Reborn Jacobs savors life, competition

Last spring in Vancouver, George Jacobs joined the panel of the vugraph show for the second half of the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams final. Jacobs' team was playing, and he and partner Ralph Katz -also a panelist -- were sitting out.


Jacobs is a popular commentator, but is valued much more for his wit and enthus

iasm than for his analytical skills. True to form, when Jacobs began to analyze the first deal, he made several mistakes. The other panelists gently corrected him.

On the second deal, Jacobs came right back with more analysis that was off the mark. Said Katz to his friend and bridge partner: "If you leave now, there are still some people here who think you know something about this game."

Jacobs loves that story. To him, it's just one more aspect of bridge that is fun. Life itself, in fact, is lots of fun for Jacobs these days. At 51, Jacobs is seemingly on top of the world. As owner of the world's largest limousine company -- American Limousine in Chicago -- he is set financially. As an aspiring bridge champion, he appears to be making all the right moves, and he is one of the most

Now it's the Kaplan **Blue Ribbon Pairs**

No longer is there a Blue Ribbon Pairs. The ACBL Board of Directors changed the name of the game to the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs to honor one of the all-time greats of bridge.

Kaplan was Mr. Everything in bridge. He is a member of the ACBL Hall of Fame and the World Bridge Federation Committee of Honor. He was an exceptional player who starred at the table and as a captain of American international teams. He was a writer and an editor, a theoretician and a teacher. He was a commentator without peer at the vugraph table -- his dry wit enraptured his listeners. He was the No. 1 authority in the world on the laws of the game. He served as a member of the ACBL Board of Directors for many years. He also was an adviser to World Bridge Federation presidents and the WBF executive board. His counsel was sought at all levels.

Not only that, he was a gentleman -- one of the finest ever to grace a card table.

Martel upset in Wagar Knockout

The team captained by Barbara Nist pulled the first upset of the Wagar Women's Knockout Teams, taking out the No. 6 seed, the squad led by Jan Martel. Nist, who represents District 19 on the ACBL Board of Directors, played with Jean Groome, Donna Rodwell and Gail Hanson.

The event continues today in the round of 16, with the top-seeded team, led by Kathie Wei-Sender entering play after a bye round Sunday.

The winner of the KO will be invited to the 1999 International Olympic Committee Gran Prix Tournament in Lausanne, Switzerland, in September.

Top 18 Spingold seeds receive byes

A turnout of 110 teams for the Spingold Knockout Teams meant that the top 18 seeds easily advanced to the second round -- they all had byes.

How did that work? Well, the field had to be reduced to 64 teams for the second round. If all 110 had played head-to-head matches, only 55 would have remained. So instead there were 46 head-to-head matches, producing 46 winners. That plus the 18 byes adds up to 64 matches for today.

The team that has dominated Spingold play over recent years goes into today's round as the No. 1 seed. On the team are Nick Nickell, Richard Freeman, Bob Hamman, Paul Soloway, Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell.

Mohan grabs lead in **Player of the Year race**

John Mohan, half of the winning duo in the Life Master Pairs, has taken the lead in the last Player of the Year race in the Nineties. Mohan's partner in the LM Pairs, Sam Lev, now holds down second place in the annual contest.

The winner is the player who earns the most masterpoints in NABC+ events in a calendar year.

Mohan, who recently moved to the Virgin Islands, was in 11th place after the 1999 Spring NABC in Vancouver. He moved up by virtue of the 190 masterpoints he and Lev earned for winning the sixsession pair game at the Summer NABC.

Mohan's platinum-points total is 426.16 to 395.80 for Lev. Michael Seamon, a member of the winning squad in the Grand National Teams, Flight A, picked up 100 points for the victory and holds down the third spot with 349.97.

Two knockout teams events -- the Spingold and Wagar Women's KO -- started yesterday and will have significant masterpoint payoffs to the winners and high finishers, so the *Player of the Year* title is still up for grabs. Last year's winner was Paul Soloway. Zia Mahmood and Bob Hamman are the only two-time winners of the award.

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David Silber and Audrey Grant sign two sets of agreements to cover arrangements for Better Bridge and future publicity.

ACBL, Audrey Grant sign two important agreements

As a result of two agreements signed yesterday, (1) Audrey Grant will be a major publicist for the ACBL, and (2) she will continue as editor of Better Bridge, but the ownership and responsibility for the magazine will rest with the ACBL. The agreements were signed by Grant and David Silber, CEO of the ACBL.

The first agreement is designed primarily to take advantage of Grant's reputation, her poise and polish, and her association with newer players, to gain a lot more publicity for bridge. "She will help us in a variety of ways," said Silber.

Grant will head for the site of North American Bridge Championships three or four weeks prior to the start. She will be available for media and press interviews so that she can make the home area of the tournament more aware that a big bridge tournament is on the way. Then she will return just before the start of the tournament to get publicity during the championships. "She will take advantage of her reputation as a much-published author, a teacher and TV series host to get the local folks interested enough in the tournament to give it a try," said Silber.

Silber also sees the strong possibility that Grant can convey the message to social bridge players -- as well as to those who don't play bridge yet -- that bridge is out there -- a wonderful way to have fun and meet new friends. Grant and the ACBL are working



Game, set, match

The winners of the Grand National Teams, Flight B, recalled few brilliancies on their way to the title -but they did allow that aggressive bidding helped them prevail. "We bid everything in sight," said Vinay Sarin, a member of the winning six-bagger from District 2.

Sarin, of Thornhill ON, played with Henry Caspar, Toronto; Tom Buttle, Claude King and Ringo Chung of Mississauga ON, and Helen DeWild of Willowdale

In addition to aggressive game bidding, said Sarin, "when the opponents made a mistake, we punished them." This deal comes from the Canadians' semifinal match against a California team.




(1) Precision: strong, artificial and forcing.

West's 1♠ overcall has little to commend it, and he suffered for his poor decision to enter the auction at unfavorable vulnerability. Chung, knowing that his partner had a least two spades because of his promise of balanced distribution, judged well to convert the takeout double to penalty.

The defense was brutally accurate. Sarin led the ♣10, taken by Chung with the king. Chung switched to his singleton diamond, taken by Sarin with the ace. Next came a diamond ruff, ♣A, club ruff, diamond ruff, ♥A and the ♥Q to dummy's king. West ruffed a heart to his hand and exited with a low spade to Chung's jack. A fourth round of hearts was ruffed by declarer and overruffed by Sarin. West ended with three tricks -- down four for minus 1100. To make matters worse, the North-South pair at the other table bid to 6Ψ , which was due to fail because of the bad trump split and the offside ♠K. That was a 15-IMP swing for District 2.

In the final, Sarin and Chung used a gadget to forge an 8-IMP gain on their way to a comeback victory.

Chung took the save because he knew the North-South hands had a double fit. The contract was down one -- Chung lost a heart, a diamond and two clubs -for minus 100, but it was an 8-IMP gain because East-West at the other table were allowed to play 4♥, making, for plus 420.

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Romex notrump works well for Rosenkranz

George Rosenkranz invented the Romex system, and he's a strong believer that his opening 1NT bid is a winner. He offered three examples from the Life Master Pairs. The first is from the first final session.

Once Rosenkranz found out about the heart situation, he could count 13 top tricks if hearts broke 3-2, so he bid the grand. This was worth almost all the matchpoints.

The other two deals wound up in partscores, believe it or not. The next deal came from the second semifinal session.

Rosenkranz, despite his great wealth of high cards, decided that the two-level was high enough, especially with a 4-3 fit -- and he was right. The defense started with three clubs. Rosenkranz ruffed the third club. He led a spade to the king and returned a diamond, ducked by East. Next came the A followed by a spade ruff. When he led a second diamond, East won -- and now Rosenkranz had eight tricks for a near top.

Norwegian visitor likes the crowds

Geir Olov Tislevoll, better known as Geo, has enjoyed his first visit to an ACBL tournament. The only

negative for the Norwegian is that he became sick and will have to return to Norway long before he intended. He is non-playing captain of Norway's Junior team, and originally he was going to lead that squad



into the World Junior Championships in Fort Lauderdale next month.

"I like the large crowd that comes out for the games here," he said. "And the people are so friendly. It's been a wonderful experience."

We noticed he was carrying a book with Norwegian ace Geir Helgemo on the cover. "That's a book I just had published," said Tislevoll. "It's all about Helgemo and in English it's called *Bridge -- the world of Helgemo*. At the moment I'm working on translating the book to English. I hope to have it published in English in time for the Fall North American Championships in Boston. The bridge players in the United States already know how good a player Helgemo is. Now they'll be able to get an insight into the real Helgemo -- and read a lot of the hands that have earned Helgemo a world-wide reputation."

Rosenkranz knew he had only 18 HCP, but he liked his seven controls. When Eddie Wold showed a weak hand with four hearts, Rosenkranz decided they were high enough with only a 4-3 fit. Once again he was right. The defense was able to take two trumps and one trick in each side suit. Making eight tricks once again was enough to win just about all the matchpoints.

A snake in the grass?

Not many players holding 12 high-card points and 7-5 shape in clubs and spades would think of passing as dealer. Count Michael Strizhevsky in that decided minority. His decision, as you can imagine, led to an unusual result. The deal occurred during the second semifinal session of the Life Master Pairs. Strizhevsky was playing with Charles Davis.

North-South play a strong 1♣ system, and Strizhevsky considered his choices in that context to be tough ones. A natural 2♣ opening with five spades seemed inelegant, and opening 1♠ with a seven-card suit on the side was a gross misrepresentation, so Strizhevsky passed!

East's free bid of 2Ψ will not make the short list for the bid of the year. The double of 3Φ also seems a bit hungry (East didn't know his trump holding would produce three tricks, after all).

Most of us who bid the way North did catch dummies that are mostly red cards without faces. Strizhevsky must be living right. Naturally, he had little trouble scoring up 570 after the ♥K lead and a diamond discard. Strizhevsky lost only three trump tricks.

The deal helped Strizhevski and Davis just make it into the Life Master Pairs final.

His favorite memory

Don Krauss, who did such an excellent job presenting Bob Hamman at the Hall of Fame dinner a few days ago, was telling of his favorite bridge memory. "My dad, Norman Krauss, was the Rookie of the Year at his bridge club at the age of 81."

His dad had played cards all his life -- gin rummy and other games, but not bridge. Once he took up bridge, he really enjoyed it.

His mother, Dudye, has been playing bridge a long time. "Mother and I had a section third in the Mixed Pairs way back in 1958," he said. "And I played again with her in Reno last year -- she was 85 at the time."

The Facts: $5 \heartsuit$ doubled went down one, plus 200 for N/S. The opening lead was a low spade. The Director was called when East bid $5 \heartsuit$, and E/W did not dispute that there had been a 15-20 second hesitation before the double. East said she passed too quickly over the $4 \spadesuit$ bid when she should have bid $5 \heartsuit$. The Director ruled that pass was a logical alternative once East had left the decision up to partner and changed the contract to $4 \spadesuit$ doubled made four, plus 590 for N/S.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. E/W stated that the 4Ψ bid did not show any special distribution, just the values for game in hearts. They did not offer any arguments about being too strong to bid 5Ψ (pass and pull, for example). East offered the explanation that her hand was clearly much stronger for offense and that she had already decided to bid 5Ψ if partner doubled. N/S stated that they did not think East's hand supported bidding 5Ψ after passing the decision to partner.

The Panel Decision: The consensus of the expert players consulted was that East's decision to pass 4♠ around to West bound her to West's action, especially if she showed doubt, unless E/W could demonstrate that they were playing methods where passing then pulling

showed stronger hands and East's hand conformed to those methods. E/W (about 800 masterpoints each) did not make that argument, showed no understanding of such methods, and held a hand which did not conform to them in any event. The Panel found that there had been an unmistakable break in tempo, probably 15-20 seconds. Law 16A states in part that partner may not choose from among logical alternatives one that could demonstrably have been suggested over another by the extraneous information. Two actions were logical at this point in the auction; pass and 5♥. Bidding 5♥ was suggested by the tempo of West's double. Passing 4♠ doubled was an action that a significant number of peers would have at least seriously considered. The Panel changed the contract to 4♠ doubled made four, plus 590 for N/S, which was the most favorable result that was likely had the irregularity not occurred.

The Facts: $4 \spadesuit$ doubled made five, plus 910 for N/S.

North's convention card indicated that 3♦ was an intermediate jump overcall; South's showed 3♦ to be intermediate and showing a two-suiter. The partnership agreement was that 3♦ was intermediate and showed diamonds and hearts. Both East and West had looked only at North's convention card. After the ♥8 opening lead, West called the Director when he saw the dummy. East stated she would not have doubled 3♠ if she had known that South had two suits. West stated he would not have doubled 4♠ if his partner had not doubled 3♠. The Director allowed the table result to stand because the doubler could expect one or two tricks from a partner that had opened the bidding.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. East had doubled 3♠ to suggest a non-spade lead. Had she known that 3♠ showed diamonds and hearts she would not have doubled because the double would have asked for a club lead. West stated that he thought East's double showed some values so he doubled the final contract. He hoped to lead hearts and get a heart ruff.

The Committee Decision: The Committee decided that E/W were not damaged by the misinformation. West had stated that he thought East would not have doubled 34 with a poor-value third-seat opener. East's double was very aggressive and it caused West to make the final double. N/S had tried for game (vulnerable against not) which clearly indicated holding some values. It was E/W's aggression and not the misinformation that caused the bad result. The Committee allowed the table result of 4♦ doubled made five, plus 910 for N/S, to stand. N/S were admonished to clearly fill out their conventions cards to avoid penalties in the future. The Committee considered two additional points: 1) Did the appeal have substantial merit? Because of the severe problem of the improperly filled-out convention card, the Committee decided it was reasonable for E/W to believe they might have a case. 2) Should N/S receive a procedural penalty for their improperly filled-out convention cards? The Committee believed that the Director should have penalized N/S, and that it was not the Committee's place to issue a procedural penalty once they had decided that there had been no damage caused by the infraction.

Four-star teachers -- Ed Layton (San Diego CA) and Madelyn Shibe (Lauderhill FL).

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
Kaplan

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The following article by George Rapee, featuring Edgar Kaplan, appeared in the May-June 1951 issue of The Bridge Bulletin. It shows how well Kaplan could play the game.

The Winning Play

Here is a hand, one of Kaplan's favorites -- from a 10-table duplicate played several years ago. Kaplan was South.



North led the ♥K and A. When Kaplan dropped the ♥Q, North played a third heart -- hoping partner could overruff dummy.

The play up to this point had gone in a leisurely manner, giving Kaplan more than enough time to analyze the deal. It seemed likely that North was void in spades and that 4♥ would have made for plus 620.

The task at hand for the defense was to set declarer three tricks (for plus 800). When North led a third heart, declarer ruffed with dummy's ♠9. Kaplan casually discarded the \$5, apparently unable to

Declarer now played a spade from dummy and when Kaplan followed with a low spade, declarer confidently played his ♠A. He waited expectantly for North to drop his singleton ♠K.

The diamond North produced was met with a look of horror. From here in, declarer was helpless. He played another spade and Kaplan won his king. The blow fell when Kaplan played his last diamond, his partner won the ace and Kaplan ruffed the diamond return. The A accounted for the sixth defensive trick and North-South were plus 800.

Of course, there was considerable discussion between East and West. "Yes," West explained to his partner, "I have heard of that play called the finesse."

Then his face grew crimson with controlled exasperation. "How could I figure him for the ♠K when he didn't overruff the heart?"

East, of course, would have no part of this. "Could you see what he was doing?"

Well, perhaps. It's always easy afterwards. Nevertheless, it was a neat play and apt to work against almost anyone.

It wouldn't, however, have succeeded against you or me. Or would it?

4.25 IMPs per board

Richard Oshlag was telling Henry Bethe that there were lots of IMPs scored in the first quarter of his Spingold match yesterday. Bethe said that the average number of IMPs scored on a board is four and a quarter. "I've done quite a study on this," he said. "I've checked some old Vanderbilts and Spingolds and other events, and it's quite consistent -the average number of IMPs is 4.25 per board. How many IMPs were scored in your match?"

Oshlag was confounded -- his score for the first quarter was 49-19 -- 68 IMPs in 16 boards. What's the average per board? Exactly 4.25.

After Oshlag compared scores following the next 16 boards, his team had won the set, 55-13. That adds up to 68, too -- 4.25 IMPs per board.

Oshlag is convinced Bethe is right.



West led the \blacklozenge K, cashed the \blacktriangledown A and continued with a low diamond. How do you play from here?

Maroney ruffed the second round of diamonds and cashed the ♥K, pitching a spade from dummy. He then cashed the ♠A and attempted to crossruff for 11 tricks. The timing was wrong, however, and he finished down one.

Too late, Maroney realized the correct line of play (which did not involve a spade discard from dummy): ♥K, ruff a heart, spade to the queen and the A. You can now ruff a spade, ruff a diamond high, ruff your last spade and ruff a fourth diamond high. You will then be in your hand in the two-card ending with the A 10 in dummy.

As you can see, there are eight top tricks in notrump, and after West's opening bid, declarer is likely to guess hearts -- not to mention the fact that West's three discards while declarer runs the club suit will also be revealing.

Against 2NT by North, Smith led the ♠J, which was ducked. Declarer won the second spade with the ace and played a club to dummy's ace, on which Oshlag dropped the queen! It looked as though the club suit would produce only three tricks, so another plan was called for. Even with a successful heart guess, declarer still needed another trick, and it had to come from dia-

So North played a low diamond from dummy. Oshlag pounced with the ace and cashed his spade tricks to hold North to eight tricks. With the field taking nine or 10 tricks -- and some of them in game -minus 120 was worth 33 out of 38 matchpoints for Oshlag and Smith.

On this deal from the second final session, Oshlag was experiencing the sinking feeling you get when you realize the opponents have bid to a very thin game that just happens to be cold.

Once again, Oshlag felt unusual action was called for.

Oshlag's 3♦ bid was beefy, but his partner was a passed hand and the vulnerability -- red versus white -- was definitely unfavorable. 3♦ was destined for a one-trick defeat, but East reasoned that if West could balance with a double at that level, there must be some play for game. In fact, with only 21 high-card points between the two hands, declarer was due to lose only two spades and a diamond -- something that was depressingly obvious to Oshlag.

Clearly, desperate measures were called for, so when Smith led the ♦Q, Oshlag overtook with the king and returned the ♣7, looking very much like a man trying for a ruff with a singleton. Declarer eyed this suspiciously for some time but finally went up with the A, obviously hoping to play spades for one loser.

When declarer played a spade, Smith hopped up with the ace and fired back a club to -- surprise!--Oshlag's king. Oshlag got out with a heart, and declarer could have made her contract by playing a spade to the king. Few players would guess the trump suit correctly in these circumstances, however, so Oshlag and Smith scored up plus 50 for 32.5 matchpoints.

popular personalities in bridge. Hang out with Jacobs for any length of time and you're sure to see him receiving hugs and kisses from several beautiful women.

"Every day of my life is a blessing," he says. "It's like I'm living on borrowed time, and I'm making the most of it."

In Vancouver, the Jacobs team certainly made the most of a huge surge of momentum that carried the six-man squad to one impressive win after another in a tough field, capped by a 78-IMP victory in the final.

The Vanderbilt triumph was the most significant in a recent series of successes for Jacobs and company. Two years ago, his team made it to the final of the International Team Trials in New Orleans. Last fall, Jacobs, Katz, Peter Weichsel, Alan Sontag and Italian stars Alfredo Versace and Lorenzo Lauria came within a hair of winning the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams. Just last month, the American members of the team -plus Claude Vogel and Roger Bates -- made it to the final of the ITT in Memphis, bowing to a squad of superstars in a close match.

In San Antonio, the Jacobs team -- Katz, Versace, Lauria, Howard Weinstein and Steve Garner -- is seeded No. 7 in the Spingold Knockout Teams, which started Sunday. They had a bye in the first round.

All this success would be enough to give almost anyone a big head. Not Jacobs. He has his feet planted firmly on the ground. "I don't pretend to be an expert," he says. "I know I'm the weak link on the team. If I play well, it's a plus."

Katz and Vogel, Jacobs' two most regular partners, say their friend may be underestimating himself somewhat

"His game has gotten a lot better," says Vogel, also of Chicago. "George has a lot of potential, and he's picking the right people to play with. Just as with his business, he wants to be the best."

Says Katz: "George has improved a ton. In the Vanderbilt, he played really well."

Things are going well for Jacobs, but it hasn't always been that way. He can still remember being at such a low point in his life that suicide seemed the easiest way out. What took him to the brink of despair was a 14-year struggle with a compulsion to gamble.

It started, he recalls, when he was 12 with the seemingly innocent activity of pitching quarters and lagging cards. From there, he started betting and couldn't stop. Like most people, he recalls where he was the day he heard about President John F. Kennedy's assassination in 1963, but it's mostly because he was being expelled from high school that day for gambling. "The day President Kennedy was killed," he recalls, "I set up a card game."

Blessed with a high IQ, Jacobs was told time and again that his future was bright. "They told me I could be anything I wanted," he says, "but they forgot to tell me I had to work for it."

Jacobs' gambling habit became so serious that his parents threw him out of their house. After years of rearing children, Jacobs' mother re-entered the work force. The day she received her first paycheck, Jacobs stole it and cashed it to gamble with. Later, his parents changed the locks on the doors to their home to keep Jacobs out.

Jacobs gradually sank lower and lower, losing his job and friends, sleeping in doorways. The nadir occurred while he was living in Washington DC. He vividly recalls standing outside a restaurant where 12-cent hamburgers were for sale. He had six one-dollar bills in his pocket, but he never even thought about spending them -- they had great serial numbers for liar's

poker. He couldn't even buy a 12-cent hamburger. He hitchhiked to Baltimore from Washington, intending to enlist in the U.S. Army, but he couldn't pass the physical.

His life turned around in Chicago 25 years ago. He was sitting at a desk where he worked as an accountant, and he was deep in despair. He had just filed for bankruptcy and he was about to lose his job -- all because of gambling. As it happened, he had a lunch date with a friend, and when the friend heard his story he gave Jacobs the phone number of Gamblers Anonymous.

"I went to a meeting the next day," he says, "and I haven't made a bet in 25 years. I don't even buy a raffle ticket." When Jacobs and Katz played in the MSN Gaming Zone Cavendish Invitational Pairs, they won \$25,000, but Jacobs didn't take a penny of it. He's clean and staying that way.

Jacobs' business success began by chance in 1979. He was working for a company selling forklift trucks. One day, a customer who was a purchasing agent for a department store came in and was complaining about how little he got in trade for limousines.

"Why don't you buy the limo?" the man said to Jacobs.

"What would I do with it?" Jacobs asked.

"Get into the livery business."

Jacobs took the plunge, wisely choosing to leave the driving to others. "I drove one day," he says. "I was hopeless."

Pretty soon, one limo became two and so on, and Jacobs eventually put his cars into the American Limousine fleet. In 1984, he bought the company. Today, American Limousine boasts a fleet of 300 cars, 450 drivers and 150 employees. "We never close," Jacobs says. "We don't even have a key to the office."

Last year, American Limousine merged with Carey International, a Washington DC-based company. Jacobs is still president of his company, but he spends time helping Carey acquire other limousine companies.

"There is so much action in this business," Jacobs says. "I love it. No two days are ever alike."

His business success has led him to multiple honors, including Illinois Entrepreneur of the Year in 1992. He has also been national president of Gamblers Anonymous and is a six-time president of the National Limousine Association.

Bridge entered Jacobs' life when he was a youngster. He played some in college, but not much after that, partly because he was married to a non-bridge player. After his divorce in 1991, Jacobs gravitated to serious bridge.

He vividly remembers his first encounter with Katz. It was in October of 1987 -- Black Friday in the stock market. Jacobs telephoned Katz, a stock broker, to see if Katz wanted to buy a limousine and put it in Jacobs' fleet. Jacobs was impressed at the way Katz handled the phone call. "His world was going to hell, and all he said was, 'I'm a little busy today. Do you mind if I get back to you?"

Jacobs the bridge player was pretty rough around the edges at first. "I was a cowboy," he says., "and I often shot myself in the foot. I was into psyching and tricking the opponents."

Says Vogel: "He does have a gambler's mentality. We try to keep that down, but George has a lot of potential."

What Jacobs had to learn, Katz says, is that you can't make the same plays against the Bob Hammans of the world that you make at the local duplicate club and expect them to work.

Jacobs is a natural for vugraph shows, and he has done a bang-up job as auctioneer for the Cavendish calcutta. At one auction, out of the blue he invented what he called a "blind bogey" -- instead of bidding

on a specific pair, bidders fight it out to conclusion, and the winner gets to choose any pair still available.

The invitation to participate in vugraph panels arose from his Cavendish auction work, and he was a hit right away. "It was like a member of the audience being on the panel," he says. "I never know what I'm going to say."

As for bridge, Jacobs has enjoyed his recent success, and he credits Katz and Vogel with helping him. "Ralph helped me realize how little I knew."

Today, Jacobs savors the opportunity to play against tough opponents, and he is proud to have survived 11 grueling days in the ITT in New Orleans in 1997. After the long fight, the team finished second to the Nick Nickell squad for a berth in the Bermuda Bowl in Hammamet, Tunisia, later that year. "We were in New Orleans so long," Jacobs says, "that Ralph and I can vote there now."

Jacobs looks forward to the day that he can make a play similar to one that Michael Seamon made against him in the semifinal round of the ITT. Jacobs led the ♣A from seven to the A-Q against 4♠ doubled by Seamon. Dummy hit with three clubs to the jack, and Katz followed with his singleton 10. In perfect tempo, Seamon, holding ♣K 4, played the king. Jacobs switched and Seamon eventually made an impossible contract.

"When I'm able to make a play like that in tempo," Jacobs says, "I'll know I've done something."

on a new book which when published will be helpful in achieving this goal.

"We are at a time when we have the opportunity to have some impact on the public," said Silber. "This talk about bridge in the Olympics has caught the attention of the media. Our *Learn to Play Bridge* discs are making an impression -- you can even download the program directly from the ACBL web site. And bridge is making a lot of friends on the Internet as well."

The second agreement really is a restructuring of the connection between the ACBL and Grant concerning the *Better Bridge* magazine. The new agreement gives the ACBL ownership and ultimate control of the magazine -- in the past the responsibilities have been shared.

"Audrey is going to continue as editor -- she had done an excellent job in that capacity," said Silber. "Our job will be to improve operations and circulation. In other words, Audrey creates and we distribute and market."

Better Bridge, which is published six times a year, is currently offered as an alternative publication to the Bridge Bulletin to new members only. It is aimed at the less tournament-oriented player. If a new member wants to get both publications, he may do so for an extra \$12. In those areas where Better Bridge has been actively promoted, 36% sign up for Better Bridge.

"We are working on a new strategy concerning how the two magazines should be handled over the long haul," said Silber. "We're going to do considerable research over the coming months to work out the best approach for the ACBL to take concerning the two magazines."

If you are given a gift on opening lead, it's important not to squander that edge. On this deal from the first final session of the Life Master Pairs, Dave Smith of Newark DE took full advantage of a somewhat eccentric opening lead to earn nearly all of the matchpoints. Smith was playing with Richard Oshlag of Germantown TN.

Doubling 2• probably would have resulted in at least plus 800 for East-West, but Smith didn't have the kind of hand for reopening the bidding with a double. When Smith showed a two-suiter and indicated a good hand, Oshlag bid aggressively to game.

A trump lead would have spelled doom for Smith, but South chose the aggressive lead of the ♠K. This did nothing to further the cause of the defense, and Smith took full advantage. He won the opening lead and cashed his two high clubs followed by the ♠Q (so as not to get it ruffed later on) and the ♠A. Smith then played a third round of clubs and overruffed with dummy's ♥K when South put in the ♥9.

Next came a diamond ruff and a fourth round of clubs. South's trumps were useless, so he discarded a diamond. In dummy with a second club ruff, Smith ruffed a second round of diamonds (North pitched a spade) and got out of his hand with the ♥Q. North won and, down to the ♥10 7 and the ♠J, played the spade. Smith held the ♣9 and the ♥J 8. Smith could have ruffed with the 8, but he discarded his good club instead, leaving North to play a trump into his tenace for 11 tricks.

Plus 450 was good for 35.5 out of 38 matchpoints.
