When he was in school at the University of Georgia, Olin Hubert could tell who among those in his circle were "serious" – about bridge, that is.

"I more or less majored in bridge," said Hubert, now a full-time tournament director whose home

base is Atlanta. "You could tell who was serious about bridge by who went off to class. There were a dozen people in my group then who now have more than 1000 masterpoints each."

Hubert spent three years at UGA but dropped out to play bridge full time, mostly at the Atlanta Rubber Bridge Club, which he ended up buying in 1972. He closed it four years later.

Playing four-handed and trailing by 17 IMPs, the team captained by Morris Chang rallied in the final quarter to win the Senior KO by 27. The victors are Morris Chang, a resident of both California and Taiwan; Bobby Wolff, Las Vegas; Neil Chambers, Schenectady NY; and John Schermer, Seattle WA.

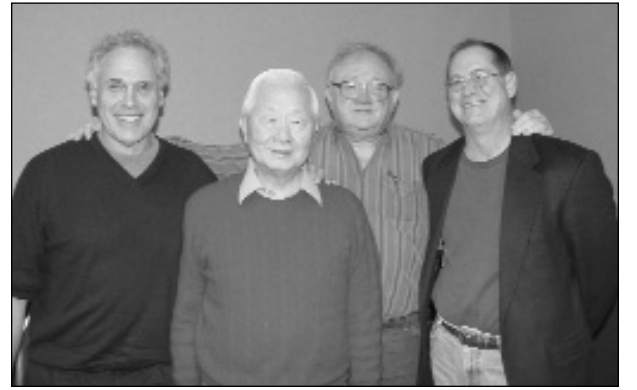
"Our teammates played great," said Wolff. "Schermer and Chambers never thought we would lose, even though we were down."

When asked about playing four-handed, Wolff said, "None of our teammates wanted to sit out. I would prefer a seven- or eight-man team," he joked. Now are they going to rest? No, tomorrow is a Bracketed KO.

"The Senior events are getting tougher and tougher. You don't have a few of the top super-stars, but the caliber of play was excellent," said Wolff. "You also don't have the intimidation factor of

complex systems, systems where you have to play detective. Those have no place in bridge," he continued. Wolff has long been an advocate of disallowing what he refers to as "destructive systems"

Challenge matches set

Two challenge matches pitting North American and European teams are scheduled for next year.

Bob Hamman, who is in the thick of both events, said the first will be in Dublin, Ireland, Sept. 17-20 just before golf's Ryder Cup match in that country. The bridge match is patterned after the Ryder Cup but will be called something like the Continental Challenge.

Each side will have 12 players.

In December of next year, there will be a challenge match in Rome between the Nick Nickell team, of which Hamman is a member, and an Italian team captained by Francesco Angelini.

Hamman said the match commemorates the 100th anniversary of the Rome Tennis Club Bridge Division. The match will take place at the tennis club, tentatively Dec. 7-10.

Hamman said the format of the match, including the number of boards to be played, has not been determined.

The teams will be Nickell-Dick Freeman, Hamman-Paul Soloway and Jeff Meckstroth-Eric Rodwell versus Angelini-Antonio Sementa, Fulvio Fantoni-Claudio Nunes, Alfredo Versace- Lorenzo Lauria.

Schermer and Chambers have a long-distance partnership. They use the Internet to practice. The pair also talk on the phone almost daily to discuss bridge. Chambers is a tax accountant for a grocery store chain. His vacation time is limited so they confine their play mostly to NABCs. Schermer owns his own contracting business.

When asked about playing four handed, Schermer said "I just tried to concentrate. We felt confident."

Chang and Wolff have been partners since the Seventies. Chang was an executive with Texas instruments. When he moved to Texas, the Aces were just starting out. He and Wolff were introduced and have played together many times in the intervening 30-odd years.

Chang began playing bridge in college at MIT. Besides working for Texas Instruments, he founded his own company called Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing in 1985. It is very successful and traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

The runners-up were gracious both at the table and after the defeat. "The behavior at the table was magnificent," said Wolff. "Our opponents were more than forthcoming in alerting and explaining bids."

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Keep your balance!

♠K Q 5 4 ♥A 3 2 ♦Q J 10 ♣10 9 8
 ♠K Q 5 4 ♥A 6 5 4 ♦Q J 10 ♣J 10
 ♠K Q 5 ♥A 6 5 ♦Q J 9 8 7 ♣J 10

In bridge, the above hand patterns are the so-called "balanced hands." Each has no unusually long suits, no voids or singletons, at most one doubleton. In modern standard bidding in the Western hemisphere, a hand with one of these patterns and 15 to 17 or 18 points is opened and overcalled 1NT.

If you were playing in one of the many parts of the world where England has been a dominant force, you might have a different protocol. The British system, called "Acol," promises only about 12-14 high-card points to go with a balanced hand. This so-called weak 1NT was popular in the West in the Sixties and Seventies. Conversely, slightly stronger 1NT ranges of 16-18 were also widely popular all the way into the Eighties.

So, what's right? The answer is simple: it's whatever you and your partner agree to. But if you want to sit down and play with others in North America and many other parts of the world, you should think "Sweet Sixteen." Your 1NT range should be within a point or two of 16.

♠K J 7 4 ♥A 9 2 ♦K Q 8 6 ♣Q 8

You might ask, why isn't it just as good to open 1♦? Then, if partner bids 1♥, I could still bid 1♠. And if partner bids spades, I can raise to 2♠. There's nothing horrible about such bidding—except that you could bid the same way if your hand was

♠J 7 5 4 ♥A 9 2 ♦K Q 8 6 ♣Q 8.

In fact, any time your hand fits one of the three balanced patterns and has the appropriate number of HCP, it's more descriptive—and much easier—to open 1NT.

Not only do opening bids of 1NT promise balanced hands, but so do rebids made by the opening bidder at the first opportunity.

♠J 7 5 ♥A 9 5 2 ♦K Q 8 6 ♣Q 8.

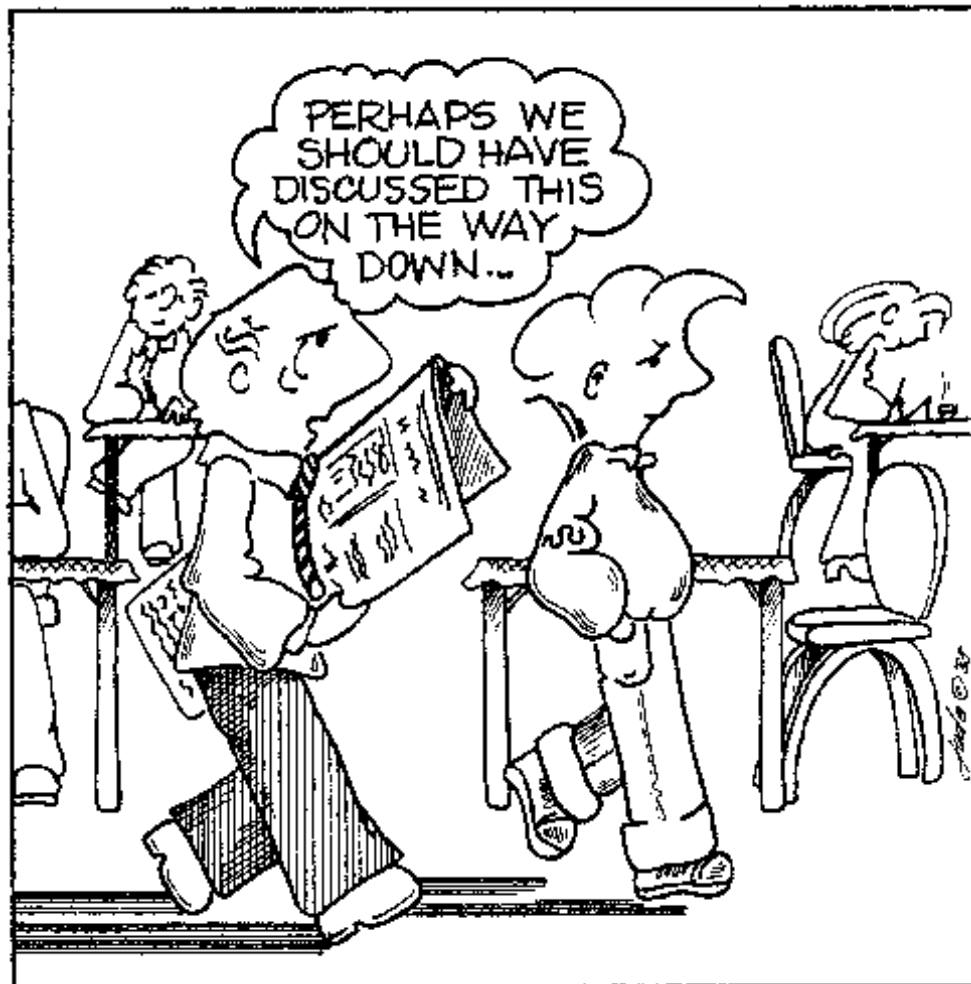
When you open this hand 1♦, it is because there are too few HCP for a 1NT opening. If partner answers 1♠, 1NT is the only available rebid to describe your balanced minimum hand.

The 1NT rebid tells partner to expect 12-14 HCP but no more than three spades—maybe even two spades, but never one or none.

♠J ♥A Q 9 7 ♦K 8 4 3 ♣K J 6 3.

No question this time: you have an unbalanced hand because of the spade singleton. You open 1♦, partner responds 1♠ (of course). You must not be tempted to rebid 1NT. Rebid 2♣.

Unbalanced hands aside, 1NT a great choice as an opener (when you meet the HCP requirements) because it is so specific and descriptive. Once you have opened 1NT or rebid it after partner's one-level response, it is nice



to know you can relax and let your partner make all the decisions. You may have to answer a question if partner asks one (via Stayman, for example), but that will be the limit of your responsibilities in the bidding phase of the hand.

What you should remember for opening 1NT or rebidding 1NT.

Opening 1NT promises 15-17 HCP (you and partner can have a different range if you prefer).

A rebid of 1NT shows a balanced opener short of the requirements to open 1NT. Both bids indicate hands with no singletons or voids.

Once in a great while you will pick up a balanced hand that is too strong for an opening of 1NT. It won't happen often! The protocols in that case are simple:

With 18-19 HCP, open one of the appropriate suit. If partner responds at the one level, rebid 2NT unless you have four of partner's major. For example:

♠K J 9 ♥A Q 7 ♦A Q 6 5 ♣K 8 6

You open 1♦, and partner bids 1♥. Now is the time to jump to 2NT. You have a balanced hand that is too good to open 1NT.

Thinking bridge

Opening lead: ♦K.

Bidding commentary: No point in East bidding spades with such a marvelous heart fit. The vulnerability is working against North as far as bidding again. In any case, North has already shown a reasonable hand with the 3♦ bid and South had a chance to bid.

Defensive commentary: This is a defensive problem for South, who sees that imposing spade suit in dummy along with strong trumps. If this contract is to be defeated, the defense must score three clubs and a diamond – pronto. Cashing three clubs is not all that easy. It requires North to have the ♠A Q 10

(with the ♠A K 10, North might have led the suit). Furthermore, it requires that South lead the jack to prevent West from ducking a low club lead to North. To win a gold star, South must overtake the ♦K and shift to the ♣J.

When the defenders see a long running side suit in the dummy along with strong trumps on both sides, it is vital to cash side-suit winners as quickly as possible. This may entail leading a key suit (clubs) from one particular side of the table through a presumed king. If three tricks are needed, the honor must be led from holdings such as 10-x-x-(x), J-x-x-(x) or Q-x-x-(x).

Beware of Zeke's daring shifts

You've heard of the expression "Beware of Greeks bearing gifts?" How about changing that slightly to "Beware of Zeke's daring shifts."

Playing with Zeke Jabbour in the Compact KO on Thursday, I encountered a defensive problem. We were playing with Jon Greenspan and Joyce Sillins. Our opponents at the table were Drew Casen and Jim Krekorian.

After the lead of the ♠A, I signaled for a club shift. Zeke thought for a bit and played the ♥8. Declarer won in hand, played ♣A and ruffed a club, then ruffed his spade loser in dummy.

When he led a diamond from the dummy, I won the ace and gave Zeke a heart ruff for down one.

If Zeke returns a club at trick two instead, declarer can win it, ruff a club, ruff his spade loser in dummy and lead a diamond. Now he can lead trumps, win whatever I return, and squeeze me in hearts and clubs — I can't protect both suits.

Perhaps if Zeke had ignored my signals more often, we would still be in the Senior KO Teams instead of losing in the quarterfinals on Wednesday.

Bid for show, play for dough

Do you remember that old golfing adage, "You drive for show and put for dough."? It certainly applies in the bridge sense to this deal:

East-West did well in the auction, quickly setting up a game forcing auction and agreeing diamonds, thereafter making a series of cuebids before arriving in the grand slam.

North led the ♥4 and declarer won in hand, and played a diamond to the jack, discovering the 4-0 split.

He played a club to the ace, ruffed a club, ruffed a spade, ruffed a club and cashed the ♠A and the top hearts to get rid of his losing clubs. Now he only needed to return to hand to draw trumps, but the 5-2 spade break meant North was bound to score a trump trick.

Let's rewind to trick one.

Declarer should win the opening lead in dummy, preserving the heart entry and play a club to the ace and ruff a club. He returns to hand with a heart and ruffs a second club. Now he cashes the ♦J, followed by his major-suit winners, discarding the losing clubs from his hand. Now he can ruff a spade, draw trumps and claim.

It's a simple point, but one that defeated many of the declarers who were faced by the problem.

Fallenius ruffed the club and offered an unhelpful ruff-sluff by playing the ♠J. Pettis pitched a club from hand as he ruffed the spade in dummy. A heart went to the 9 in declarer's hand, then Pettis finessed the ♦Q, cashed the ♦A and ruffed a diamond to hand, leaving this end position:

When too tired to shuffle, the stranded players rolled up in blankets provided by the hotel staff and slept on the floor.

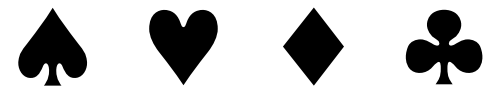

West now passed, showing interest if partner wished to bid on – West did have the three missing key cards. East trusted his partner's pass and surmised that he must have the requisite key cards. Accordingly, he bid the grand slam and raked in all the matchpoints.

“This is what we need to get covered,” he said. “It shows that the face of bridge is changing.”

Hamman said he has done some behind-the-scenes work to try to get broader publicity for the youngsters, including possible appearances on some late-night television shows. “We’ve got to take advantage of this,” Hamman said, “and we’ve got to get this outside of our universe.”

Wolpert, meanwhile, said the win had more to do with steady play than with brilliancy on their parts.

“You need a lot of luck to win these things,” he said. “We didn’t blow too much.”

Wolpert, only 23 himself, has done a lot in bridge at such a young age – and he counts the Blue Ribbon win as “number one for sure – not just because of the event but that I won with Jenny.”

On this deal from the first final session, the young players put themselves in a position to benefit from a mistake – and it happened.

Ryman started with the ♥A, reading her partner’s 3 as suit preference for clubs. Accordingly, she switched to the ♣K, playing another when Wolpert signaled encouragement. On the third round of clubs, declarer had to decide what to do. As you can see, North could ruff the third round of clubs successfully with any spade in his hand save one: the king. It was the good fortune of the winners, however, that North chose to ruff the club with the ♠K and could not avoid one down. Plus 100 was good for 32 out of 38 matchpoints.

On this deal from the second final session, a well-reasoned bid by Ryman paid off handsomely.

West’s 2♣ was Precision, showing a hand of up to 15 high-card points with five clubs and a four-card major or any hand with six or more clubs.

Ryman might have bid 2♠ in the balancing seat, but that wouldn’t necessarily show the strength of her hand – plus, it had to be better to have the 2♣ bidder leading up to her strong holding in clubs.

As the play went, West did not get the defense off to the best start, leading a low heart. Ryman finished with 10 tricks for plus 630 and 35.5 out of 38 matchpoints.

Pre-duped hands a boon to the NABC

All you players at the NABC, the one thing Brenda Hopper wants you to know is that if your finesses fail, or the hands are especially hard, or if you go down 1400 – *it's not her fault!*

Hopper is the ACBL employee who works the hardest at preparing the pre-duplicated boards for the NABCs. For Denver, there were 201 sets of boards.

The deals are created at Headquarters using the random-deal program created by ACBLscore creator Jim Lopushinsky.

Hopper then makes her way to the ACBL warehouse, off-site, and works hours on end to get the hands into the proper boards using the Duplimate machine created in Sweden.

With the aid of bar coding, the Duplimate optically scans each card and deposits it in the proper slot in a lightning-fast process. The Duplimate has sensors that know if a card went to the wrong slot, so it's virtually foolproof.

Once Hopper completes a set of boards, they are put in a cardboard box designated for a specific event. The box is then taped up and will not be opened until it's time for the boards to be used.

The boards are shipped to the NABC ahead of time and kept in a locked, secure place until just before game time.

Hopper is aware that some people believe the computer-dealt hands are somehow manipulated to be especially difficult. It's not true.

All hands generated for use at ACBL tournaments are created as they come out of the computer. The ACBL employees who get them ready for delivery to tournaments are not bridge players. They wouldn't know how to manipulate a deal if they were so inclined.

Even so, Hopper doesn't want anyone to think she might have any influence on those finesses or foul trump splits. "I didn't do it!" she says.
