

McCarver works baseball, but he thinks bridge

No doubt when you think of Tim McCarver, you think of baseball. McCarver thinks baseball, too – after all he is a network commentator for the FOX network. But that's not what he thinks during his leisure hours. He thinks bridge.

He started thinking bridge way back in the Sixties when he played for the St. Louis Cardinals. Several members of the team were playing the game, and he got interested after he watched them a few times. It wasn't long before he was hooked.

"I don't play much competitive bridge any more, but I play bridge all the time," he said. "Eight years ago a friend gave me a Prostaff 350 – a computer bridge game – and I play



with it all the time. I don't know what I'd do without it. I love the game, and this gives me something enjoyable to do while I'm doing so much traveling."

Do many baseball players play bridge?

"Quite a few," McCarver answered. "Most players like to play cards – hearts, poker and cribbage are quite popular. Nowadays lots of players like backgammon. Cards provide a wonderful way to while away the time when you're on the road."

McCarver had quite a career in baseball – he played major league ball in four decades – just barely. He started in 1959, and he played one month for the Phillies in 1980.

"Bridge was the big game with the Phillies," he said. "At one time we had two tables of bridge on that team – that's about one-third of the team's 25-player roster."

McCarver played part of the year for the Boston Red Sox when they won the pennant in 1975 – but he wasn't there for the World Series. "But I still got a one-third share of the playoff money – \$4400. And I needed every penny of it at the time."

\$4400? That doesn't sound like much these days, does it? The word "millions" is common when people talk about player salaries. What does McCarver think about today's huge salaries?

"The players deserve every penny they get," he said in no uncertain terms. "They're making lots of money for the owners. It's all a part of a capitalistic society. Ballplayers offer great entertainment, and people are willing to pay to see them play. Let me say it again – they deserve every penny they get."

Landen, Zerbini win NAP Flight A

Two old friends from college, playing in their first North American championship together, surged from fourth place with a session to go to win the North American Pairs, Flight A.

The 2003 champions, representing District 12, are Steve Landen, Rochester Hills MI, and Michael Zerbini, Clarkston MI.

Second place went to the District 25 pair of Frank Merblum, Bloomfield CT, and Doug Doub, West Hartford CT.

Zerbini and Landen knew each other at Oakland University in Rochester MI and were roommates at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. Zerbini and Perry Johnson came in second in the Men's Pairs in 1979, but Zerbini hasn't played much tournament bridge since then.

He has, however, kept up with bridge, playing weekly for 20 years in a very tough rubber bridge game with the likes of Johnson and Chuck Burger. Since he retired as a radiologist last July, Zerbini has played a lot more duplicate.

Treadwell honored for Appeals work

Dave Treadwell received a special plaque last night honoring him for his outstanding service to the ACBL Appeals Committee over the years. He co-chaired the committee from 1975 to 1991 and has performed many additional tasks concerning appeals over the years.

The 90-year-old star made his first mark at the national level 67 years ago when he placed second in the President's Pairs in 1936. He also has two North American titles to his credit - the North American Swiss Teams in 1982 and the Master Mixed Teams in 1985.

He usually plays two sessions a day, but he says he may cut down a bit at this tournament. "But I'm still going to play in the Vanderbilt," he said. He is a Grand Life Master with nearly 23,000 masterpoints.

He also is a grand master of telling stories – really tall ones. Watch out if he stops you with a super-serious look on his face.

Treadwell has been one of the major personalities in the game all through the years. He is a member of the Hall of Fame and he was the ACBL Honorary Member in 1985. He was chairman of the Board of Governors from 1979 to 1981. He has filled many major positions in District 4. From 1995 to 1998 he was chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee.

Should you split the honors?

Things got interesting on this deal from the first qualifying session of the North American Open Pairs.

The defense played three rounds of hearts, East ruffing the third. East led a trump and South inserted the 10 since he didn't want declarer to win a cheap trick with the 9. Dummy's king won and declarer finessed successfully in clubs. Declarer led another trump, and once again South split his honors, playing the jack. The ace won and declarer took another successful club finesse. After East cashed

When declarer led his last club, He was able to ruff it in dummy. He took another trick by force with his & 8-7 for plus 670 and 24 of 25 matchpoints.

South can defeat this contract by not splitting his honors. Even though declarer can win a cheap trick with the trump 9, later he has to ruff a club with a high spade. The defenders wind up taking two spades, two hearts and two diamonds for down one.

Convention cardsit takes two!

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only Class A conventions and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.



Attention Juniors! A change in coupons

At this tournament Junior Coupons are good for entry to any event for just \$6.

Coupons will be available only to ACBL members who are residents of Zone 2 (North America, including Bermuda) who are either (1) 21 years of age or younger or (2) full-time students between 22 and 25 years of age . Full-time students must offer proof of eligibility prior to purchasing their entry.

New pre-Alert/Disclosure forms

If your partnership plays special overcalls, you must fill out a new pre-Alert/Disclosure form and make it available to your opponents when you play in events that allow Mid-Chart and Super-Chart conventions.

This applies to NABC+, regional or higher knockouts and Flight A Swiss games. Look for the light blue forms on the table where convention cards are available.

Notice to players

Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.

Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word — such as "transfer" — and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or announcement has been made.

Do you guess well?

Just before each North American championship gets under way, a small competition takes place among members of the Board of Directors and members of the ACBL staff. The Directors divide up into three teams – East, Central and West. The Staff won in Phoenix last fall, and they were gunning for a repeat here. This hand was played by Kathy Baum, wife of CEO Jay Baum. Peter Rank, ACBL counsel, was her partner. He is playing his 58th year of bridge, he tells us.

Here are the North-South hands and the bidding.

Rank started with $1 \blacklozenge$, reversed in hearts and then jumped in spades, guaranteeing a powerful hand with shortness in clubs. At the table Kathy actually passed, but she played the hand to the maximum and collected 12 tricks. We have posed the hand as a slam problem, however. Of course if the opponents attack clubs you'll make 12 tricks by ruffing two clubs and scoring 10 top-card tricks. But the opponents don't cooperate – they lead a trump. What's your line of attack?

Did you try to ruff the two clubs anyway? Of course they led back a second trump. You were able to ruff two clubs all right, but you had to use the $\bullet K$ as an entry for the second ruff. That means you have no way back to your hand to draw the last trump. So you have to try something else.

Of course it's necessary to get at least one club ruff, so you win the first trick in dummy and lead a club, carefully noting who wins the trick. East rises with the ace, which hints that West may hold the king, an important observation. You win the second trump in hand and ruff one club. Then you draw the last trump.

If either red suit breaks 3-3, you're fine, but you know that's not the case if we're presenting this hand as a problem.

Suddenly the AQ has become a very important card. If West has the &K, as you have decided, then it's important for you to guess who has the diamonds and who has the hearts. No matter which scenario, you cash two top diamonds first. If you think West has four hearts, you cash another diamond and cross to the \mathbf{V} K. When you cash the last trump, West can't hold three hearts and the **&**K. Twelve tricks Something similar happens if West has four diamonds. Instead of cashing the third diamond, you take your top hearts, ending in your hand. Now you cash your last last trump. West can't hold onto two diamonds and the *K. Twelve tricks. But wait! What if East went up with the A but actually has the king as well? If East has the four hearts, the same line of play works - cashing the •Q squeezes East in hearts and clubs. The same is true if he has the four diamonds - cashing the hearts and the last trump wipes East out. Twelve tricks. That means you can always take 12 tricks – as long as you're a good guesser. Kathy followed the correct line of play through cashing two diamonds. When she saw East follow with the 6 and then the 9, she decided West was the one with the four diamonds. So she cashed her top hearts, ending in hand, and took her last trump. She still had the AQ

The Norman Conqueror

Today is a "Day of Tribute to Norman Kay," the genial Philadelphian whose bridge reputation was exceeded only by his personal reputation as a kind and generous friend.

Kay's bridge career began when, as a high school senior, he was invited to play bridge with a friend and his family.

"I'd love to," was his reply, "but I don't play bridge."

"Oh, that's no problem," said the friend. "Come over a half-hour early and I'll teach you."

That 30-minute lesson would pay dividends for the next five decades.

Kay won his first North American title in 1955 — the Masters Individual, a test of adaptability. He also won the McKenney Trophy (now the *Barry Crane Top 500*) that same year.

Kay was named ACBL's top performance player for the double decade 1957-77. Partnered by Sidney Silodor before his death in 1963 and later by Edgar Kaplan, Kay had 13 major wins in those 20 years: four Vanderbilts, two Spingolds, four Reisingers, one Blue Ribbon Pairs and two Open Pairs.

He was a World Bridge Federation Life Master who placed second in the Bermuda Bowl in 1961 and 1967, second in the World Olympiad Teams in 1968 and third in 1960.

He was elected to the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame in 1996 and was named the 2001 ACBL co- Honorary Member.

When Kay was inducted into the Hall of Fame (the induction ceremonies were held here in Philadelphia during the Spring NABC), Kaplan (who died the following year) spoke about his longtime friend:

"His bidding style is not adventurous, but when he bids something, he makes it. When he doubles the opponents, they go down – and there is a lot to recommend that point of view.

"But the one thing I dislike about playing with Norman is the hundreds of times I have gotten up from the table after a session against two opponents who have looked at us, beaming with approval, and told us what a great pleasure it was to play against us.

"It has happened more times than I can count that an opponent has played a vulnerable game and by some obscure combination of circumstances, he played about six right cards and ended up making some impossible contract.

"Now, even I, under Norman's tutelage, have learned to turn to my opponent and say, 'That was very nicely played'. But Norman says it with such warmth that, in fact, I happen to know that he is taking pleasure in the opponents' pleasure in having made the contract."

Discounted daily parking will be available during the NABC. The rate will be \$10.

The early players will be able to park from any time before 10 a.m. until 7:30 p.m. for \$10.

Those playing in regional and national events will be able to arrive as early as 11 a.m. and stay until 4:30 a.m. — for \$10.

The garage is the "Parkway Parking" lot on 12th Street, south of Sansom. That is one and a half blocks south of the Marriott on the west side of 12th Street.

You can even park in the lot, take a ticket as you park and buy your discounted ticket at the Information Desk on the 5th floor of the Marriott.

The Information Desk will be open from 6-7:45 p.m. on Thursday, March 6, and 8 a.m.-12:45 p.m. and 5:30-7:15 p.m. Friday, March 7, through Saturday, March 15.

Turn 'em off

Cell phones, audible pagers or any similar communication equipment may not be operated or operable in the playing area during a session of play at NABCs except for health-related equipment or by permission of the director-in-charge of the tournament or event.


