Assini, however, has only recently returned to tournament play and has been enjoying anonymity at this tournament despite her team's success. "I like being unknown," said Assini, who manages a psychology clinic in the Cleveland area and does alternative healing.

Oshlag and husband Richard, who works at the ACBL in Memphis, are popular and well known in the South, but she has felt somewhat anonymous as part of the Assini team. On several occasions Wednesday, players passed by the playing area to wish Jabbour, Oshlag's partner, good luck, not knowing that Jabbour's partner was standing next to her. "Nobody knows who I am," Oshlag said.

Those who know their bridge history could tell you that Richard and Mary Oshlag, playing with Marty Bergen and Dori Cohen, finished second in the Mixed Board-a-Match Teams at the 1989 Summer NABC in Chicago. At the time, the event was known as the Master Mixed Teams.

## Senior, University Teams added to World Olympiad

The World Team Olympiad, which will take place in Maastricht, the Netherlands, in the fall of 2000, will be bigger and better than ever, according to Jose Damiani, president of the World Bridge Federation. Damiani was in San Antonio to address the ACBL Board of Directors and to present Kathie Wei-Sender as a member of the ACBL Hall of Fame.

Both the Open and the Women's Olympiad no doubt will be the biggest ever. Damiani expects teams from 80 nations in the Open and 55 nations in the Women's. There is a possibility that 16 teams will be qualified for knockout competition for the Open. Eight will be qualified in the Women's.

That used to be the end of it, but now it's only the beginning. There will be a Senior Olympiad, and a field of teams from 40 nations is likely. The early sessions will be Swiss, with the four leaders qualifying for the

Ari Greenberg and Joe Grue are the two 18 -yearolds who helped knock off the team of world champions in the Spingold Round of 64. They drew us next and played strong, solid bridge throughout the match. Still, with four boards to go the match was virtually over -- they were down 40 IMPs when this hand appeared.

I led the A , denying the king, and shifted to a club. The finesse certainly is the best play for the contract, but Greenberg felt the club was likely to be off. More importantly, he judged that our teammates would bid this slam -- they did -- and would take the club finesse -- they did. Needing a swing, he went up with ace, drew trumps, took a diamond finesse, ruffed a spade and ran the trumps. Our lead was down to 23.

On Board 62, they had a good preemptive auction, and we chose to defend rather than push to a thin game (on a trump guess).Their teammates duly bid and made the game, and our lead was down to 15 .

On Board 63 they earned 3 IMPs for an extra undertrick -- only 12 IMPs between us now with one board to go. This was the final board:

(1) Negative.

Betty led the $\$$. Grue won and led the 9 , won by Betty. She exited with a heart, and Grue played a diamond to his king and cashed a high heart, pitching a club from dummy. Decision time.

I had pitched one spade, so he was certain of the spade position. If I was 5-5-3-0, he had to play a diamond to the king and hope for that to be a winner. If I was 5-4-4-0, he makes by playing off his hearts, throwing clubs from dummy, setting up his long heart and endplaying me. That's what he chose, and he fell a trick shy.

Could he have pulled out the match here? No. Our teammates took their 300 against $3<$ doubled, so the youngsters couldn't have picked up more than 7 IMPs even if Grue had guessed right.

Still, it was a great run. I promise you will hear these names a lot in the future

semifinal knockouts.
In addition there will be a University World Championship, a completely new concept. This will be conducted under the auspices of the International University Sports Federation (FISU). Notice that key word -SPORTS. The FISU is associated with the International Olympic Committee, the group that recently recognized bridge as a sport. The University competition is expected to draw teams from as many as 30 universities around the world. Damiani expects that the event will be conducted as a complete round-robin.

## IOC Grand Prix adds women's event

The 1999 International Olympic Committee Grand Prix Tournament has added a women's team event and invited a North American team of four pairs to enter.

This year's competition, scheduled for Lausanne, Switzerland in early September, will feature two events: a contest among six of the best teams in the world and a women's competition between four North American pairs and four European pairs.

The first three pairs will be the winners of the 1999 Wagar Women's Knockout Teams at the Summer NABC in San Antonio (if they are eligible). If the team has only two pairs, they will be permitted to choose their third pair.

The fourth pair will be the pair of women who finish highest in the six-session Life Master Pairs here in San Antonio, providing the pair has played in the final session. If no women's pair makes it to the LM Pairs final, the players on the winning knockout team will choose their fourth pair. Final approval of both the Open and Women's team will be made by the ACBL Board of Directors.

North America's representative in the sixteam open event will be a combination of the teams that finished 1-2 in the Vanderbilt.

The winning team, captained by George Jacobs (Ralph Katz, Peter Weichsel, Alan Sontag, Alfredo Versace and Lorenzo Lauria), was unable to accept the invitation. The runners-up (Steve Robinson, Peter Boyd, Kit Woolsey, Fred Stewart, Michael Becker and Mike Kamil) were then invited.

Becker and Kamil were unable to accept but the other four accepted the invitation and added Jacobs and Katz.The other teams are from Brazil, China, France, Italy and the Netherlands.

A similar event was held last September with Brazil and China tying for the championship and North America finishing third.

Tournament competitors will be housed in The Palace, a five-star hotel. The games will be played in the IOC Museum.

Where nine tricks are going to come from is not easy to see. East started with the $\Delta \mathrm{K}$ in response to his partner's bid, the continued with the 9 , which was allowed to hold. East shifted to a club, won with dummy's 10 , and Low cashed the A. After taking the A he led a second diamond to the 10 , jack and king. East got out with a diamond to dummy's queen. Marc cashed the A , noting the fall of the queen from East. Reading the situation accurately, he led the $\$ 7$, forcing East to win with the 8 . East had only clubs left and had to let Marc take tricks with the good clubs in his hand.

But what was happening to West in the meantime? He was forced to come down to two cards. He had to keep the to cover declarer's queen, and he had to hold two hearts to over dummy's $\mathbf{K}$-10. And of course he couldn't. He discarded a heart, so Marc took the last two tricks with the $\mathbf{V}$-10. Altogether he took four clubs, three hearts and two diamonds for his game.

This represented a 7-IMP game since NorthSouth at the other table stopped in 1 NT , just making.

Marc was reminiscing about the days when Swiss Teams first came into existence. He got the idea from chess -- in the chess Swiss movement, winners play winners and losers play losers because there just isn't time for everyone to play everybody

Marc couldn't see any reason why the same concept wouldn't work in bridge. Instead of playing a full session of two or three-board matches as happened in board-a-match contests, why not play somewhat longer matches and score them on IMPs? Then on the next round winners would play winners and losers would play losers. In subsequent rounds pairings would be made by putting together teams with comparable records. This way the cream would slowly but surely move to the top.

For quite a while he couldn't find anyone who would let him test his concept in a tournament situation. But Carl Rubin, his District representative to the Board of Directors, thought the idea had merit, and he got permission from ACBL headquarters to let Marc try it once -- at a Cincinnati sectional.

The new game was an instant success. Players liked the fact that they had a chance to win against even the best teams, since the matches were short. They liked the longer matches. They liked the winloss concept.

The first time Swiss Teams was tried on the regional level, 98 teams signed up -- more than double the number that usually played in a board-a-match event. Swiss Teams were on their way. There have been many little refinements made in the game over the years, but basically the game is the same as it was when it was introduced more than 30 years -winners play winners and losers play losers.

## How to lose the Open Pairs

Mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa." These are common words heard at Mass, less frequently at the bridge table. Having finished third in the Stratified Open Pairs, five matchpoints out of first, I have plenty to confess.

The first story, however, concerns our first-round opponents, Bob and Joann Glasson (they had been rung at 5 a.m. to be told there was a fire at home in Pennington NJ -- fortunately, no damage done).

On the first deal, Bob led a king, losing to declarer's ace. Bob then led the ace of trumps out of turn but was told to put it back. But when he revoked by using the ace of trumps a trick prematurely, neither he nor Joann noticed -- and it was they who finished second. I guess they woke up later.
Enough of other people's problems. Here are my sins.

You are playing $4 \boldsymbol{~}$. West leads the $\$ 10$. Plan the play carefully to tricks one and two. Be specific. Did you put up the A to protect your entry to hand? Good. Did you lead the Q as I did? Well, you've blown it, too. The full deal:


I played the Q and a heart to the ace, finding the 41 trump split, but I was in the wrong hand. I led the 2 Q to the king, thinking that $4-1$ clubs were quite likely, and on the diamond return I could get to dummy only with a club. I passed the 10 but was stuck in dummy and had

## Lead that queen!

You know how it's right once in a while to lead a queen from an A-Q-10 holding against notrump? Of course most of us never find exactly the right time to do it. Bob Fendrick of Atlanta, however, found two opportunities to make such a lead on the same deal -and both times it was right!

Fendrick tried the $Q$ first. Declarer put up the king from dummy, which won. He passed the EJ to Fendrick's queen, and Fendrick considered his moves. Dummy's spade spots were low, so he decided to atack with the Q . Once again declarer put up the king to win the trick. He took a finesse to the 8 and cashed his three club tricks. He tried to get off lead with the ©J, but Fendrick just played low, endplaying declarer. He cashed his top hearts and led a third, but Charles Davis, East, won this with the queen and led a diamond through declarer's jack. Down one thanks to imaginative defense by Fendrick.
to lose a club ruff. If I had played the 9 to the ace at trick wo, it would have been plain sailing.

I promised not to name my opponents on this next deal, but it's such a funny story it must be told. This is your hand as South:

You bid 14 over your right-hand opponent's 1 © opener, LHO passes and partner bids 3NT. Partner clearly has a solid minor (diamonds, you think). Will it run? You pass and the bad news is that partner's diamonds are not exactly solid. In fact, partner has only one more diamond than you do. East leads the $A$ and you sense that this contract might be somewhat shaky. The full deal:

East has an awful lead problem at matchpoints. I led a club to partner's jack, which was ducked. The $\$$ Q also held (and note that East's 10 should imply spade values) and Jeff Aker as West knew I had started with four clubs to the K-10 and at most one queen. He found the deadly shift to the $\boldsymbol{\omega}$. Quite reasonably, declarer played for all the marbles. He won the A, played a diamond to the king and a heart to the 10 , losing, won the spade return in hand and took a second heart finesse. That let us cash out for down two. The extra undertrick was worth a complete top.

If you believe that every card means something, bridge becomes much more challenging, but also more rewarding.


Jeff led the 10 against this absolutely normal contract. I won the queen and returned the $\uparrow 3$. Jeff allowed the jack to hold, following with the 8 , his lowest card. Declarer overtook with dummy's king and cashed four diamond tricks with the aid of the finesse. Jeff followed up the line in diamonds.

I had two discards to make. One spade was easy, but I had to decide what to discard on the fourth diamond. Trusting partner, I led go of a club to keep my four hearts. Holding declarer to nine tricks for minus 150 was good for 10 out of 12 matchpoints.

The defense started with two spade tricks, so Zia, West, needed the rest. He rose with the ace when $\$ 7$ was continued. After cashing the A , he led a club and put in . . . the 10 ! "Since North had doubled and didn't have any hearts, I though he'd have four clubs, and I thought the chances were good that the jack was one of them." Then he led clubs, South ruffing the third and Zia overruffing. He cashed his trump king, then led the $\mathbf{v}$ to the 6 to run the clubs and score up his game

Zia won the $\$$ opening lead and led the $\$ 8$, letting it ride to drive out the king. South cashed two clubs, then led a diamond, Zia winning the king and pitching a club. He ruffed his last diamond, cashed the $\uparrow$ A and gave up a spade to North's queen. North returned a heart, and Zia rose with the king in dummy and led a heart to his jack. He got out of his hand with a club to the queen, and the defense was fixed. If North was allowed to win the Q , he would have to lead a diamond, Zia could ruff the diamond return, draw the last trump and cash the good $\mathbf{J}$. If South decided to ruff his partner's trick, he would have to lead a spade to the good 10 in dummy or lead a diamond for Zia to ruff and again cash the good club.

# Richie seems to know what horses are saying 

Richard Schwartz may not be a horse whisperer, but he sure seems to know what the horses are saying. Nowadays his overwhelming passion is bridge, but for many years he was a legend at the nation's racetracks.

It all started 30 years ago when Richie went to a track with a co-worker who told him that some big bettors actually were consistent winners. "That got me interested. I couldn't do much about that interest at first because I had to work for a living. But then there was a company-wide layoff, and suddenly I had the time.

"I started with the trotters. I'd buy the Daily Racing Form every day and I made a real effort. It wasn't long before I decided I never wanted to go back to a real job. I heard about some special sheets that some guys worked up, so I got to know them and they taught me how to use the sheets. About three years after I started looking at those sheets, they suddenly started talking to me. I could just tell who was going to run and who wasn't going to run.
"I think I have a raw talent for this. It's like a latent talent you never knew you had. I got more confident and started betting more. I looked to bet value and against bad favorites. The sheets got me to the point where I could make lots of money."

Lots of money? What's lots of money?
"I was betting $\$ 20,000$ a day, maybe more. I made
a lot of money. But it's a tough game. Even if you're one of the best, you probably are working with only a $5 \%$ edge. If your judgment is off just a little, forget it.'

There are lots of folks who go to the racetrack often and continually lose. What do they do that's so wrong?
"You always have to stay one step ahead of everyone else. You have to hate losing. You can't say you're just unlucky. You have to figure out what you're doing wrong. A lot of it has to do with how numbers relate to your mind -- my degree is in mathematics. If you're an artistic person, you don't stand a chance at the track."

Were you New York's biggest bettor and biggest winner?
"I probably wasn't the biggest bettor, but maybe I was the biggest winner."

Richie says he no longer has to work, so he can do what he wants to do. He still does some betting, but most of his time is spent concentrating on his investments -- and playing bridge.
"Yes, bridge is my passion today, and I'm happy that I'm in a situation where I can play as much as I want. But bridge has been important in my life ever since 1963 when I became friends with Fred Hamilton at Michigan State. At first we played pool and hearts, but eventually it was bridge. My roommate moved out at one point, and Fred moved in with me. Fred taught me a lot about the game, and I also got a lot out of reading Freddy Sheinwold's book, 5 Weeks to Winning Bridge."

Did you and Fred become a regular tournament partnership?
"No. After I got out of college, I played a lot with Ed Manfield for three or four years. Then in 1970 I gave up tournament bridge -- I was too busy with the horses. Betting at that time totally absorbed me. I didn't get back into tournament bridge until 1988. I was beginning to lose interest in the horses. There's a dehumanizing factor in gambling.
"Anyway I was at Santa Anita one day and I ran into Bill Eisenberg and Danny Rotman. We talked about bridge, and before you know it I had made a date to play with Billy at a Las Vegas regional. And I've been playing ever since. As Omar Sharif says, bridge is my passion."

Richie has done very well with his passion. He has won two Vanderbilts and he was the victor in the first IMP Pairs played at the North American level. He almost made it two in a row, finishing second the next year. He also has had seconds in the Spingold, the Open Pairs and the Cavendish Invitational.

## When is a hesitation a hesitation?

Rich Colker has written three erudite tracts on the subject of breaks in tempo and the consequences arising from them. Each of them in their own way has engendered controversy. While I do not specifically disagree with the conclusions, Ron Gerard and I would like to put our own spin on the Vancouver case the hesitation Blackwood affair.
Gerard and I have a more absolutist view. We believe that when a B-I-T (Break In Tempo) has been established, the harshest consequences should ensue. We do not believe in the existence of either the notion of partial pregnancy or a slight B-I-T. It is or it isn't.

In hesitation Blackwood, especially tough standards apply. The response to 4 NT or 5 NT is rarely (let's be charitable) a matter of judgment, and a B-I-T is especially revealing to partner.

The specifics of the case featured both opponents calling the tournament director as soon as the alleged infraction occurred. In committee both "non-offenders" confirmed their impression that there was a B-I-T. Their inability to be able to recreate the length of
pause in committee -- under completely different and rather stressful circumstances should not damn their case out of hand.

In the view of three of the seven members of the committee, a hesitation had been established, and the consequences from that point on should have been dictated by the Law. While we accept the right of the Tournament Committee overall to come to a different conclusion from us, we believe that tempo breaks in Blackwood sequences are especially revealing, and that even minor breaks in other "automatic" sequences (responding to Stayman, transfers or lebensohl) carry significant messages. After all, if your partner asks whether you have a major, how long does it take to respond?

In summary, the Appeals Committee is entitled to come to the conclusion that, in this case, there was no B-I-T. However, as soon as there is any departure from normal tempo in a sequence where the response should be nearly automatic, the highest standards are required, and breaches of those standards should result in the penalties as set out in the Laws.

## Americans featured in China Cup again

As a matter of fact, the World Stars team in the Open also will feature a team with an American background. The tournament will take place in Shenzhen in the south of China (near Hong Kong).

The ACBL team in the Open will consist of George Jacobs, captain, plus Ralph Katz, Brad Moss, Fred Gitelman and George Mittelman. All but Moss have played in the China Cup before. The team may add a sixth.

Once again Kathie Wei-Sender will be captain of the women's team She will play with Betty Ann Kennedy, and their teammates will be Juanita Chambers and Irina Levitina.

The newcomers are Rita Shugart and her teammates who won the Reisinger Board-aMatch Teams. Rita will be playing with Andy Robson, Tony Forrester and Geir Helgemo.

asked Snider if she wanted to direct. Her response: "I don't know anything about that.'

One thing she was good at was matchpointing. That was during the days before games were scored by computer. "I could add a sheet upside down as fast as other people could do it right side up."

Snider took the director's test in 1974 and has progressed from there. She now works regularly in MidAtlantic Bridge Conference tournaments and in Florida. With the rank of tournament director -- third highest behind national and associate national -- Snider has been a full-time ACBL employee for three years.

She finds her job interesting and stimulating. "It's my shot of energy," she says. "I miss the people when I don't see them."

Says Johnson, "Carey is so wonderful with people, and she's a top-notch director. She makes the players happy and the staff happy, and she is the embodiment of the team player."

Holmes grew up in Amarillo and learned to play bridge with her older sister and her parents. At one point, her sister had gone to college and her father was traveling in his work, so Holmes and her mother found their way to the local duplicate club. Holmes was about 15 at the time.
"I loved it," she recalls. "The players welcomed me with open arms and really wanted to help me."

Holmes moved around in the Southwest, eventually settling in Oklahoma City for a time. "I loved Oklahoma City," Holmes says. "They have a great bridge unit there."

In 1985, Holmes found herself out of work during a low period in the oil business, so she started running unit games in Oklahoma City. "The directing was great," she says. "I had found my niche."

Holmes lists many tournament directors on her list of mentors and/or supporters -- Phil Merry, Chris Patrias, Max Hardy, Tom Quinlan, Bob and Betty Bratcher, John Ashton and especially the late John Rogers -- "he was a friend but also a father figure. I have a special place in my heart for John Rogers, but a lot of people have taken me under their wings." She also was impressed that Sol Weinstein has used her to work at the MSN Gaming Zone Cavendish tournaments the last couple of years.

Holmes moved to Las Vegas in 1986. She has been full-time with the ACBL since 1994.

She says she enjoys the challenge of working on her communications skills, which she considers very important for a TD. "You have to have good communications skills because often you're telling people something they don't want to hear."

Her job, she says, "doesn't seem like work," and she is happy to be among "so many brilliant people." ACBL's tournament directors, she says, "are one big extended family. Everyone does such a fine job. It's an honor to be part of this group."

 Spingold round of eightThe Bull, still hallucinating from Vancouver, was able to twice watch the end of the championship game of the National Basketball Association. The Chicago Bulls lost when Michael Jordan missed the front end of a one and one with no time on the clock. But the Bulls filed an appeal. A committee of players whose teams had lost earlier in the playoffs convened, heard the case, and ruled Michael Jordan could shoot his free throws again! Jordan made the free throws the second time around, and this time his team, "Da Bulls," won the game by 1. For the Bull it was like deja vu all over again, as he had just seen the bridge folks allow a slam to be made on a "do over" in the Vancouver Vanderbilt. It could not be this way in other sports could it? Fortunately for the Bull, so far the San Antonio Spingold has been an appeal-free zone.

The 1999 Spingold has been an amazing display as seeds fell heavily in the middle rounds, but now, even with Shugart on the sidelines, there are four women in the round of eight:

## \#1 Nickell v. \#8 Colchamiro

Nickell shows the door to Colchamiro, who take a bow for the strongest performance by two mixed pairs in more than a quarter century.
\#2 Beatty v. \#7 Kovacich
The original No. 18, Beatty, versus the original No. 58 Kovacich with Bob White-Kevin Collins-PatTuckerK. Anderson Jr, and Joe McCabe, having blown out an all-star Rosenkranz squad, find themselves playing Hall of Famer Billy Eisenberg-Gary Hayden and OnstottBeatty. The pumpkin shows up for Cinderalla as the Beatty squad wins easily.
\#3 Baze v. \#6 Sosler
The original No. 14 Baze with his menage a trois Gittelman-Compton, and the steady Wittes-Grabel, play the Sosler-Schulle, Lanzarotti-Burratti, Balicki Zmudzinski. The only other woman will be watched along with the Poles and the reigning world champions from Italy. Baze is too tough, and beats Sosler in the closest match of the day by 2 .
\#4 Pavlicek v. \#5 Lev
The original No. 20, father and son Pavliceks, are playing with Hall of Famers Kay-Kantar, and the nearly Hasidic Granovetter-Lipsitz against the original No. 12 double triumvirate of Lev-Polowan-Mohan and Shivdasani-Murthy-Shenkin. LEV moves on to play Nickell in one semifinal as they beat Pavlicek by 10 .

The Facts: 4 made four, plus 620 for N/S. The Stop Card was used before the $2 \boldsymbol{d i d}$. The Director was called after the $3 \boldsymbol{b i d}$ and East alleged there had been a break in tempo in excess of the time allowed. N/S did not agree. The Director ruled that passing 24 was not a logical alternative and allowed the table result to stand.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. East estimated a 15 -second total elapsed time before South passed 24. E/W noted that some hesitation had occurred after the Stop Card was removed. West was less clear on the amount of time taken but believed there had been a break in tempo. North stated that although 3 was not without some risk, pass was not a logical alternative in a good matchpoint game. Neither North nor South believed that more than 10 seconds was taken.

The Committee Decision: The three players consulted gave the following opinions: (1) pass was not a logical alternative, (2) passing might be an alternative to a minority, and (3) a significant number of players (a minority) would pass but the better the player, the less likely that they would. None of the players consulted would ever pass themselves. The Panel was not convinced that an "unmistakable" break in tempo had occurred. E/W seemed somewhat unclear on the proper use of the Stop Card and may have attached too much significance to any time spent after the Stop Card was withdrawn because of their mistaken belief that once the Stop Card is removed, the opponent must bid. Proper procedure is to withdraw the Stop Card well before 10 seconds has elapsed. The Panel did not believe that pass was a logical alternative for the level of the player involved even though the players consulted believed that pass would be a logical alternative for a minority of players. The Panel allowed the table result of $4 \mathbf{~ m a d e}$ four to stand.

Levitina certainly had lots of defense against a spade contract, but she decided to pass rather than double. She opened the $\boldsymbol{e} \mathrm{K}$, and Charles Davis led a diamond after winning the $\boldsymbol{\&} \mathrm{A}$. Levitina, not sure of the count, rose with the ace and tried to cash her 2 Q . Davis ruffed, crossed to a diamond, cashed a third diamond to get rid of one heart, then took the 2 J and pitched another heart. As a result the defense was limited to one diamond, one heart and two trumps (note the spots).

It appears that the defense will do much better if North refuses the first diamond, then switches to the $\geqslant K$ when in with the A. It's likely that the defense can inflict a one-trick set, but that's about all. Declarer would duck the $\nabla \mathrm{K}$, and now North has to switch to a trump to prevent declarer from ruffing a heart. Declarer wins, cashes his top trumps and puts North in with a trump. North can take two trumps and when he leads the e Q, declarer lets him hold it. Now North must lead a minor suit, which allows dummy to cash a diamond for the sluff of a heart from declarer's hand. The defense takes two trumps, a diamond, a club and a heart.
