




## 'Local boy makes good' — home town honors Wolff

Thirty-one years ago, Bobby Wolff left San Antonio, his lifelong home, to further his bridge career in Dallas. On Monday, many of the friends he has made in the interim gathered in San Antonio to honor him for his achievements and contributions to bridge.

"Your friend," said Joe Musumeci, who flew in from Dallas for the occasion, "is the man who knows all about you and likes you nonetheless. Bobby, I know all about you, and I think you know all about me. I like you."

That pretty much summed up the sentiment at the Goodwill Committee reception, where Wolff was sur-

prised to find that he was the guest of honor. In fact, Wolff had not planned to attend the fete, but he was corralled by his friend and bridge partner, Dan Morse, who succeeded Wolff as District 16 representative to the ACBL Board of Directors.

Musumeci, with whom Wolff ran a bridge club in San Antonio in the Sixties, was one of several speakers at the meeting who offered tributes to one of the all-time great players.

Wolff, a 10-time world champion, is a member of the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame, a former president of the ACBL and the World Bridge Federation and is the

Winning the Jackpot Pairs was a pocket-warming experience for Alan Greer of Buffalo NY and P. Mallela of Dekalb IL. For the extra \$23 each that they put up for the entry fee in Flight A, they collected \$873 each.

The payoff for second place also was excellent -- Robert Levin of Windermere FL and Michael Seamon of Miami Beach each received \$654.50.

In Flight B/C/D, which was run as a single event, the victors were Bruce Altshuler of Los Angeles and Henk Uijterwaal of Amsterdam, the Netherlands and they received \$200. They were first in both the B and the C Flights. The prizes were considerably lower because everyone had the opportunity to compete in Flight A if they wanted the chance at the big money.

Second place in B/C went to Andrew Eames of Ashland MA and Andrew Savitz of Cambridge MA. They received \$150 apiece.

Paul and Carol Madsen of Redington Beach FL finished first in Flight D, worth \$93 apiece. The second-place award, worth \$72, went to Kathy Owens, Caledonia IL, and Laura Donovan, Harvard IL.

"Maybe some other folks from small towns will read this and realize how important it is to establish a club in a small town," said Shirley.

## Best young players to seek world title in Fort Lauderdale

More than 100 of the world's best young bridge players -- all 26 or younger -- will gather in Fort Lauderdale August 9-18 to compete for the World Junior Team championship. Seventeen teams from the United States (Teams I and II), Canada (Teams 1 and 2), Italy, Israel, Norway, Denmark, Argentina, Brazil, Egypt, Pakistan, China, Hong Kong, Chinese Taipei, Australia and Central America (Colombia, Venezuela and Martinique) will vie for the championship.

At stake is the Ortiz-Patiño Trophy, honoring Jaime Ortiz-Patiño, president emeritus of the World Bridge Federation. He inaugurated the championship in 1987 to promote interest in bridge among young people. The tournament is sponsored by the World Bridge Federation.

Jayne Thomas, former ACBL director from Florida (District 9) has been the major fund raiser for the hospitality that will be given the contestants. She has worked for months to make sure the players are treated in the good old-fashioned South Florida way. Barbara Nudelman and Joan Gerard also have been instrumental in making tournament preparations.

For the first few stagings of the competition, the host team also was the victor. The 1987 contest was staged in Amsterdam, and the Dutch won by 8 IMPs in a match that went down to the last board against France. The United States finished third in the five-team field.

In 1989 Great Britain was the host in Nottingham, and the Britons were the champs, defeating Argentina in the final. Eight teams competed this time.

Two major upsets highlighted the Round of 64 in the Spingold Knockout Teams.

Samuel Ehrlichman's team, featuring two 18-year-olds, eliminated the Rose Johnson-Meltzer squad, 144-123. Johnson-Meltzer had an all-star team consisting of Peter Weichsel, Alan Sontag, Chip Martel, Lew Stansby and Kyle Larsen. Joining Ehrlichman on the victorious team were David Gurvich, Ari Greenberg and Joe Grue. Greenberg and Grue, the 18-year-olds, were on the team that defeated four world champions. Johnson-Meltzer was seeded eighth.

The #7 seed, captained by George Jacobs, fell before the squad captained by Michael Kovacich, 112-

## Duck soup

Ed Rawlinson of San Antonio knew he was in an unusual situation. He was ducking a trick as a defender, but he had taken so much time deciding to do so that he was sure declarer knew what was going on. He did it anyway, and came away with a near top for sticking to his guns. The event was the Stratiflighted Open Pairs. Rawlinson's partner was Diane Olson, also of San Antonio.

Rawlinson led the ♦7 to his partner's ace. On the diamond return, declarer -- apparently worried about being tapped -- discarded a heart. Rawlinson won the ♦K and played a low spade. Declarer took Olson's queen and played a spade to the jack. This was followed by the ♣9: 2, 4. Rawlinson knew that winning the king would leave the defenders badly positioned. Whatever he returned would allow declarer to win and take another club finesse, pull trumps and make off with 10 tricks.

Unfortunately, he pondered his play for long enough declarer knew he was ducking with one of the club honors, so when Rawlinson finally played low, declarer followed with a club to the ace, felling the king.

Now West, in the apparent hope that trumps were 3-3, made the fatal error of cashing another trump, and the contract was doomed. Whatever West did was destined to fail. An immediate club play would result in a diamond return, knocking out his last trump, and pulling the last trump would leave him nothing to deal with the onslaught of diamonds. In practice, declarer finished down three. Plus 300 was worth 23 of 25 matchpoints.

## Good memory

When Art Rainey of Springfield MO encountered Kathie Wei-Sender in the Stratiflighted Open Pairs on Saturday, he couldn't resist reminding her of their first meeting, 24 years ago.

Rainey and his partner were playing in a regional in Wichita KS against Wei-Sender, who was playing with Ron Andersen. There were several kibitzers, including a woman with a British accent.

Rainey, a 29-year-old with about 50 masterpoints, was impressed with the players and the entourage. That didn't keep him from trying his best, however.

Andersen and Wei-Sender were playing Precision, and this was the auction:

Thirteen tricks were easy, and it turned out that Rainey's leap to 6♦ had done the job.

The kibitzer with the British accent said to Wei-Sender, "Wasn't he (Rainey) lucky to have bid six as a sacrifice so that you could not ask for kings -- and wasn't he especially lucky that he didn't bid 7♦ so you could pass and invite your partner to bid seven?"

Wei-Sender turned to the kibitzer and remarked, "That wasn't luck -- that was talent."

Rainey was mightily impressed at Wei-Sender's good sportsmanship and her gracious gesture. "I was thinking of quitting bridge at the time," he said. "But that made me stay with the game."

At the time, Wei-Sender was somewhat of a newcomer to the game herself. In the 30 years since she took up bridge, she has forged an enviable record in high-level competition -- with three world championships and multiple North American titles -- and has been the official Ambassador of Bridge for the World Bridge Federation for years.

She has also distinguished herself as an author, publishing Precision books with Andersen, an autobiography entitled *Second Daughter*. A second autobiography awaits publication. She has also edited a soon-to-be published book on her favorite bidding system, *Precision 2000*.

## Piano concert artist plays during sitouts

Have you heard some of that fabulous concert music as you wander through the hotel halls? That's the work of a real concert pianist -- David Levy of Cannes, France, who is here to play in this NABC. He lives in Cannes, but he really is British -- he hails from Liverpool.



Piano and bridge are his life. I've been playing the piano for 30 years -- and "I've been playing bridge for 15. I enjoy playing the piano while I'm at tournaments." Quite a few players remember hearing him play at major bridge tournaments at last year's world championships in Lille, France, and at the Forbo tournament in The Hague, the Netherlands.

He has two reasons for being in the United States. "I gave a concert in Philadelphia recently and I'm establishing contacts. And I wanted to play in my first NABC."

What does he think of his first venture into American bridge?

"It's great! It's strikingly different from tournaments in Europe. The players behave well -- they don't shout at each other. The organizational setup is remarkable."

He's playing in the Spingold Teams with Richard Oshlag, Norb Kremer, Dave Smith, and Rog and Annalee Gault. He's going to play with Connie Goldberg in the Mixed Teams.

## Comeback kids

In the round of 16 of the Wagar Women's Knockout Teams, the underdog squad led by Jan Assini of Aurora OH entered the fourth quarter against the powerful No. 1 seed -- Kathie Wei-Sender and company -- trailing by 15 IMPs. Clearly, the situation called for a major swing. They got it on the second board of the set -- a double-digit swing that helped the squad to a 35-13 fourth quarter and the upset.

The new No. 1 seed is Assini, playing with Laurie Kranyak, Bay Village OH; Sharon Jabbour and Susan Miller, Boca Raton FL; Mary Oshlag, Germantown TN, and Candace Fowler, Jacksonville FL.

This was the deal that helped create the upset.

North led the ♦J to the king and ace. South could have assured the defeat of the contract by returning a diamond, but North did bid spades and then declined to lead the suit. For all South knew, it may have been necessary to play a spade to through declarer's king to partner's A-Q.

North took the ♠K with the ace and could have defeated the contract by continuing diamonds, but that might be the wrong defense if South had started with a singleton spade. So back came the ♠J. Miller was now in control. When Miller played a low heart from her hand, North won the king and got out with the ♦10. Miller won in dummy, cashed the ♥Q and played a heart to her 10, claiming 10 tricks when that held. That was plus 420.

With trumps and diamond cooperating, 4♠ could not be defeated. Plus 790 and plus 420 added up to plus 1210, good for a 15-IMP gain in a match won by 7 IMPs.

## What happens if you take your eye off the ball

The fourth set of a Spingold match when you're up by 90 is not the key time to stay focused. Cows fly by from time to time. Here is a prize specimen.

On the ♥A lead, dummy goes down and everyone laughs. You play the ♥2 to suggest clubs, and partner lead the ♣Q. Declarer could see the threat of a trump promotion if he ruffed a diamond in dummy, but he should have followed that line. Instead he played three rounds of trump. Jeff Aker won and persisted in clubs, setting me (and him) up for the kill. When I myopically led a top heart, declarer ruffed and ran trumps to squeeze Jeff in the minors.

I had my chance though. I had to shift to the ♦J when in with the ♣K to cut communications. Now the squeeze does not bite.

My second misplay should actually go to the credit of the defender in the West seat, Steve Nordberg.

You get the defense of two rounds of spades and a friendly ♥9 shift. If hearts are 4-1 you are awkwardly placed, but you need to try to protect yourself to arrange those minor suit finesses.

You cover the ♥9 and it goes to the jack, queen and ace. You choose to come off dummy with the low heart (East pitching a spade) and you win the king. Now you need both minor finesses, and it looks right to take the diamond finesse first since you may be able to make your contract if West has either a 3-4-3-3 or a 3-4-2-4 shape. I finessed in diamonds, cashed the ♦K, dropping the queen on my left. This was what I believed the position to be:

I planned to exit with the ♥8. West would win and force me with a spade. I would ruff, cash the ♥7 to draw the last trump, then pitch dummy's ♦K. Then I can cash my diamonds and finesse the clubs successfully for the contract.

Alas! When I followed through with my plan, West took his ♥9 and exited with his artfully concealed third diamond. This locked me in dummy and prevented me from taking the club finesse.

Well done, Steve Nordberg -- a classic example of playing the card you are known to hold.

## Father-daughter night

"I was playing for the first time ever with my daughter Lindsay in the Midnight Swiss a couple of nights ago," said Glenn Eisenstein, "and the first dummy I ever put down for her consisted of exactly one queen and a dozen deuces.

"It was a very special occasion -- father and daughter night for our team. Our teammates were Bill Wickham and his daughter Rebecca, who is 21. My daughter is 14.

"Getting back to the hand, Lindsay opened a weak two-bid in spades with six to the ace-king-queen and out, with 2-3-2 distribution in the other suits. I had 3-3-2-5 and the only picture I had was the ♠Q. Lindsay was doubled by the player in the passout seat. She took six trump tricks and got a seventh by ruffing a diamond in my hand."

When the hand was over, Lindsay looked at her dad and ask, "Gee, Dad, was there any way I could have made it?"

Her father smiled and said, "Honey, none of my other partners would go only minus 200 with this hand. They might have gone for 800 or 1100, but never 200."

Lindsay actually gained 10 IMPs on the board -- the Wickhams bid 4♥ at the other table and made it with an overtrick.

## Another brilliancy gone West (or East)

Consider 4♠ on two rounds of diamonds (it's important to cash the top diamonds to avoid later endplays, but if East shifts to a heart at trick two, the defense has the upper hand).

So West wins the ♦K at trick two -- what next? A club is fatal, but a heart also loses -- more slowly though. Declarer takes the ♥Q with the ace, draws trumps with the aid of the finesse and exits with the ♥10. On the forced heart return he can now run his major suit winners to squeeze West in hearts and clubs. The same squeeze operates if East shifts to a club at trick two, but declarer has to be careful: win the ♠A, draw three rounds of trumps, then exit with the ♦Q, and the squeeze bites eventually.

Jeff Aker was denied his brilliancy. At trick 3 West shifted to the ♥9, and Akers' 10 was allowed to take a cheap trick. He guessed trumps and recorded plus 620.

West actually does have a defense left -- at trick three he must give up his spade trick and play a trump at trick three. Now declarer has no heart menace establishable and the squeeze fails.

## Thanks, Michael

In his new book, *Bridge, Zia and Me*, Michael Rosenberg describes deceptive plays such as leading low from the A K Q x towards the 10 x x in dummy to steal a trick. Having just read the book, I had a chance to try it out in the Henry Baer Flight A/X Open Pairs Friday night. I was South.

The opening lead of the ♦J was ducked to the king. Inspired by Mr. Rosenberg's book, I played the ♠5 at trick two. West (who may also have read Michael's book), rose with the queen and continued with the ♦10. I ducked this play, and ducked again when diamonds were continued. East, in with the ♦A, had the setting tricks in his hand. He cashed the ♥K and stopped to reflect. Could I have started with three spades to the king and five hearts to the Q-J-10? If so, he should cash the ♥A and play a spade and collect down two. If, on the other hand, I had started with three spades to the ace (to go with ♥Q J 10 x x), East must play a spade before cashing his second heart to guarantee down two (the event was matchpoints, after all).

After some thought, East played for possibility No. 2 and put a spade on the table. I claimed three for 22.5 out of 25 matchpoints.

The United States was host to the Junior Championship for the first time in 1991. It was an all-ACBL final with United States II scoring an exciting victory over Canada.

Germany defeated Norway for the title in 1993 when the tournament was held in Arhus, Denmark. This time there were 15 teams in the competition. The United States finished third.

Twelve teams traveled to Bali, Indonesia, in 1995. Great Britain had a relatively ease time winning the title.

Hamilton ON was the host in 1997, and 18 teams turned out. This was a big year for Europe -- Denmark was the champion, followed by Norway and Russia.

## Red Ribbon competitors vie for Bean Trophy

Play continues today in the Red Ribbon Pairs. Competitors earned qualification by placing first or second overall in regionally-rated events of at least Flight B status. Neither member of a qualifying pair may hold more than 1500 masterpoints at the time of qualification.

The four-session event began in 1986 and winners have their names inscribed on the Percy X. Bean Trophy.

### Bean Trophy

The trophy was designated by the ACBL Board of Directors in 1996 to honor Bean, ACBL president in 1972 and chairman of the Board in 1973.

Bean (1916-1992) represented District 19 on the Board from 1964 until 1988 and served as president of the ACBL Charity Foundation from 1974 until 1981. He was a member of the National Goodwill Committee and the National Board of Governors and general chairman of arrangements for the World Team Olympiad in Seattle in 1984.

Bean and his wife Anne were named *ACBL Honorary Members* for 1992, the first time that honor was bestowed on a husband-wife combination.

Bean was the editor of *Mad, Mad World of Bridge*, a publication that strongly championed players of less

than expert class.

author of the Active Ethics program among his many contributions to bridge administration. He is also the author of the syndicated bridge column, *The Aces on Bridge*.

Recalling their days in the bridge club business, Musumeci said his friend "should be remembered for the "Wolff movement," which came about as a marketing tool for the people who played in their junior games. "After Bobby got through with the recap sheet," Musumeci said, "no pair was below average."

Wolff left San Antonio in 1968 to help Ira Corn with the formation of the Aces, the world's first full-time professional bridge team. Musumeci followed not long after that to coach the team.

In a study Musumeci did on the effectiveness of individual team members, Wolff came out on top, first in partnership with Jim Jacoby and later with Bob Hamman.

Morse, who kicked off the tributes to Wolff, related that his partnership with Wolff goes back to the Sixties. In fact, he and Wolff were members of the Charles Goren team the last time Goren played at an NABC -- in Montreal in 1967.

"Bobby Wolff is a very dynamic individual," Morse said. "If you want something done in the bridge world, go to Bobby Wolff."

When Wolff arrived at the reception, he was surprised to see his older brother, Walter, there. Still practicing as an attorney, Walter nearly stole the show with reminiscences about "my baby brother."

Walter recalled that he and Bobby learned bridge as they watched their parents play on a train trip from San Antonio to Chicago in the mid-Forties. Of course, Walter said, "Bobby didn't start winning until we got to Austin."

Then there was the Wolff system, as described by Walter: "It was simple but effective: I could bid clubs. On weekends and holidays, for two hands, I could bid diamonds."

Walter recalled that Bobby attended law school, but was drafted into the U.S. Army when he was just about to earn his degree. By the time Bobby returned from service, he had lost credit for all his college work and had to start over. The second time around, as Bobby was nearing completion of his course work for the law degree, Corn called and asked for help in forming the Aces. Bobby never earned the law degree.

"It's just as well," Walter said, "because Bobby is too nice to be a lawyer."

Joan Gerard, who represents District 3 on the ACBL Board of Directors, paid tribute to Wolff as her mentor. "The ACBL is built on the hard work and dedication of volunteers," Gerard said. "To me, Bobby Wolff is the leader of them all."

She said Wolff has given his time to help train young players, including serving as coach of one of the U.S. teams which will play for the World Junior Team Championship in Fort Lauderdale FL next month.

Said Gerard: "I'm accused of being a Bobby Wolff fan. I plead guilty."

Hamman, Wolff's partner for 27 years, said he first encountered Wolff in 1963, when their two teams played in a major knockout match. Wolff and Ozzie Jacoby were thrashed by Hamman's teammates, but it was discovered that both pairs sat the same direction. In the replay, Wolff's team won.

When Wolff was more into bridge administration, Hamman said, many players were happy. When he was more into playing, the administrators were happy. One way or another, Hamman said, "he has brought a great deal of happiness to a lot of people."

Aileen Osofsky, Goodwill Committee chairman and emcee of the show, read a message sent by José Damiani, president of the World Bridge Federation:

"Bobby Wolff has, through his bridge career, been a strong advocate for the promotion of bridge as a highly ethical and courteous game, and for players showing as high a respect for their partners as for their opponents.

"He is one of the best examples that we could have of a great champion and a great administrator, first within the ACBL and then as president of the World Bridge Federation. His unflinching integrity and courtesy are an example to us all."

The most emotional tribute came from Wolff's

daughter Wendy, who flew in from Dallas Monday just for the event.

At one time in her life, Wendy resented bridge. "Every time I turned around my father was off to another bridge tournament," she said. "I could not understand what was so important about sitting around playing cards." Everything in their household, Wendy said, revolved around bridge.

Then she discovered a positive side to the game, namely the people she met at NABCs, where she met other "bridge orphans" and made lifelong friends. "But I still didn't get what it was all about," she said.

Then came Venice, Italy, in 1988. Wendy's father was on the U.S. team which qualified for the World Olympiad Teams. "I went not because it was the Olympiad. I went because it was Venice."

Wendy was told her father's team had no chance to win or even get to the semifinals.

"Not only did they get to the semifinals," she said, "they took home the gold. All of a sudden Italy was not so important, and watching my dad and his team on vugraph was. I caught the bug. I was never more proud to be Bobby Wolff's daughter. I understand now how important his accomplishments and contributions to the game are.

"I love you, dad. Thanks to everyone."

When he took the podium, Wolff was treated to a standing ovation from a gathering described as one of the largest ever at a Goodwill Committee reception.

Noting that Osofsky had started the meeting with a list of ACBL dignitaries who died in the past year, Wolff said, "I don't want to be on that list."

Wolff related a story involving the legendary tournament director Al Sobel, who was inducted into the Bridge Hall of Fame last week.

At a regional in Fort Worth, Wolff was playing with Sidney Lazard in a knockout teams. Wolff picked up his hand and counted 14 cards. Lazard had 12 cards. Sobel was the TD who arrived, and he took the board to the other table. A few minutes later, Sobel returned to say that the board had been played with 14 and 12 cards at the other table. "Play it," said Sobel.

"The rest of the story," Wolff joked, "is that Sidney and I bid eight clubs and made it."

Wolff concluded by thanking Osofsky and the others who planned the surprise. "One of the best things anyone can have is friends," Wolff said. "This means a lot more to me probably than anything that has happened to me in bridge."

## Goodwill reception highlights

An emotional Carol Sanders took the podium at the Goodwill Committee reception Monday to thank her many friends in the bridge world for their support during her recent illness.

Sanders, who was not expected to attend the Summer NABC, credited the love and prayers of her bridge friends for helping her make it. She also thanked husband Tommy, "who wrote all my thank you notes" for the cards and letters she received.

Other highlights of the meeting, conducted by Goodwill Chairman Aileen Osofsky:

- A moment of silence in acknowledgement of bridge dignitaries who died since the last meeting: former world champions George Rapee and Bobby Goldman, former ACBL Presidents Herb Smith and Syd Levey, and Brian Moran, national tournament director and contributor to *The Bridge Bulletin*.

- Presentation of a tee shirt and golf balls to 12-year-old Zachary Campbell Moscow, grandson of tour-

nament Co-chair Carol Campbell. Zachary has entertained players by playing the piano at various locations at the Marriott Rivercenter.

- Greetings by ACBL President Val Covalciuc, who congratulated tournament organizers for an outstanding tournament. "I toast Texas and San Antonio for a great NABC."

- Announcement that nominations for Goodwill Member of the Year are now being accepted. The deadline for submissions is Oct. 15.

## IMPs per board

It was reported in yesterday's Daily Bulletin that I had told Richie Oshlag that the number of IMPs per board is 4.25. It actually is a little more than that -- probably 4.3 or so, and the standard deviation is about 6. So over 64 boards you would expect the average total number of IMPs to be around 275, with most of the totals falling between 225 and 325.

On Sunday there were 55 matches played to conclusion and final scores reported. In these matches, 15,288 IMPs were scored, an average of 278 per match. In five matches, more than 325 IMPs were scored, and in four there were fewer than 225.

**The Facts:** 3NT made five, plus 460 for N/S. There was agreement that there had been a long hesitation before South doubled 2♠. The Director ruled that the break in tempo was unauthorized information that suggested doubt about the double (Law 16A) and therefore suggested 3♥. Pass of 2♠ doubled was ruled a logical alternative. The contract was changed to 2♠ doubled down one, plus 200 for N/S.

**The Appeal:** N/S appealed the Director's ruling. North did not attend the hearing. South stated that they were playing a complex system and had not discussed in detail auctions after transfer jump overcalls. Pass had been game-forcing. Double was a suggestion of penalty and South believed it was reasonable for North to pull.

**The Committee Decision:** The Committee determined that: (1) There had been a break in tempo. (2) The information from the tempo break was clear. (3) The 3♥ bid was chosen from the alternatives of Pass, 3♥, and 3♠ as likely to be more successful than Pass and was therefore not permitted. The Committee then considered the defense to 2♠ doubled. While competent defenders will beat 2♠ doubled a good proportion of the time, the Committee decided that 2♠ was sufficiently likely to make that this result qualified as the most favorable result that was likely for the non-offenders and also the most unfavorable result that was at all probable for the offenders. The contract was changed for both pairs to 2♠ doubled made two, plus 670 for E/W. The Committee decided that the appeal lacked merit and assigned an Award Without Merit Penalty Point to N/S.

**The Facts:** 4♥ made four, plus 620 for E/W. North studied before bidding 2♠ and when South bid 3♣, North corrected her previous explanation and stated that 2♦ had probably been natural. The Director was called after the 3♦ bid. South stated that she had passed 2♠ as if she had not heard the Alert but believed that after the double she couldn't leave it in with a singleton spade. The Director ruled that North's explanation of 2♦ as showing the majors suggested the 3♣ bid and that the pass of 2♠ doubled was a logical alternative (Law 16A). The N/S contract was changed to 2♠ doubled down three, plus 800 for E/W (the most unfavorable result at all probable - Law 12C2). The E/W result was changed to the better of plus 620 or Average Plus (the most favorable result likely had there been no infraction - Law 12C2) ruling that plus 800 was not likely for E/W.

**The Appeal:** N/S appealed the Director's ruling. South stated that E/W were both so clearly pleased with the 2♠ doubled contract (the double was not agonized and the pass was in tempo) that her pull of the double was justified.

**The Committee Decision:** The Committee believed that pass by South was a logical alternative to pulling the double of 2♠. The contract was changed (for both pairs) to 2♠ doubled down three, plus 800 for E/W. The Committee believed that this appeal was without substantial merit and assigned an Appeal Without Merit Penalty Point to N/S.

**The Facts:** 4♥ doubled made four, plus 590 for N/S. The 2♣ bid was Alerted by North and explained as a transfer to diamonds when West asked before he doubled. South asked North to leave the room after West doubled and explained that he meant his 2♣ bid as Drury and that 2♦ had shown a full opening bid with no slam interest. The Director was called. North also explained that the 4♥ bid was not systemic. The Director ruled that any unauthorized information that was present had not been used and that the table result would be allowed to stand.

**The Appeal:** E/W appealed the Director's ruling. They (and their team captain) all believed that the unauthorized information could well have affected the outcome of the board. N/S produced system notes which supported North's explanation of South's bids. South said that he had decided to bid Drury because they played super acceptances. 2♠ and 3♦ would both show a good suit and a control. After either of these South planned to make a slam try, but after the natural 2♦ rebid he simply settled for game. Therefore, South claimed he didn't have any unauthorized information for the slam try.

**The Panel Decision:** South had unauthorized information from North's explanation but that did not affect South's 4♥ call. The unauthorized information that North had by being sent away from the table did not affect his decision to pass 4♥ doubled. East could

have avoided this situation by bidding 3♣ earlier in the auction but, since the Panel believed the decision did not need further justification, it was not addressed further. North could pass 4♥ doubled because he knew that the double was not based on a trump stack and North knew that South knew that North may well have only a four-card heart holding since N/S's convention card was marked 4+ in third/fourth seat. The Panel allowed the table result of 4♥ doubled made four, plus 590 for N/S, to stand.

**The Facts:** 4♥ made four, plus 420 for E/W. The Director was called after the 4♥ bid. North led the ♠K (2, J, 7) followed by the ♠A (3, 6, Q) and a third spade. The E/W convention cards showed that they played RONF and that their 2♥ bid showed 6-12 with two of the top three honors. The Director ruled that the out-of-tempo 3♥ bid did not "demonstrably suggest" the 4♥ bid and allowed the table result to stand.

**The Appeal:** N/S appealed the Director's ruling. Both sides agreed that there had been an unmistakable hesitation before the 3♥ bid. N/S argued that the slow 3♥ bid suggested something unusual about it and given that systemically it was not invitational, the 4♥ bid seemed very unusual and perhaps was influenced by the tempo. As to the play, North thought the ♠J followed by the ♠6 showed a doubleton with a desire to ruff; South thought the ♠J denied the ♠Q and the ♠6 was present count. South thought North should work out how many spades he had. East intended 3♥ to end the auction; he was deciding among 2NT (feature asking), Pass, or 3♥. Although E/W were a longstanding partnership they only recently specifically defined 3♥ as non-forcing. West stated that he forgot about RONF and thought 3♥ was invitational and that his hand clearly indicated a 4♥ bid.

**The Panel Decision:** The Panel believed that the out-of-tempo 3♥ bid conveyed extraneous information that demonstrably suggested 4♥ as a choice from among logical alternative actions (i.e. Pass). The slow 3♥ could have served as an alarm to West that (1) Partner was considering a stronger alternative (particularly with an unpassed partner and silent opponents) and/or (2) Partner had doubts about the meaning of 3♥ in a partnership which had recently redefined the meaning of this auction. Therefore, for E/W the contract was changed to 3♥ made four, plus 170, as per Law 12C2. However, the Panel believed that N/S had severed the link between the infraction and the damage (that the damage was subsequent but not consequent) by their misdefense. For N/S the table result of 4♥ made four, plus 420 for E/W, was allowed to stand. The two results were IMPed separately with their teammates and averaged as per Law 86B to obtain the IMP score on the board.
