NABC update: Hugh Ross



Before last year, Hugh Ross was a regular at NABCs. A three-time Bermuda Bowl champion and winner of numerous North American titles, Ross is still recovering from a stroke. The following is a letter Ross sent to Mike Becker, who was given

permission by Ross to share it with you.

Dear Mike: Thank you for thinking of me. First of all, to bring you up to date on my progress. I had the stroke on June 23 last year. I was in the hospital for over six weeks.

At the beginning I was unconscious, by the time I was released from the hospital I was walking and talking. My doctors were not optimistic about my chances of recovery. I was fortunate enough to avoid any pain or limits to my mobility, and avoid any permanent physical disabilities.

I hike several miles most days, and you cannot tell from looking at me that I ever had a stroke. I saw a lot of stroke victims at the hospital and I am extremely grateful that I came out of it as well as I did. (My wife) Min looked after me well and held everything together during the dark early days of uncertainty about my condition. I owe her more than I can ever repay.

Better times have arrived. I spent a week in Vancouver with my family in December and a week in Paris with Min celebrating my birthday in February. We plan two more trips this year. One is Italy in May to celebrate our 35th anniversary, the other is Seattle in August to see Wagner's Ring for my annual Wagner opera fix. To me, Wagner is even more addictive than bridge.

In spite of all the good things that have happened, my quality of life has changed dramatically.

The stroke damaged my eyesight in an insidious way. Part of my field of vision in the right eye is gone. I now have a blind spot which causes me to bump into things now and then. It also makes driving unsafe for me.

The damage is unlikely to get better, but we *Continued on page 5*

Locals take lead in Silver Ribbon

Richard Finberg of Pittsburgh and Constance Hoechstetter of suburban Coraopolis took a narrow lead after two qualifying sessions of the Silver Ribbon Pairs, restricted to players 55 and older

The leaders' score of 1231.96 (top of 38) was 14.44 ahead of the second-place pair, Marla Chaikin of Monmouth Beach NJ and William Esberg of Long Branch NJ.

Not far behind them were Chris Larsen of Costa Mesa CA and James Gordon of South Burlington VT, about one matchpoint ahead of Gerald Gitles of Chicago and Michael Edwards of Rock Island IL. Goodwill Committee are inextricably linked. In fact, although she has offered to step aside for a "fresh face" at any time, it's difficult to imagine anyone else in the role of hostess of the thrice-yearly meeting of ACBL's goodwill ambassadors.

Curiously, Osofsky was not even a member of the Goodwill Committee when she was appointed chair in 1985. She was voted in by the ACBL Board of Directors in 1984, to take over the following year.

She received a phone call with the news from Frank Stewart, who was then on the ACBL Bridge Bulletin staff. After Stewart informed Osofsky that she had been appointed chair of the committee, he asked her, "What do you have to say?"

Said Osofsky: "I need to sit down."

The Goodwill Committee was created in 1955 to promote goodwill and good manners among the players. Since Osofsky took over 20 years ago, the scope of the committee's efforts has expanded considerably.

Since she took over, the committee has begun to promote active ethics, awareness of the hearing impaired, support of Junior, Youth and charity programs and the naming of the Goodwill Member of the Year.

Seven former Goodwill Members of the Year are expected at today's reception.

When Osofsky was informed of her appointment as chair, she was perplexed because "I had no clue what my job was supposed to be."

Not to worry. Since she graduated from high school in Brooklyn at the age of 15, Osofsky has been meeting challenges in a variety of areas.

A native of Brooklyn, the former Aileen Bryant and her family moved around a lot. Her father was a contractor and had a lot of work during World War II building barracks for women in the U.S. Army.

Right after graduating high school, she lied about her age and went to work for a five and dime store in Harrisburg PA, later becoming a long distance telephone operator.

She and Meyer "Mike" Osofsky, who was to become her husband, attended the same high school in Brooklyn. They were married during World War II, and when he was discharged from the military – he was a tail gunner on a B-24 – he started a women's clothing business, calling it Aileen Inc. Osofsky worked with her husband in the business for a time, but he ultimately

Ruth Steinberg

Steinberg and her husband, Philip (LM #350), won a number of regional titles together.

Glenn Smith, former ACBL president and former District 8 representative to the ACBL Board of

Directors, remembers the couple: "When I began playing around 1952, the word was that Ruth was one of the very best women players of the time (and maybe the word 'women' could be omitted). I played some with Phil and his basic style was exciting.

"Ruth did enjoy telling me that she and Phil were vacationing in Hawaii (non-bridge) and were asked in the hotel lobby (a regional was in progress) if they played bridge and could they play to complete a table.

"Naturally, it wouldn't be a story if they didn't win. They did."

Opening lead: ♠A (ace from A-K in unsupported suits at trick one only)

Bidding commentary: The normal way to handle a major-minor two-suiter with opening bid values after RHO opens is to overcall in the major and then bid the minor, preferably at the three level. Playing Michaels cuebids, if the opening bid is 1♥ or 1♠, a cuebid of opener's major shows five cards in the other major along with five or six cards in an unknown minor. The range is 8 to 11 high-card points, or 15+HCP. "Tweeners" with 12-14 HCP (the East hand) bid both suits. Making a takeout using Michaels is not an option. Not using Michaels, one needs 18 or more HCP to make a takeout double followed by a bid of your own suit...

Defensive commentary: West plays highlow in spades to show a doubleton. East knows that West can ruff the third spade. When giving partner a ruff with a choice of cards, the size of the card returned is considered suit preference and asks for a particular return.

A low card (in this case a low spade) asks for the lower ranking side suit (clubs); a high spade asks for the higher ranking side suit (diamonds). As East wants a diamond return, he plays the AJ at trick three. It is not for West to reason why, it is for West to do or die. West ruffs the trick and returns a diamond, which East ruffs. It's the only defense to defeat the contract.

Play commentary: As declarer you just

have to hope that they don't find this defense! Also, if you and partner somehow managed to land in 3NT, you have just won the gold medal.

Duplicate Experiences

The STOP card: why do we have it?
There is probably no rule in duplicate bridge more commonly abused than that of ignoring the STOP card. This simple procedure is there to protect players from giving unauthorized information. Yet so many of us pay little or no attention to its use. Here is the exact wording from the Official Encyclopedia of Bridge:

"Skip-bid warning: A notice given to the opponent by a player who is about to skip at least one level of the bidding. The next player is expected to wait approximately 10 seconds before making a call."

A skip bid is one that skips at least one level of bidding, as in 1 - 2. After a skip bid has been made, a hasty action by the next player can give that player's partner unauthorized information.

That is, a quick pass could show weakness, a quick double great strength. A long pause followed by pass or minimum bid relays to partner that one has values but not enough for more aggressive action.

Such actions could be completely honest and innocent, but each puts a heavy ethical burden on partner, who is expected to bid solely on his own hand and not to base his call on his partner's quick pass, quick double or slow bid. In practice, this is very difficult to do. Remember how we all chuckle when jurors are told to pretend that they did not hear certain stricken testimony.

The skip-bid warning, accomplished by saying, "Skip bid, please wait," or by using the red STOP card, mandates that the opponent left of the skip bidder wait 10 seconds before making any call.

"The 10-second period starts from the time the bid is made (verbal or bid card). A player should wait 10 seconds after any skip bid with or without a warning."

Note carefully: the 10-second period starts when the bid is made, not when the warning is made and not when the STOP card is picked up

This delay reduces the possibility of "reading" partner's hand from the manner of his action. Use of the skip-bid warning is not required but we highly recommend that you use it as a courtesy to your opponents and to avoid problems for your partner. Note that, if you use it, you must use it all the time for all skip bids, not just for certain kinds, *e.g.*, weak bids.

During the 10-second wait, avoid conveying information. As in other situations, you must sit quietly and impassively, and then make your call. Tapping your fingers, grabbing the Pass card and holding it for 10 seconds, or looking totally bored or impatient, violate the spirit of the regulation and defeat its purpose.

So please comply with this simple but important rule.

Say, "Skip bid" or use the STOP card whenever you make a skip bid.

Wait 10 seconds after the bid whenever your opponent issues the skip-bid warning.

It is the ethical and proper thing to do in fairness to your fellow players.

(1) West asked for an explanation (which was given as "Majors, not a great hand."), then thought for 5 to 10 seconds before passing.

Facts: The contract was defeated two tricks, plus 300 for East–West. North–South felt that the slow pass made 3♣ a 100% action, rather than simply probable.

Director's Ruling: The staff determined that the slow Pass did not demonstrably suggest 3. Similarly, the staff did not find Pass to be a logical alternative.

The Appeal: North–South appealed the ruling. All players agreed to the basic facts, with East–West estimating the tempo break as 5 to 8 seconds and North–South estimating 10 seconds.

The Decision: The committee determined that there was a break in tempo, although one member thought that 5 to 8 seconds was reasonable. There was no discussion that the break indicated 3. While it may not have worked, the committee felt that 3. was an action that would have been taken by 100% of East's peers. Further, they did not believe there was a logical alternative to bidding either 2NT or 3. The table result was assigned to both sides.

Facts: North asked the meaning of 3♣ and was told that it was a bad hand, bad suit. If 3♣ had instead showed a feature, North would have bid 3♠ to suggest a save, but over a "bad/bad" response, North did not want to risk suggesting a sacrifice which might cost 300.

The contract was 4♥ by West. On the ♦K opening lead 10 tricks were scored, plus 620 for East-West.

Director's Ruling: The Director was unable to determine the East-West agreement. The director believed it was possible, however, that (per North-South's further contention)West bid 3♣ to show a feature, and therefore the explanation provided Unauthorized Information. The contract was changed to 3♥, plus 170 East-West.

The Appeal: East and West were the only players to attend the hearing. East-West contended that the explanation given was correct per their agreements.

The Decision: The committee determined that East-West were playing Ogust, and that the explanation given was correct. With no other indication of an irregularity, the committee restored the table result of 4♥, plus 620 East–West.

Edward S. Godfrey

We don't need no stinkin' finesses!

Turkey's Yalcin Atabey found a neat line of play on this deal from the first final session of the Silodor Open Pairs. Atabey, who was playing with countryman Gokhan Yilmaz, scored the maximum number of tricks without having to resort to a finesse to find the trump queen.

The top contract for North–South is $6 \blacklozenge$, but most of the field played $4 \blacktriangledown$. Ten tricks are easy, and 11 tricks are possible. If you guess the $\blacktriangledown Q$, you'll take 11 tricks, but Atabey found a path to plus 650 that made the position of the $\blacktriangledown Q$ irrelevant.

East led a low club which was ruffed in the closed hand. Atabey plunked down the ◆A, and when the queen appeared, he switched to a low spade toward dummy's king. East, of course, ducked. Next came the ♥A and a heart to the king. When the queen failed to appear, Atabey ruffed another club in the closed hand and played three rounds of diamonds ending in dummy.

West couldn't profit from ruffing in at any point to play another club. Declarer would simply ruff and continue running diamonds on which one of dummy's low spades would be pitched. The defense would only score the ♥Q and the ♠A, so West discarded instead.

At this stage, declarer ruffed dummy's last club. West, who had not pitched all his clubs, followed. Atabey continued with the last diamond to pitch a spade from dummy, and the defense could collect only two tricks. Plus 650.

Could West have done better by pitching all his clubs on the run of the diamonds? No. When declarer ruffs the last of dummy's clubs in his hand, West can overruff, but he will then be forced to play a spade from A J 10 into declarer's AQ 9.



do not know for sure at present. The damage was not to the eye but to the brain. It took me several months to realize how extensive it was.

My long-term memory is not too bad, but the effect of the stroke on my short-term memory was disastrous.

I cannot remember anything for any significant length of time. Nothing that I learned recently "sticks."

I tried playing bridge once. I cannot see the cards well, particularly the red suits. This is very time consuming. By the time I have played halfway through a hand I have forgotten what I started with. I could not even handle cribbage.

So, between my eyesight and my memory, I believe my bridge days are gone forever. I continue to spend a few hours a week on rehab.

I have lost my independence. Not being able to drive is the worst. I hope my eyes, and more particularly my brain, will get well enough to make it safe for me to drive again.

My mind still malfunctions occasionally, especially when I am tired. A nap, even if only for one hour, is a great restorative.

There are moments when I disconnect from reality, but they are getting less frequent. They normally only occur when I am under stress.

Since my stroke I have significantly reordered my priorities in life. For example, bridge used to be a passion. Now that I have totally lost my ability, I really have little desire to play again.

It is not that I have forgotten how to play, but I have lost my memory, the ability to concentrate and to keep focused. I do not care if I play or not, but I do miss the social aspects of the game.

My main interests these days are hiking, opera and travel. In the early months, as the extent of my mental decline became obvious, it was often difficult to fight off depression. Now I have accepted my new circumstances and will adjust accordingly.

I am sorry I have not written sooner, my eyesight and my mental state make it impractical to do this in any reasonable length of time. I do love to hear the news from my friends and I appreciate getting letters and e-mails, however brief.

Finally, I have had the great good fortune to have been married for over 34 years to Min. She has been a terrific partner, both in life and in bridge, through the good times and particularly the tough times. We are hoping to go to the Denver NABC to celebrate Thanksgiving with our friends.

Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an announcement, use the announcement word — such as "transfer" — and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or announcement has been made.

Cell phones, audible pagers or any similar communication equipment may not be operated or operable in the playing area during a session of play at NABCs except for health-related equipment or by permission of the director-in-charge of the tournament or event.

encouraged her to leave the business and concentrate on other things.

By that time, she was an avid golfer and tennis player – and a pilot.

The business required a lot of travel, and the company had private planes which her husband flew, sometimes with the family. Aileen learned to fly as a safety play – she wanted to know what to do in case Mike became incapacitated during a flight.

Osofsky recalls that she learned the flying part pretty quickly. "Learning to land took some time," she says.

She took up bridge at the age of 35. "I always feel like I have to be learning something," she says. All her friends were learning, so Osofsky joined in. She still remembers her first two bridge teachers – Irene Rothenberg and Gail Greenberg.

Even after learning, she still played more golf than anything, until her regular golf partner became ill and had trouble walking. They both started concentrating more on bridge then.

She started playing duplicate at the Beverly Bridge Club – owned by the late Jim Becker.

Osofsky was introduced to tournament bridge when one of the women at the Beverly hired the late Judy Tucker to play in a regional. The woman got cold feet and asked Aileen if she wanted to play with Tucker.

At the halfway point of the two-session event, Osofsky and Tucker were leading the field, although Osofsky didn't know that her 200+ game (156 average) was good. "I didn't know from scores," she says, "and my son Alan told Judy, 'Don't try to explain anything to my mother. It will only make her nervous."

They didn't win, but Osofsky played a lot after that with Tucker, who died in 1998. "I sometimes feel that Judy is right at my shoulder," says Osofsky.

As a well-respected member of the Greater New York Bridge Association, Osofsky gained the attention that eventually led to her appointment as Goodwill chair. She is one of only three life members of the GNYBA.

At her first NABC after accepting the appointment, Osofsky went all over the tournament asking people what they thought she should do. "I wanted to make a difference," she says.

One piece of advice that stuck with her came from Bernice Larson, Osofsky recalls. "She said not to make the Goodwill reception just wine and cheese. She encouraged me to try to use it to teach people something about behaving better."

Osofsky says she tries to impart her own feelings about bridge to those she hopes to influence to be friendly to everyone and welcoming to new players.

"You have to be happy just to be here," she says. "It's like an extended family. You may not win or even do well, but look how lucky you are to be here."

Vanderbilt Hopefuls

Four friends who met while attending Carnegie Mellon University charged into the premier event of the Spring NABC, the Vanderbilt Knockouts, even though none of them is a Life Master. The four young adults — Matt Lahut, Jenny Lin, Kevin Shiue and Michael Ashley-Rollman — found themselves paired against the #23 seed of John Onstott, Jim Robison, Drew Casen, Chris Compton, Samuel Cohen and Jim Krekorian, a squad with multiple national champions.

How'd they do? They got creamed. In more technical terms, the quartet lost by the remarkable margin of 232 IMPs.

Does it bother them? No way.

"This was so much fun," said Shiue, a graduate student in design who has about 30 masterpoints.

"The opponents were really nice. I like playing against really good players – you can depend on them to have their bids in the auction."

Lahut, who graduated with a degree in computer science two years ago, said, "We knew it would be suicide, but it was a great experience." Lahut has about 225 masterpoints.

Michael Ashley-Rollman, a senior studying computer science, has approximately 40 masterpoints. He said that the student lounge at Carnegie Mellon serves as a meeting place for many of the computer science students, and it was there that the team first met. This is the first time the foursome has played together in an event.

Jenny Lin, with 250 masterpoints, is the senior member of the squad, and not just because of her masterpoint total. This is the second time Lin, who graduated last year with a degree in computer science, has played in the Vanderbilt.

"The first time around, my team was paired against Rita Shugart, Andrew Robson, Boye Brogeland and Tony Forrester. We got killed, of course, but on one deal my partner and I got to a minor-suit slam that Brogeland and Forrester missed at the other table. Shugart and Robson complimented us on our auction on that deal," she said.

"Having an expert tell you that you did something right makes all the difference in the world. It was a great feeling."

In an ironic turn of events, Lin, the team captain, was late getting to the tournament on Saturday, so it fell to Shiue to pre-register the team before the 8 p.m. deadline. He found himself in the strange position of buying an entry for the Vanderbilt Knockouts while at the same time trying to find a partner for the 99er game.

Would the squad ever try to play in the Vanderbilt again?

"Absolutely!"

The next deal was simply a matter of good judgment.

North could have defeated the contract by leading the ♣A and giving his partner a ruff, with the ♠K still to come, but that's a tough lead to find. Morris had no trouble after the opening heart lead, collecting 11 tricks for plus 750 and 72 out of 91 matchpoints.

This deal, from the first final session, did show Morris making a thoughtful play on defense that saved several matchpoints.

Morris led his singleton heart to the 5, 10 and king. Declarer played the ♣A and a low club, and Wold overtook his partner's queen to return the ♥6 for Morris to ruff. Morris, with an accurate count on the West hand, deduced that if he played a low diamond to Wold's ace and another heart was

returned, declarer would simply discard his other losing diamond while Morris ruffed with his natural trump trick.


Accordingly, Morris played the ♦K and a diamond to Wold's ace for the heart return to defeat the contract. The score was only average, but it was considerably better than minus 140 would have been.

Bid worse, play better


If you bid them as badly as I do, you'd better play them better. Having reached 6 no the following deal and gone down, you consult the hand record and discover that the slam is makeable despite the 5-1 trump split.

On the normal lead of the $\blacklozenge Q$ you do best to win in hand and lead a heart up. When South takes it (or else you pitch all the hearts on the clubs or avoid a spade loser if South ruffs in) and returns a diamond, you win the king, cross to the $\clubsuit Q$ and lead a spade, intending to finesse. Once the $\spadesuit Q$ appears, you leave trumps alone. You cash all your winners, ending in dummy. This is the ending you will reach:



When you lead a plain card from dummy, South must ruff high to avoid immediate concession. You overruff, go back to the AJ and have your trump coup.

Best defense – which would require truly imaginative declarer play – is to lead the $\triangle Q$. Now, the defenders are threatening to get a second trump lead in early to disrupt the entries. Declarer must win the $\triangle K$, cash the $\triangle K$ Q and take the top diamonds, then run the clubs. South and West discard on all three rounds, reaching this position:



Now declarer leads the ◆5 from dummy and can arrange to take four trumps tricks against any defense.

"Next round - all move"

The call was made in an 11-table side game, and the two East-West players at Table 11 moved to Table 12. After a couple of minutes, director Jeff Alexander noticed them and said, "Ladies, there is no Table 12 in this game."

The ladies thanked him and moved on to Table 13.

Lucky 13

It's hard to fault North for leading his partner's suit – South did make a vulnerable overcall, after all. As it happens, the only lead to defeat the slam is a trump, as you will see.

Guided herself by the vulnerable overcall, Linda won the diamond lead with the ace, cashed the ◆K and ruffed a diamond. The ♣K was followed by the ♣Q to the ace, then Linda ruffed her last diamond, followed by a heart from dummy.

In with the singleton ΨA , South had two bad choices: lead into dummy's space tenace or give Linda a ruff-sluff, on which she would discard one of her spades. Slam bid and made.

Respect the knaves

North opened 1NT and South raised to 2NT, which was passed out. As South tabled the dummy, he commented, "Sorry, partner – eight points but including four jacks."

East led the \$4, taken in dummy with the jack. A diamond went to declarer's king and East's ace, and a club was returned to West's king. Later in hand, declarer led a heart to dummy's jack, ducked by West. Back in hand, declarer took a winning club finesse of the jack

Finally, West was down to the bare ♥A and was thrown in with it. With nothing but diamonds left, he could only cash the queen and surrender the eighth trick to dummy's ◆J.

2NT made two – the jacks took half the tricks.




Trey-fecta

In the normal course of things, you wouldn't expect to gain a trick from having a 3 instead of a 2, but it happened on this deal from the second qualifying session of the Silodor Open Pairs I. The deal was played by Richard Coren (playing with Billy Eisenberg) and reported by Brian Glubok (playing with Michael Kopera).



Kopera started with the $\blacktriangle J$, and Coren discarded a low heart from dummy as he won the ace. He tossed another heart from dummy on the $\blacktriangle K$, then played the $\blacklozenge K$ from hand. Kopera won the $\blacklozenge A$ and played the $\blacktriangledown J$ to Glubok's ace. Dummy was tapped with a high spade, and declarer played the $\blacklozenge Q$ and a low diamond.


Glubok ruffed in with the \$5, and Coren overruffed with the 8. Coren ruffed a heart in dummy and continued with another low diamond, overruffing the \$6 with his king. This was the end position:



No matter what declarer does, he cannot take more than two tricks. If he ruffs the spade in dummy and plays the good diamond, South will make two trump tricks. Same story if he ruffs a heart instead.

Check out what happens if East was dealt the

♣3 instead of the 2.



Now declarer can ruff a spade to dummy and play the ◆9, ruffing with the 3. South must use one of his club honors to overruff, and then lead from the ♣Q 2 (or J-2) into the ♣A 10 at the end.

New pre-Alert/ Disclosure forms

If your partnership plays special overcalls, you must fill out a new pre-Alert/Disclosure form and make it available to your opponents when you play in events that allow Mid-Chart and Super-Chart conventions.

This applies to NABC+, regional or higher knockout and Flight A Swiss games. Look for the light blue forms on the table where convention cards are available.

Zero Tolerance

The ACBL Board of Directors — citing a commitment to "improving acceptable player behavior at all times" — adopted Zero Tolerance as ACBL policy in 1998.

Unacceptable behavior has decreased – the goal, however, is to eliminate unacceptable behavior as much as possible.

Please report conduct that is unacceptable while keeping in mind that we must be tolerant of other people in general — and bridge players in particular. Also report conduct that is outstanding or refreshing.

Commendable behavior includes (but is not limited to):

- Being a good "host" or "guest" at the table.
- Greeting others in a friendly manner.
- Praising the bidding and/or play of the opponents.
- Having two clearly completed convention cards readily available to the opponents. This is also a regulation.

Unacceptable behavior includes (but is not limited to):

- Badgering, rudeness, insinuations, intimidation, profanity, threats or violence.
- Negative comments concerning opponents' or partner's play or bidding.
 - Gloating over good results.
- Constant and gratuitous lessons and analyses at the table.
- Loud and disruptive arguing with a director's ruling.

If you experience someone exhibiting discourteous behavior or being other than civil, please call a tournament director immediately. If you feel that there was a very serious breech of discipline, in addition to the resolution by the tournament director at the table, please discuss the problem directly with the Director-in-Charge of the tournament.

Should it become necessary to call a tournament director, you may simply state: "This player is interfering with my enjoyment of the game."

The director will then attempt to determine the facts. If he establishes there was unacceptable behavior, an immediate 1/4-board disciplinary penalty (3 IMPs in team games) shall be assigned to all offenders.

This may involve any one or all four players at the table, regardless of who initiated the unacceptable behavior. If both members of a partnership are guilty, the penalties are cumulative (1/4 board each = 1/2 board or 3 IMPs each = 6 IMPs).

If it is determined that a second offense has occurred in the same event, the offender(s) shall be ejected from future competition in that event.

An offender removed from an event shall be deemed not to have played in the event, no masterpoints will be awarded and no refunds will be made.

In the case of a serious offense and in the case of multiple offenses (three) during a tournament, a disciplinary committee may determine whether the offender(s) should be allowed to play in other

events at the tournament and/or whether additional sanctions may be appropriate.

While the director may issue a warning, directors are strongly encouraged to give penalties and a warning should be given only when there is no clear violation, where the facts cannot be clearly determined or there are mitigating circumstances. Offenders should receive an immediate penalty. Regardless of who may have initiated unacceptable behavior, all offenses are punishable. Retaliatory behavior is a punishable offense. Frivolous accusations will also be considered as offenses under this policy.

Convention card reminder

- Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.
- Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of

each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing

until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

Monitoring

At this and future North American championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.

Silver Ribbon Pairs now under way

The Silver Ribbon Pairs — open only to players who are at least 55 years old and who have prequalified by placing first or second in a regional- or national-rated senior event — started on Sunday.

Last year's event was won by two Florida players who had a huge carryover from the qualifying round and stayed ahead of the field throughout the final round to win the event.

Joe Godefrin of Sarasota and Ed Schule of Tampa recorded their first NABC win; they also have a world title to their credit: the 2002 World Senior Teams in Montreal.

This deal is from the first qualifying round when the duo racked up a 71% game.

Schulte, West, led the \$8. This turned out poorly on the actual layout. Declarer played low from dummy and captured Godefrin's jack with his

queen. Declarer didn't know it, but Schulte knew that declarer likely had four club tricks coming.

Declarer, who had eight tricks in the bag, worked on hearts to build his ninth trick. At trick two, he crossed to the *K and played a low heart to his 8. Schulte won the *Q and played back a safe spade.

Declarer rode this around to his queen and cashed dummy's remaining high spades, pitching two diamonds from his hand. East pitched the \$3, confirming an original four-card holding. Next declarer ran the \$\varphi 9\$, losing to Schulte's king.

The deal was now an open book. Schulte knew that declarer had established his winners, and both hearts and clubs were about to come in. He, therefore, switched to the lacktriangleK and continued with a low diamond to defeat the contract.

The Silver Ribbon Pairs, which consists of two qualifying and two final sessions, has been won by four members of the ACBL Board of Directors:
Joan Remey Moore, District 12 director, playing with Helen Shanbrom in 1993; Virgil Anderson, District 15 director, playing with Jayne Thomas, District 9 director, in 1994; and Jim Kirkham, District 22 director, playing with his wife Corinne in 1999. (Anderson was ACBL president at the time and the only "sitting" president to win an NABC event.)

The winners will have their names inscribed on the Leventritt Trophy and will receive a certificate of recognition.

The trophy honors Peter Leventritt of New York, ACBL president in 1954 and assistant treasurer 1945-46. He served as president of the Greater New York Bridge Association and the Card School of New York, which he co-founded.

Leventritt (1916-1997) pioneered the use of the Schenken System in partnership with its inventor, Howard Schenken. He represented North America
