the show have a theme and something "else"— a bridge book, satire— he was unable to be specific.

Jabon's signature number has become "My Way." When asked why he chose this song he mentioned his great admiration for Sinatra. "I'm jealous of him, too," Joe said, "but I respect his talent."

We respect yours too, Joe, and hope you have it "your way" for years to come.

Bid Box Alerts

When using bid boxes, ACBL requires players to tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time. When making an announcement, use the announcement word -- such as "transfer" -- and tap the Alert strip at the same time. A player who Alerts or announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or announcement has been made.


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In the balance

I was wandering around the playing room checking out playing conditions when I met Jay Stiefel. Jay needed a partner to fill in for a few deals but it turned into a full evening of bridge. I had a great time, even though we lost our knockout match.

This was the most challenging pair of deals:



Our teammates preempted themselves to 3\(\frac{1}{2}\) and ran into a vicious crossruff for minus 300. At our table:



Defending 2♦ was not easy. The trump lead looked like a good start for the defense and East won the ♦A to continue the suit. Declarer, John Turner, guessed right to duck and ran the ♣Q to East's king.

East shifted to the \$\Delta 9\$, covered by the 10 and won by the jack. West was dead: whatever he did, declarer could scramble plus 90 for a 9-IMP gain. Playing either major would give up a trick or a tempo -- or both.

Of course, there is a more challenging defense: East can duck the ♣Q but if declarer can now find the spectacular counter of exiting with a heart honor, pitching a spade from dummy, he can still make his contract. West is endplayed at once. The best he can do is play a club, since leading either major suit gives up the eighth trick.

Declarer takes the \clubsuit A, ruffs a club, ruffs a heart (West unblocking the $\blacktriangledown 10$) and leads the fourth club, ruffed and overruffed as West pitches a spade honor. This is the ending:

With six tricks already in, declarer can exit with the $\triangle 10$ and now he must collect two more tricks. West can win (as East throws the $\triangle 9$) and play the $\forall A$, but South pitches a spade from dummy and survives.

This defense was equally challenging:

Playing normal leads and signals, you lead the ◆10 to dummy's queen. A spade goes to declarer's king and declarer now leads a club to dummy's king. Partner plays the ♣7 and completes an echo on the next club.

You win your ♣A and must resist the temptation to set up partner's heart suit. Best is to return a diamond and declarer, who has a singleton, will throw you in with the fourth diamond. Now you exit with the ♥K and partner will eventually come to two heart tricks to beat the contract. Leading the ♥K at once does not work, as Mike Aliotta capably demonstrated:

On the ∇K play, Mike took the ace and returned the suit. East could win the ∇Q , felling declarer's 10, and exit with a heart. But Mike cashed all of dummy's red-suit winners, then threw East in with the fourth heart. East was forced to play a spade and all the defense could collect were two hearts and the two black-suit aces.

Harold Franklin

Harold Franklin of Great Britain, retired chief tournament director for the World Bridge Federation, died in January at his home in England. He was 83.

Franklin was remembered by Jaime Ortiz-Patino, WBF President Emeritus, as "one of the most active and influential figures in European bridge during the 40 years after World War II. He was the leading tournament director in England and Europe and later made his mark at the world level. Harold became a byword for authority, impartiality and integrity."

Franklin retired as WBF chief tournament director in 1986.

ing his first year as head man of North American bridge. The board of directors voted to move ACBL headquarters from Greenwich CT to Memphis. The task was completed in December, 1972, with headquarters set up in a new building erected strictly for ACBL business at 2200 Democrat Road in the Nonconnah area. The ACBL since has moved to 2990 Airways Boulevard.

Goldberg was named ACBL Honorary Member in 1994. He also was a member of the ACBL Laws Commission and the ACBL Goodwill Committee. He was a good bridge player, achieving the rank of Life Master with several regional championships to his credit. He retired as CEO in 1984 and moved shortly thereafter to Nashville, where he was born and where he earned a bachelor of science degree in engineering at Vanderbilt University. He worked as a civil engineer for 15 years before turning to bridge as a player and then as a director.

After announcing his retirement, Goldberg said his most satisfying moments in bridge came during his time as a director. "Then I was working directly with the members," Goldberg said, "and there is no substitute for being around people, understanding them, talking to them."

Goldberg leaves his wife, Frederica (Freddie), of Nashville; his son, Richard Goldberg Jr. of Plano TX; two daughters, Mrs. Joan Conroy of Nashville and Geraldine Goldberg of Arcata CA, and six grandchildren.

Tributes

Roy G. Green, former CEO, recalled Goldberg as "a wonderful human being who left his mark on the American Contract Bridge League. The people who worked with him loved him and respected him as an outstanding leader and a friend."

Tommy Sanders of Nashville, former ACBL president and former District Director of District 10, remembered Goldberg as "my friend for 50 years -- we were always close. He always gave me encouragement when I was on the Board of Directors. I loved him like a brother."

Henry Francis, whom Goldberg hired as editor of *The Bridge Bulletin* in 1972, recalls Goldberg as one of his closest friends. "I never worked for Dick -- we always worked together. He was one of the kindest men I ever knew. His son said it best at the funeral services: 'He was a gentleman and a gentle man.'"


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Playing for the Canadian team were Gavin Wolpert, 16; David Grainger, 18; Mike Nadler, 25, and Steve Lariviere, 25.

Both are members of the Canada 1 Junior team that will compete in the World Junior Championships in Fort Lauderdale FL August 9-18. Nadler runs the Doubles Bridge Club in Toronto.

Wolpert, once Canada's youngest Life Master, and Lariviere are on the Canadian team that will compete in trials to determine the fourth team to represent North America in the World Junior Championships. So far two U.S. teams and one Canadian squad have qualified. The fourth will be either a U.S. or a Canadian

Here is one of the hands that helped the Juniors in their victory:



West led the ♠K and continued with a spade, ruffed by Lariviere. He cashed a high diamond and noted that with the fall of West's ◆J, he now had two entries to dummy.

Lariviere led the ♣Q and West won his king. He was now endplayed: a spade lead would give Lariviere a sluff and ruff, a heart lead would be into declarer's A-Q and a club lead would also help declarer.

Eventually West got out with the ♣10, won by East who shifted to a diamond. Declarer let that ride around to dummy's 9 and led a low heart: 3, 8, jack.

West was again endplayed: the same situation applied in spade, hearts and clubs. Eventually West got out with a heart into declarer's A-Q. Lariviere won his queen, cashed the ♥A and ruffed a heart. He conceded a club trick for down two and minus 300.

That was good for an 8-IMP pickup since North-South at the other table, Nadler-Wolpert, were allowed to play 4♠ and scored plus 650.

Henry Baer

Henry Baer of Dallas, executive secretary of District 16 (Texas and Mexico), died early this month.

Baer was a major force in Texas bridge. He and Mary Williams drew up the District 16 bylaws back in the Sixties. As executive secretary he controlled the district's money matters, served as a clearing house for tournament sanctions, and was in general a liaison and mediator.

Born in Germany in 1930, he and his family moved to Belgium in 1939 and then to Dallas a year later. He learned to play bridge while a student at Southern Methodist. He continued to play bridge while in the Army from 1955-1957. While serving in Germany, he decided to play in the German Nationals, but he was denied the right unless he produced his birth certificate. Although he was a naturalized American citizen, according to German law he retained German citizenship as well and therefor he was qualified to play.

After his Army days he opened a law practice in Dallas while continuing to devote his free time to playing bridge. He became a Life Master in 1958. Some of his favorite partners were Joe Musumeci, John Fisher, Emma Jean Hawes, Lorand Tritter, Jim Jacoby, Big John Emery and Gloria Reysa.

As an attorney, Baer represented Marina Oswald and Benji, the dog.

Baer had been in bad health for several years and had not been playing actively. He retired from the law firm in 1997 but continued as District 16 executive secretary. Over the past two years he played OKBRIDGE from his bedside.

He received a major honor in 1993 -- the Oswald and Jim Jacoby Service Award in recognition of his invaluable service to bridge and the district.

Zero Tolerance — one year later

At last year's NABC in Reno, tournament director Pat Jackson was using the positive approach as she made her opening announcement about Zero Tolerance.

"OK folks," she said. "This is the stock market. The person across from you is your stock. It depends on how you treat your stock ..."

"SELL!" came a voice from the rear.

To establish an atmosphere which promotes the enjoyment of bridge both as a competitive and a social game, the ACBL has adopted a policy of courteous behavior.

The ACBL stands for American Contract Bridge League. For tournaments to be fun, cooperation from all (players, organizers, officials, staff, volunteers) is necessary.

Please report conduct that is unacceptable while keeping in mind that we must be tolerant of other people in general -- and bridge players in particular. Also report conduct that is outstanding or refreshing.

Commendable behavior includes (but is not limited to):

- Being a good "host" or "guest" at the table.
- Greeting others in a friendly manner.
- Praising the bidding and/or play of the opponents.
- Having two clearly completed convention cards readily available to the opponents. This is also a regulation.
 - Unacceptable behavior includes (but is not limited to):
- Badgering, rudeness, insinuations, intimidation, profanity, threats or violence.
- Negative comments concerning opponents' or partner's play or bidding.
- Gloating over good results.
- Constant and gratuitous lessons and analyses at the table.
- Loud and disruptive arguing with a director's ruling.

If you experience someone exhibiting discourteous behavior or being other than civil, please call a tournament director immediately. If you feel that there was a very serious breech of discipline, in addition to the resolution by the tournament director at the table, please discuss the problem directly with the Directorin-Charge of the tournament.

Should it become necessary to call a tournament director, you may simply state: "This player is interfering with my enjoyment of the game."

The director will then attempt to determine the facts. If he establishes there was unacceptable behavior, an immediate 1/4-board disciplinary penalty (3 IMPs in team games) shall be assigned to all offenders.

This may involve any one or all four players at the table, regardless of who initiated the unacceptable behavior. If both members of a partnership are guilty, the penalties are cumulative (1/4 board each = 1/2 board or 3 IMPs each = 6 IMPs).

If it is determined that a second offense has occurred in the same event, the offender(s) shall be ejected from future competition in that event.

An offender removed from an event shall be deemed not to have played in the event, no masterpoints will be awarded and no refunds will be made.

In the case of a serious offense and in the case of multiple offenses (three) during a tournament, a disciplinary committee may determine whether the offender(s) should be allowed to play in other events at the tournament and/or whether additional sanctions may be appropriate.

Warnings are strongly discouraged and should be given only when there is no clear violation or in cases where the facts cannot be determined. Offenders are to receive immediate penalties. Regardless of who may have initiated unacceptable behavior, *all* offenses are punishable. Retaliatory behavior is a punishable offense. Frivolous accusations will also be considered as offenses under this policy.

ACBL's Junior Corps

The ACBL Junior Corps program is designed to serve as a showcase for young people and to attract them to the game of bridge. To be considered as a candidate, a Junior must meet the following criteria:

- Be 25 years of age or younger
- Have earned more than 100 masterpoints including at least one gold point
- Be willing to help promote the ideals of the ACBL Active Ethics Program
- Be active in his Unit and District in promoting bridge to other young people

Appeals process for non-NABC+ events

The ACBL Board of Directors, at their meeting in Orlando last year, approved a trial of an alternate bridge appeal method. As a result, tournament directors are hearing and resolving appeals from events other than NABC+ contests here in Vancouver. The procedure will be repeated in San Antonio at the Summer NABC. Nationally rated events with no upper masterpoint limit continue to be decided in the traditional manner.

The new process is designed so that players involved will be able to give facts to a reviewer immediately after the session in the playing area. Then they will be free to depart and do whatever else they wish.

The reviewer then discusses the case with knowledgeable players. The NABC Appeals Committee has provided a list of players willing to be consulted. These players offer input on the bridge judgment aspects of the situation.

All the input is then discussed with at least two other reviewers. The panel's decision is then communicated to the players involved as soon as possible. Any change in score is reported to the appropriate scorer.

Selected appeals cases (both these and those from NABC+ events) will be published in the Daily Bulletin at the tournament and in the Appeals Casebook at a later date.

The tournament director review panel for Vancouver and San Antonio is as follows: Olin Hubert, Ron Johnston, Charles MacCracken, Roger Putnam and Matt Smith.

In general, these directors will not make or consult about decisions in events from which they hear appeals. In the event that one of them becomes involved in a decision, he will have no involvement in any part of the appeal.

NABC returns to Vancouver after a 25-year absence

The Spring NABC has returned to Vancouver -- 25 years after Vancouver's first NABC drew 8329 tables, almost 1300 more than any previous NABC in the Pacific Northwest.

Here are highlights:

Canadians Joey Silver and Eric Kokish teamed up with brothers Bob and Dave Crossley to win the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams, defeating Kathie Wei-Sender's Precision squad, 148-118. Playing with Wei-Sender were Steve Goldstein, Ron Andersen, Merle Tom and Mark Feldman.

The Cinderella teams -- Silver was seeded #21, Wei-Sender #22 in the 64-team field -- defeated teams captained by John Simon (who had earlier beaten the Aces), Jimmy Cayne and others to reach the final.

Silver actually chose the opening lead against his own slam contract in a crucial deal from the final.

Silver's 2♣ was forcing to game and Kokish's 2♠ response was control-showing, indicating an ace and a king. The rest of the bidding was natural.

Andersen (West) had a major problem with his opening lead. He thought for a while, then got up and paced the floor before returning to his chair.

Silver playfully moved Andersen's cards around, selected one and said, "Why don't you lead this?"

Andersen looked at the card, thought a moment and led Silver's selection (the ♠6), saying, "All right, beat your own slam."

The lead gave Silver no help. He was hoping for a 3-3 split or a doubleton honor combination but the bad split made him look elsewhere for tricks. He was left with little choice but to play out the red cards, hoping for eight tricks, and seek some sort of endplay in clubs. He was halfway home when the ♥J dropped doubleton. After 10 tricks, dummy was left with the ♣A Q 10 and Andersen held the ♣K J 9.

Silver called for the queen. Andersen won his king but was forced to return a club. Silver finessed the 10 and claimed his slam.

The gain was 14 IMPs since the $6 \triangleq$ contract at the other table had no play as the cards lay.

Barry Crane and Dr. John Fisher not only won the Open Pairs title -- they walked away with it. Their margin of victory was more than three boards.

The win was their fourth in the event in the last five years.

Four streakers swept through the Mixed Swiss Teams, but they weren't allowed to play. They fulfilled most of the requirements -- there were two men and two women, none of them wearing revealing garments -- but they slipped up on one detail: they weren't wearing shoes.

When you need cooperation to set up an endplay, it usually pays to lay the groundwork early -- before your opponents have a chance to figure out what's going on.

Bob Hamman (South) won the ♣K opening lead with dummy's ace and immediately cashed the ♠A. Poor West didn't realize his ♠K was a close cousin of the albatross.

Like at least 99 out of 100 of us, West followed low and kept his king. Now Hamman cashed the $\P K$, ruffed his last club with dummy's $\P J$ and cashed the $\P A$, $\P A$ and $\P K$.

He exited with a low spade. West, left with only the ♠K and clubs, was forced to win the spade and lead a club. Hamman pitched dummy's losing diamond as he ruffed in his hand. Plus 680 was worth most of the masterpoints.

A woman playing in the Open Pairs was trying to pass the boards as the round was called, but she couldn't get the attention of the North next door. A man walking by said he'd take them -- and that's just what he

He walked out the door with Boards 19 and 20 and never came back.

Bob Hamman was asked which player has been the most helpful to the Italian team over the years. His reply: "It's close between Eric Murray and me."

When you give, you shall receive twofold ... maybe that's not how the Biblical expression goes, but Bernie Chazen and Norman Kurlander found that's how it works.



Helgemo to the Rescue by Rich Colker

Late in the first qualifying session of Open Pairs I, the defenders, Geir Helgemo and Tony Forrester, were struggling. Sometimes the road back comes more from solid results than dramatic ones.

Helgemo, sitting North, found himself defending 2♥ with a rather forlorn collection. This was Board 4:



Against 2♥ Forrester chose the sensible lead of the ♠3, not realizing that this would establish an extra pitch for one of declarer's losers. When East played low from dummy Helgemo rose with the ace as declarer followed with the 10.

Geir paused to consider what was happening. It seemed likely that declarer would have only five hearts (Tony would not have doubled 1NT for takeout with fewer than three hearts) but with an original holding of ΔQ 10, wouldn't East have taken a preference to ΔQ rather than introduce a suit of her own in this auction? So Tony must have led from the ΔQ 3.

Why hadn't he led one of the round suits instead of declarer's spade suit? Answer: he must hold both round-suit aces. So what to do about all of this? What would you do? Remember, a plus score is a "must" at matchpoints.

Helgemo found the solution by switching at trick two to . . . the $\diamondsuit 3$. Watch the effect. Declarer played low and Forrester's $\diamondsuit 9$ drove out the queen. The $\clubsuit K$ was taken with the ace and Tony continued with the $\diamondsuit 2$

Now consider what appeared to be happening from declarer's point of view. The $\diamondsuit 3$ shift must have been a singleton, so it had to be correct to duck this around to the 10, since Helgemo was going to ruff the trick anyway. When declarer played low Geir won his jack and played back the $\spadesuit 9$. Declarer pitched a club loser as she won Forrester's queen with the king.

After a club to the queen and a club ruff in dummy, declarer played a trump to the king and ace. Forrester now led the ◆K as Helgemo ruffed dummy's ace and a third round of spades would have insured the defense a third heart trick had Forrester held only the ♥10 instead of the jack. Three heart tricks and one in each of the other suits resulted in down one, plus 100 for North-South.

Hey! You've got to take your pluses wherever you find them. "Nice lead, Tony."
